John Day Coffor Dam Work Funds Proposed

PORTLAND — The administration's proposed two million dollars for the John Day Dam will allow preparatory work but not construction, Army Engineers said Monday.

The preparatory work would include acquisition of land for relocation of a railroad and a highway on the Washington shore of the Columbia River, some construction work on those relocation projects and installation of some access roads on the Washington shore, a spokesman said.

The engineers said the 1957 appropriation of a million dollars allowed work to start at the site two months ago. It includes construction of access roads for contractors and test drilling.

The Corps of Engineers had asked six million dollars for the coming fiscal year.

Bus Crash Kills 2, Others Hurt In Pennsylvania

BEDFORD, Pa. — A bus carrying 18 passengers skidded helplessly on the ice-coated Pennsylvania Turnpike Monday night and slammed against a bridge abutment with such force that a 15-foot section of the vehicle was severed. Two passengers were killed.

The two were riding in the detached rear portion. Most of the other persons on the bus were injured but nine were released after hospital treatment.

Killed were Charles Malloy, 22, a soldier, Albia, Ia., and Miss Marian Lay, 55, New York City.

The front section of the Continental Trailways bus continued in a slide another 150 feet down the highway. The rear section lodged against the concrete pier in the medial strip between the road's east and westbound lanes.

The accident occurred 12 miles west of Bedford which is some 100 miles east of Pittsburgh. The bus was en route from Pittsburgh to New York.

Navy Recruiters Urge Check Up On Status

Navy recruiters in Roseburg have urged ex-Navy personnel considering re-enlistment to consult the recruiting office in the county court house regarding their present status for re-entry into the Navy.

The office said re-enlistments for the Oregon-Southern Washington area were up 135 per cent in December over the figure for December of 1956. Lt. Cmdr. C. Helm, head of the Portland office, attributed the gain partly to the economic condition but principally to the Navy's "stepped-up program to attract trained ex-servicemen to a career in the Navy."

Rodeo Brone Riders Paid; Tibbs Top Winner

DENVER — It was pay day for the brone riders Monday at the National Western Rodeo here as Casey Tibbs, Ft. Pierre, S.D., emerged as top money winner in the first go-around in saddle brone competition.

Tibbs, holder of six brone riding titles, picked up \$397.91. Jack Buschhorn of Cassville, Wis., scored a double victory Monday, placing first in the afternoon bareback brone riding and tying for first with Dean Armstrong of Beach, N.D., in the saddle brone competition at the evening performance.

The lead in steer wrestling was captured by Bill Hogue of Holtville, Calif., who downed a Mexican longhorn in 7.5 seconds.

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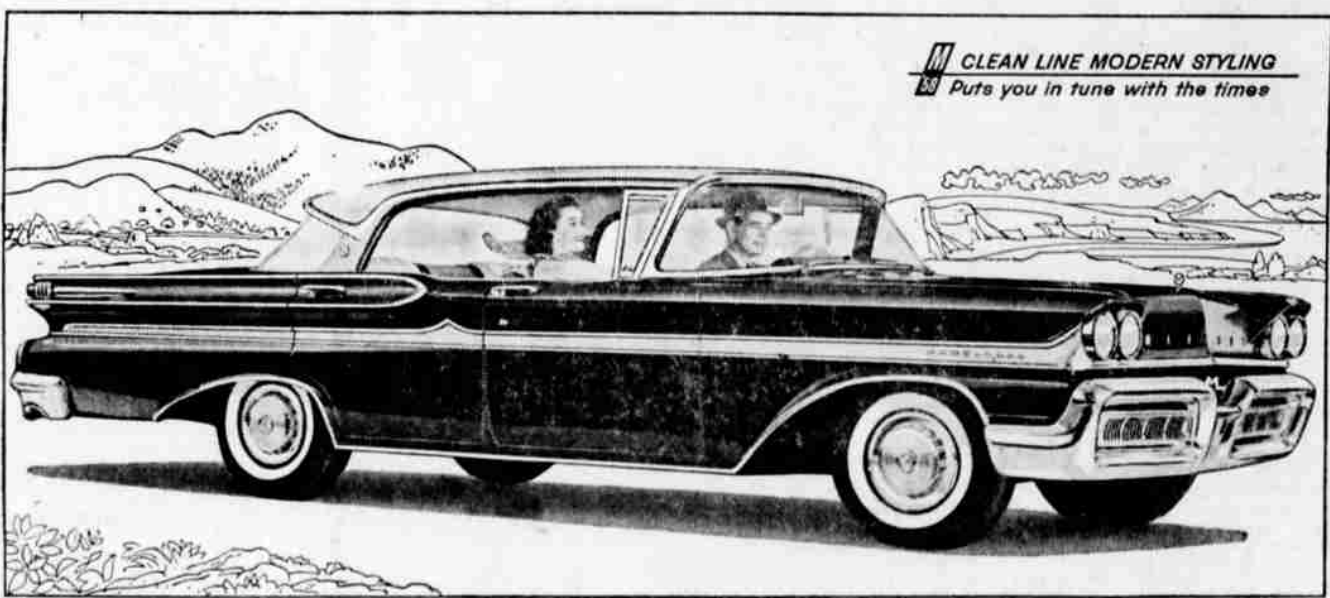
