A come-from-behind fourth quarter gave the Glendale Pirates a close 50-49 win over Eagle Point in a Sub-District 6-A-2 basketball game played Tuesday on the Eagle Point floor.

In winning their second game in league play without a defeat, the Pirates put together a successful full-court press and made eight out of nine free throws in the final period for the win.

Down by a 13-12 count at the end of the first quarter and 29-23 at halftime, the Pirates could not seem to solve the defense of the losers, although both clubs shot at a good clip for the game. Each team attempted 32 shots and hit 18 for a 56.25 average, but Glendale connected on 14 out of 26 free throws against the 13 for 19 for Eagle Point.

Turner led all scorers for Eagle Point, with Christian also chipping in with 13. Ray Munyon with 16, Bill Half with 14 and Wes Young with 10 were the top point getters for the Pirates.

Eagle Point took the jayvee game of the evening by a 45-41 count, with Hugo leading the way with 13 points. Jim Allen and Jack Berline were tops for Glendale with 12 points each. Eagle Point led 25-17 at halftime.

Junction City, leading all the way, dropped the Drain Warriors 34-29 in a District 5-A-2 basketball game Tuesday night on the Drain floor. The loss for the Warriors, defending district champs, was the third straight without a win.

The Warriors crept to within three points of Junction City in the final quarter, but a field goal by Stewart Strone from outside the key, the only field goal of the period for Junction City, gave the winners a five point lead that stood up for the rest of the game.

The main thorn in the Drain side was 6-4 Ken Johnson of Junction City, who dropped in 10 points the first quarter to lead them to a 14-3 first quarter bulge. Shawn Peterson, the rest of the game held him to only three points during the remainder of the contest.

Drain rebounded somewhat in the second quarter to cut the score down to 21-13 at halftime, but both teams could gain nothing more in the third quarter and Junction City still had a 29-20 advantage going into the final period of play.

Johnson with his 13 points was the only Junction player in double figures, but seven players broke into the scoring column to give them some well-balanced scoring power. Frank Jacobs was high for Drain with nine points, followed by Ray Heaton with eight.

Junction City also won the jayvee game by a 48-34 tally.

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New Fishing Rules Liked

The late opening of the general trout season on the Umpqua and Rogue rivers and coastal streams is expected to pay off in increased steelhead.

The proposed May 24 opening on the Umpqua probably will be made official next week by the Oregon Game Commission after the Roseburg Rod and Gun Club nodded its meeting at Winchester.

Other streams in the state will be open April 26.

The delay in the opening was proposed when it became apparent in an Alsea River study that young steelhead migrating downstream were being killed after being hooked by fishermen who found them to be under legal size.

The delay affects the tributaries of the Umpqua and Rogue, besides the rivers themselves.

Copco Lakes Open

Opening on April 26, however, will be the lower lakes in the watersheds, including the California Oregon Power Co. impoundments on the upper North Umpqua River.

Some club members questioned the wisdom of the late opening, maintaining that it would put pressure on other parts of the state and on the Southern Oregon lakes and impoundments.

However, Jim Vaughn, regional administrator for the commission, said the plan probably will prove to be a boon to the steelhead programs on the rivers.

"We'll have a better story in two years," he said, after creel studies and other studies are completed. A more certain picture may be obtained at the end of the first four-year cycle of the fish when they are counted migrating upstream at Game Commission counting boards.

Some recent creel studies along the Umpqua have indicated that a high percentage of trout taken were small.

After the meeting, a movie on Alaska was shown.

Other club business included a year-end financial report by Ross Myers and other reports. About 50 persons attended the meeting.

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Erdelatz Rejects Texas Aggie Coaching Post, Scolds School

COLLEGE STATION, Tex. — Texas A&M was shopping for a football coach again today after Navy's Eddie Erdelatz bowed out with an angry blast at Aggie representatives over the way his visit was arranged.

Erdelatz was the sixth coach mentioned for the \$16,000-a-year job and the fifth to visit the campus. No prospects are in sight.

Erdelatz's dispute with Jack Finney, chairman of the coach selection committee of the college board of directors.

"I am going to remain at Navy," Erdelatz told newsmen. He said he felt A&M didn't follow proper protocol in dealing with him.

The Dallas News quoted him as saying he had learned that the selection committee had more authority in hiring a coach than President M. T. Harrington and the athletic council.

"Hell, if I'd known that I wouldn't have come," Erdelatz was quoted as saying. "But you know I'm a stranger here."

Erdelatz said a condition of his visit was that the college contact Rear Adm. William R. Smedburg III, superintendent of the Naval Academy to get permission for him to come here. He said he learned after his arrival that this had not been done. He said Finney had talked with Capt. Slade Cutter, Naval Academy athletic director, but insisted this was not sufficient.

Finney later issued a statement saying he tried in vain to contact President Harrington so he could secure permission of Adm. Smedburg.

"Mr. Erdelatz agreed to come to Texas to talk to our athletic council and if after talking to them they were interested in offering him the job and he were interested in accepting it, then his admiral would be called," Finney said.

"We thought that was the proper procedure," Erdelatz said he made up his mind to bow out after receiving a telegram from midshipmen urging him to stay at the Naval Academy.

This recommendation will be made today to the school's athletic council, which moved up its session, originally scheduled for Friday. Now it can pass along its decision to President J. E. Wallace Sterling, who will present it to the Board of Trustees Thursday.

In Salt Lake City, sports editor John Mooney of the Tribune said Curtice told him, "I have made neither commitments nor reached agreement with another school."
