

# Auto Industry Rejects Plans Of W. Reuther

DETROIT — Leaders of the auto industry's Big Three—Ford, Chrysler and General Motors—have rejected Walter Reuther's profit-sharing plan with sharp words that amount to rejection.

A Ford spokesman called the plan unrealistic. General Motors President Harlow H. Curtice said it was "American free enterprise system" L. L. Gilbert, president of Chrysler, said it was inflationary.

For a different reason, the United Auto Workers chief also appears headed for opposition from within his own union.

The reason, says Carl Stellato, a UAW "minority" leader, is that Reuther turned his back on demanding a shorter work week in favor of trying for a profit-sharing plan in this summer's bargaining.

Stellato, president of Ford Local in the UAW, said: "You can bet there will be plenty of opposition to the idea on the floor of the convention — as I'll be right there."

The UAW will convene Jan. 22 to give formal approval of the union's goals in 1938 bargaining sessions.

Stallato, one of the chief opponents of Reuther in the 1½-million-member union, eyed the recent heavy layoffs in the auto industry and said: "Reuther's plan is going to give him more four-day work weeks than he wants—but they'll be the wrong kind."

Reuther's plan would give employees 25 per cent of a company's profits above 10 per cent of net capital before taxes. Another 25 per cent would go to car buyers in the form of rebates. The rest—50 per cent—would be kept by the company.

# Hearing Requested On Burglary Charge

Arraigned in district court Monday, Leonard J. Petrick, 21, asked for a preliminary hearing on the burglary charge facing him.

Petrick is accused of burglarizing Klumber's Radio Repair shop, 1380 NE Stephens St., Dec. 28. Sheriff Ira C. Byrd said today that Petrick has given a statement admitting four burglaries—two in Grants Pass and two in Douglas County.

According to the sheriff, Petrick claims to have spent seven years in prison in Michigan for larcenies.

His arrest, Byrd pointed out, apparently clears up a series of burglaries in Josephine and Douglas counties. The same modus operandi was used in the entries—a glass cutter was used Byrd said.

**Chain Saws Identified**

When Petrick was arrested in Washington, he had four chain saws in his possession. Two of these were identified as taken in a Jan. 6 burglary of Winston Chain Saw & Sales Service. The others were later determined to have come from a Grants Pass job which Petrick assertedly has said he got five chain saws.

Sheriff Byrd stated that the serial numbers on the Grants Pass saws had been altered. He said Petrick had admitted doing this with dies he had purchased. The paint was touched up with paint stolen in the same burglary, Petrick is said to have admitted.

Petrick allegedly has claimed that most of the loot from the burglaries has been sold.

# BLM Tract Sales Description Given At Meet Monday

Descriptions of 47 tracts of timber to be auctioned this year in the Roseburg District of the Bureau of Land Management were given Monday afternoon in a meeting of BLM officials with people in the wood industries and other interested persons.

To be sold is an estimated 139,500,000 board feet of timber in scheduled sales. In addition, some 8,900,000 feet will be offered in miscellaneous salvage and other types of sales.

About the same volume was offered in 1937. Dist. Manager Merle Winn told the audience that two holdover no-bid sales from 1937 are included in the 1938 timber sales program.

Unit foresters explained to potential timber purchasers the type of timber in each area, means of access and other data pertinent to purchase.

**Tracts Listed**

Following is the picture from each administrative area:

**Drain (Douglas master unit):** 14 tracts containing an estimated 42 million feet. Six tracts to be offered in the first quarter of the year; four in the second quarter, and four in the third.

**North Umpqua (Douglas master unit):** 17 tracts with an estimated 46,800,000 feet. Six tracts in the first quarter; two in the second; one in the third, and one in the fourth.

**Dillard (Douglas master unit):** Seven tracts with an estimated 20 million feet. Two tracts in the first quarter; three in the second, and two in the third.

**South Umpqua (South Umpqua master unit):** Nine tracts with an estimated 30,700,000 feet. Two tracts in the first quarter; four in the second; one in the third, and two in the fourth.

It was pointed out that size of the tracts remain relatively small, although there is more demand now for larger parcels. Virginia Heath, state BLM supervisor, said many small operators remaining in business, even in the face of the lumber freeze, make it necessary to continue to offer small timber tracts.

Winn said that in case some of the tracts don't sell, the bureau will attempt to issue a supplemental plan.

# Sarah Churchill Charged With Drunkenness

LOS ANGELES — Actress Sarah Churchill, red-haired daughter of the British statesman, is slated to be arraigned in Justice Court at Malibu Beach Thursday on a charge of being drunk in public.

Miss Churchill, jailed five hours Monday, has denied the charge, saying she intends to plead innocent.

Sheriff's deputies say they were called to the Malibu home of the 44-year-old actress on a complaint by the General Telephone Co. that she used profane and obscene language over the phone.

The company asserted the language was used in calls to several persons, including one with a phone company employee.

The deputies said Miss Churchill greeted them with, "What the hell do you want?" and that they found kitchen curtains torn down, lipstick smeared on the refrigerator and contents of her purse scattered.

The officers said they took the daughter of Sir Winston Churchill to a station only after she had climbed into their car holding a glass of rum and resisted their efforts to get her out.

# Film Magnate Laskey Dies At 77

HOLLYWOOD — A heart attack has ended the career of Jesse L. Laskey, movie pioneer who helped build Hollywood's vast film industry.

Laskey, 77, a moviemaker 44 years, collapsed and died in Beverly Hills yesterday shortly after talking about his book, "I Blow My Own Horn," before a women's literary club.

The producer, apparently in good health up to that moment, stumbled and fell as he turned to walk toward his car at the Beverly Hilton Hotel. Only a day earlier he had attended the annual Pro Bowl professional football game in Los Angeles.

Laskey, Cecil B. DeMille and Samuel Goldwyn formed a trio that came west and produced the first feature length film, "The Squaw Man," here in 1913.

The early-day producers followed this picture with other films, including "Rose of the Rancho," "Girl of the Golden West," "The Warrens of Virginia," "The Governor's Lady," "The Woman," and many others.

PORTUGUESE BEND, Calif. — Jayne Mansfield, who yearned for a quiet wedding, was married Monday night to Mickey Hargitay with all the hoopla of a Fourth of July picnic.

Some 1,500 fans, mostly teenagers but some adults carrying babies in arms, screamed and shouted outside the Wayfarers' Chapel during the most tender moments of the nondenominational rite.

Someone even bounced a rock off the top of the all-glass church while photographers, who nearly outnumbered guests, kept banging their cameras against the glass walls.

Just as Jayne and Mickey were whispering their "I do's," more than 100 teenagers stormed up a steep hill shouting like a Marine landing party, but a cordon of police pushed them back.

Jayne, looking sexy yet demure, said she never heard the yelling. "All I heard was Mickey saying 'I do,'" she giggled.

Bob Hope, who witnessed the wedding, and actress Marie Windsor were the only Hollywood names who traveled the 30 miles to this remote and lonely site by the Pacific Ocean.

# War Hero Held For Golf Take Robbery Attempt

MONTEREY, Calif. — A man who says he is a war hero is charged with burglary, assault with a deadly weapon and attempted robbery after a bold try to take the \$10,000 receipts from the Crosby Golf Tournament.

He goes into Municipal Court today for a preliminary hearing but the Monterey County sheriff's office said positive identification would have to wait two days for a fingerprint check.

The man says he is Lt. Col. Melvin Russell Blair, 42, who retired from the Army with a distinguished record.

Blair, who had lived at Alexandria, Va., once threw a 45-caliber automatic pistol in the face of a Communist after running out of ammunition during a battle on Razorback Ridge in Korea.

Blair was wounded in World War II and twice in Korea. Pentagon records show he was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross twice, the Silver Star, the Bronze Star three times, the Air Medal and three Purple Hearts.

# Red Defector Says Fear Of U. S. Held Up Formosa Attack

TAIPEI, Formosa — A veteran Communist officer who fled the mainland said Tuesday Red China is afraid to attack Formosa because this Nationalist island enjoys U.S. military protection.

Li Col Chang Chin-Yuang told a news conference the fear of U.S. intervention even deterred the Communist troops from trying to take the offshore islands.

These islands, the Quemoy complex opposite Formosa and the Matsus to the north are not covered specifically by the mutual defense treaty between the United States and Nationalist China.

Chang predicted most Chinese Communist troops would revolt if the Nationalists attacked the mainland. He called life under Communist rule a form of living death.

Chang said he decided to defect after reading propaganda leaflets dropped by Nationalist planes on Lungki, in coastal Fukien Province. He fled Dec. 17 but his defection was announced only this Tuesday.

# Soviet Press Calls Ike's Budget Another Arms Race

MOSCOW — The Soviet press said Tuesday President Eisenhower submitted a war budget to the U.S. Congress.

Pravda, Izvestia and other Moscow morning newspapers gave a prompt reaction to the President's budget message under the headlines: "Another Arms Race Budget."

Pravda carried a Tax news agency dispatch from Washington stressing military expenditures. It said individual taxpayers must meet 52 per cent of the budget "while corporations who profit most pay only 27 per cent."

In a dispatch from its Washington correspondent, Izvestia said that "though the budget message weighed four pounds it can be summed up in two words, 'War Budget!'"

# John Wayne's Wife Seriously Burned In Mansion Fire

ENCINO, Calif. — Actor John Wayne's wife was burned on the arm but saved herself and her baby from further harm in an early morning fire at the \$250,000 Wayne residence Tuesday.

Two servants and three dogs including a dachshund named Blackie—hero of the fire—escaped unhurt.

The actor, in Japan making a movie, got through by telephone to his home after the fire was controlled.

Assured that his wife and child were all right, he talked to Mrs. Wayne briefly before she was given a shock-reducing sedative.

Wayne's brother producer Fred Morrison, told a reporter that damage to the luxurious 14-room home might run "close to half a million dollars," including gutting of the second floor, loss of valuable antiques and personal belongings and water damage to the ground floor.

Mrs. Wayne, the former Peruvian actress Pilar Palette, and her 20-month-old daughter, Aissa, took refuge in the house of the caretaker, Webb Overlander, where a doctor treated Mrs. Wayne.

Mrs. Wayne said she was asleep and the baby was in her crib in the same second floor bedroom when Blackie awakened her about 3:20 a.m.

"My little dog, Blackie, barked and jumped up on the bed," Mrs. Wayne said. "I jumped up and saw some fire, not too much, at the edge of the carpet. I took the baby from her crib in an alcove downstairs."

"Then I went back up with a fire extinguisher. But all of a sudden—woosh—the fire just burst across the rugs and the records in the record player went up, poof, like an explosion. I couldn't stay up there any longer and I ran back downstairs."

Morrison said Wayne's collection of movie mementoes, in a den on the ground floor, was saved by firemen's salvage work.

# Violence Continues Against Jimenez

CARACAS, Venezuela — President Marcos Perez Jimenez appeared today to have skinned through another crisis as he re-opened his Cabinet for the second time in four days. But more street violence indicated Venezuela's troubles were not over.

Perez Jimenez changed three more Cabinet posts in the wake of his ouster of Gen. Romulo Fernandez from the Defense Ministry.

Meanwhile, police and troops scattered antigovernment student demonstrators in downtown Caracas with machetes and tear gas. Demands for restoration of Civil liberties increased.

The capital was under heavy guard. Police, troops, armored cars and tanks ringed the presidential palace. Inside the building soldiers patrolled the corridors with automatic rifles.

# Man In Street Pays

Izvestia said it was the man in the street "who must bear the terrific weight of this new tax burden..." It added: "This is the way so-called people's capitalism looks."

While the Soviet press was quick to pounce on the Eisenhower budget as one intended to heighten international tension, it still has not reported President Eisenhower's reply to Premier Bulganin's proposal for a summit conference.

Pravda published a long article on the necessity of settling international problems through negotiation.
