Ike Proposes Reclamation Work Proceed

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower proposed Monday that, despite big defense expenditures, the country's reclamation project construction program go forward at a steady pace.
The budget which he sent to Congress asked for slightly higher grants in new money than Congress allowed last year. However, the President ruled out any new water project starts.
The total of new money requested for reclamation construction during the fiscal year which begins July 1 was \$161,662,000. The Reclamation Bureau said that with the addition of carryover funds this would allow for a program of \$172,742,000.
Last year, Congress appropriated \$142,876,223, but carryover funds from the preceding year available for use amounted to \$29,326,113.
Eisenhower said he would also request a supplemental appropriation of 10 million dollars at once to carry on work at Glen Canyon dam on the Upper Colorado River project which, if granted, will bring the new money grants for this fiscal year to \$152,876,223.
