Agriculture Dept. Declares Most Of Douglas County To Be Livestock District

An order declaring that the bulk of Douglas County is a livestock district was issued this week by the State Department of Agriculture.

The order follows up a Dec. 4 hearing in the courthouse at which the county voted in 1918 to make the entire county into a district. Livestock districts are areas in which it is illegal to permit livestock to run at large.

Because several acts passed by legislatures after that election apparently re-opened much of the county, the Department of Agriculture has been requested to delimit further into the question.

Hearings such as the one held in Roseburg were ordered by the 1937 legislature to clarify confusion about livestock districts. Information brought out during hearings was to be studied and then orders stating what districts are in effect were to be issued.

Final If Not Appealed

These orders, such as the one governing this county, if not appealed within 30 days in circuit court become final, with livestock districts specified being in effect. The Douglas County order declares all of the county to be a livestock district except for approximately 7½ square miles south and east of Olalla and about 90 square miles in the North Myrtle Creek and Days Creek area. These areas were withdrawn from the county-wide district by elections. Also excluded from the district are all federal lands and private lands enclosed by federal lands. The order also states that no livestock districts exist on public roads in federal lands except where provided by laws and regulations of the United States.

Named as committee chairmen were Sandra Hardman, entertainment; Betty Swan, refreshments, and Donna Ives, planning.

The order was signed by M. E. Knickerbocker, chief of the division of animal industry, and approved by Robert J. Steward, department director.

Farm Groups OK Dropping Acreage Reserve Parts

WASHINGTON (AP) — The decision of the administration to drop the acreage reserve part of the soil bank program has the approval of leaders of two major national farm organizations.

A spokesman noted that the national Grange, at its fall convention at Colorado Springs, recommended such action because it did not believe the program was very effective in reducing crop surpluses. This was the purpose for which it was set up.

Likewise, the American Farm Bureau Federation declared at its convention in Chicago that results of the soil bank have been "disappointing." The federation recommended that greater emphasis be placed on a long-range land retirement program under which land and whole farms would be retired from crop production.

The federation said that the government would need to offer larger payments than those now provided under the conservation reserve part of the soil bank to achieve this goal. These payments now average about \$10 an acre a year.

Reprieve For Huskies Of Antarctica Obtained

AUCKLAND, New Zealand (AP) — A reprieve for most if not all the huskies with the New Zealand Antarctic expedition was reported Thursday by C. M. Bowden, chairman of the Ross Sea Committee.

He said the Auckland zoo is taking nine and the Wellington zoo two. Others are expected to find homes in New Zealand and elsewhere.

Animal lovers had complained about a reported plan to shoot the huskies in Antarctica because it was not believed they could survive New Zealand's climate.

Daughter Of Bob Burns Admits Dope Addiction

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Barbara Ann Burns, who told police that "I'm really hooked" as a heroin addict, is free on \$500 bail pending a court appearance Jan. 14.

The 19-year-old daughter of the late comedian Bob Burns was released on a writ late Wednesday, having been booked on suspicion of violating the narcotics law.

She and John De Roo, 30, and Robert A. Gray, 23, similarly booked, were arrested in her Hollywood apartment.

Miss Burns told officers and reporters that after her father died in February, 1956, she and her mother, Mrs. Harriett Burns, became estranged, were engaged in estate litigation and she became lonely and turned to dope. The estate matter was settled, giving her \$500 a month allowance. She said she has been spending most of it for heroin.

Textbooks Publishers Named In Anti-Trusts

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The California attorney general has filed anti-trust charges against six publishers of school textbooks. He also demanded they be fined.

The complaint charged the publishers conspire to boycott the State of California by refusing to lease their plates to the state for printing textbooks.

At issue is the state's system of renting the printing plates and producing textbooks in the state-owned printing plant in Sacramento for distribution to the schools.

Named in the complaint are Ginn & Co., Macmillan Co., Rand McNally & Co., Houghton-Mifflin Co., Scott-Foresman & Co., the American Book Co., and Four John Does.

Missionary Council Delegates Head Home

ACCRA, Ghana (AP) — Delegates to the annual conference here of the International Missionary Council headed for home Thursday after reaching last-minute agreement on a trial merger with the world council of churches.

At its final session Wednesday the conference voted 58-7 in favor of asking the world council to postpone its conference scheduled for Ceylon in 1961 to enable a merger to be tried for four years.

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
