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Court Of Appeals Applies Controversial Jencks Case Rule In Red Party Trial

WASHINGTON — The U. S. Court of Appeals Thursday applied the controversial Jencks case rule to the government's effort to label the Communist Party as a tool of Moscow. On that ground, it granted the party at least another delay.

The ruling was that the government, in its action before the Subversive Activities Control Board (SACB), must give the party access to reports which a key witness made to the FBI, if it is to rely on that witness' testimony.

The order follows the theory adopted by the Supreme Court last June when it reversed the conviction of Clinton Jencks, former labor leader, on charges of filing a false non-Communist affidavit under the Taft-Hartley Act. The high court ruling was that the government had to make available to the defense statements filed with the FBI by two key prosecution witnesses.

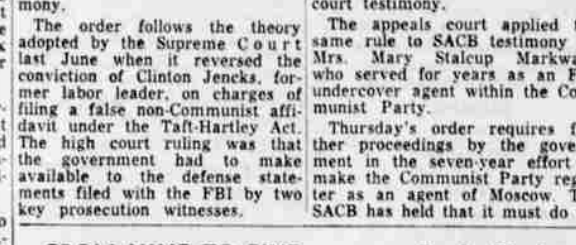
Some prosecutions have been dropped by the government on the basis of the Jencks case, rather than release material which federal officials contend would identify secret agents, disclose investigating methods and close down information sources.

Congress passed a special law aimed to soften some of the effects. But in criminal cases, the defense can still see such reports, after the court has screened out nonrelevant material, for a check on the credibility of a witness' court testimony.

The appeals court applied the same rule to SACB testimony by Mrs. Mary Stalcup Markward who served for years as an FBI undercover agent within the Communist Party.

Thursday's order requires further proceedings by the government in the seven-year effort to make the Communist Party register as an agent of Moscow. The SACB has held that it must do so.

Prominent Man Admits Holding Up Nearby Bank

MORRIS, Ill. — A 50-year-old civic leader and member of one of Morris' most prominent families voluntarily surrendered Wednesday and admitted the \$364 stick-up of a nearby bank.

"I couldn't sleep with my conscience and I was afraid I'd get caught," Maynard Davis was quoted as telling Sheriff John Olson of Grundy County.

Davis, father of three children, is a painting contractor, a member of the Morris school board, a church member and an active participant in Parent-Teacher Assn. and other school activities.

Davis' brother W. Clark Davis is coroner of Grundy County; another brother, James, is a Morris adman; and a third brother, Grodon, has announced his candidacy for Grundy County sheriff.

CHAINS REQUIRED

SALEM — Chains are required because of packed snow at Timberline and Warm Springs junction, the Oregon Highway Commission reported Thursday.

Icy spots were reported in most mountain areas.

The only new snow was two inches at Santiam Pass, Government Camp and Warm Springs junction, and four inches at Timberline.

Marine Sergeant Denies Brutality

YOKOSUKA, Japan — Marine Sgt. Robert J. Barbuti of Schenectady, N.Y., today denied before a military court that he stomped on a Navy prisoner's bare feet, rammed a pencil up a man's nose until it bled or banged two sailors' heads together to the rhythm of a Mario Lanza record.

The 205-pound, 23-year-old sergeant denied all 28 counts of cruelty to prisoners charged to him except one mugging. He said that man told him, "Sir, I believe you are the fattest man in the brig." The charges carry a total maximum penalty of more than 30 years in prison.
