

Influential Local Group Takes Part In Wildlife Meet

The Roseburg Rod and Gun Club, an affiliate of the Oregon Wildlife Federation, will have a powerful part in the proceedings at the annual midwinter conference of the OWF in Corvallis Saturday and Sunday.

Members of the club will preside over the conference. Various members of the club will preside over the conference, head the committee nominating candidates for office and introduce Gov. Robert D. Holmes.

In order: Bruce Yeager, who announced he won't run for re-election, is OWF president and will hold the gavel.

Ross Myers is chairman of the nominating committee. Charles V. Stanton will be master of ceremonies at a Saturday night banquet and will introduce the governor.

State Rep. W. O. Kelsay, a club member and chairman of the state Legislative Fish and Game Interim Committee, will have his committee at the meeting. John Amacher, former state representative who headed an earlier fish and game interim study group, is scheduled to attend.

So will Merle Winn, club president, and Jim Vaughn, regional administrator for the Oregon Game Commission. Some club directors also will be there.

Tuesday night, seven resolutions to be introduced by sportsmen's groups over the state, were read to members of the club.

Fireworks may result from two conflicting resolutions dealing with organization of federal waterfowl refuges and adjacent areas in the Upper Klamath and Tule Lake areas.

Another proposal, sponsored by the Cottage Grove Rod and Gun Club, would permit the use of dogs in flushing deer in brushy Western Oregon.

The proposed resolution states that the use of dogs would tend to increase incentive by sportsmen in harvest of the big Western Oregon deer population and decrease pressure on Eastern Oregon herds.

Other proposed resolutions oppose construction of Nez Perce Dam in the Snake River and approved the building of the Mountain Sheep and Pleasant Valley dams; ask construction of impoundments in the Mt. Hood National Forest so streams can be stocked naturally to trout; and opposing use of outboard motors on two lakes in Linn County.

Coastal Warning System Operates Under Change

A new, simplified system of coastal warning displays, which took effect Jan. 1, has been announced by the Weather Bureau, U. S. Dept. of Commerce.

Under the new system, only four separate flag signals will be used during the day, instead of the six separate flag signals which have been employed previously in the Weather Bureau's Storm Warning Display System.

During the night, four comparable light signals will be used for small craft, gale, whole gale and hurricane warnings.

There are three major differences between the old and the new visual warning display systems: 1. The substitution of a single non-directional gale warning signal for the four separate directional storm warning signals that were used to specify northeast, south, southwest or northwest gales.

2. The introduction of a new lantern signal for use during the night for "small craft warnings." Under the old system displays for small craft warnings were used in the daytime only.

3. The introduction of a new and separate signal for "whole gale" warnings. Under the old system the same signal was used for both "whole gales" and "hurricanes."

The Weather Bureau points out that these visual warning signals displayed along the coasts are supplementary to, and not a replacement for, the written advisories and warnings given distribution by the press, radio and television.

The new system was adopted after much preparatory work and consultation with marine groups, yacht clubs, shipping agencies and other coastal interests especially concerned in providing for maximum protection of life and property from storms.

Oregon State Football Team Slates Syracuse

CORVALLIS — Oregon State College has scheduled a football game with Syracuse University as a season opener for both teams in 1961, OSC athletic director Roy Keene said Wednesday.

Keene said final details have not yet been worked out but that the game would be held in Multnomah Stadium in Portland Sept. 23, 1961.

In addition, said Keene, the two teams probably will meet on the home field of Syracuse the following year.

"This will make the first time Oregon State has ever played Syracuse in football," he said, adding that Syracuse is "always one of the top teams in the East."

OSC was Pacific Coast Conference co-champion last season.
