

Labor Leader Wants Favorable Legislation

PORTLAND — Unemployment compensation will suffer if a Legislature unfavorable to labor is elected this year, George Brown, political education head of the Oregon AFL-CIO, predicted here. He spoke at a meeting of the Committee on Political Education (COPE). Brown said employer pressure on lawmakers held contributions to the unemployment compensation fund at such a low level that since 1949, payments to jobless workers have exceeded contributions in every year except one.

Brown called the low rates the results of an employer policy "to put pressure on labor so they wouldn't have to increase benefits."

Food Still Good Purchase, County Home Agents Report

FRUITS:

Apples continue to hold the spotlight in fruits. Keep them handy for between-meal snacks for children and adults. A good suggestion to the man of the family is to keep a supply of apples handy for mid-morning or mid-afternoon "apple-breaks" of course.

Anjou and comice pears have surprising goodness when they are cooked. Simplest way is to split them in half and remove the core. Bake with a mixture of brown sugar and butter while they bake.

Many retailers are offering special prices on bananas because they're unusually plentiful. Buy enough to have plenty for eating fresh, plus three or four to use in banana nut bread when they're thoroughly ripe. Several sizes of pineapples are in markets. All are sweet and add variety to meals. Another good addition to fruit salads is chopped dates.

VEGETABLES:

In this season of fewer fresh vegetables, consider the dual roles of those which are in good supply. Try serving cooked celery or raw cauliflower. Combine cooked, diced celery with cooked frozen green peas. Serve in a cream sauce. Raw cauliflower combines well with other salad items on this week's shopping list.

Beef prices are up a little more than last week. However, beef rounds haven't advanced as much as some cuts. How about chicken fried steak or Swiss steak one night this week?

MEATS:

Pork is most reasonable among all the meats this week. Smoked items, particularly hams, may be priced a bit lower soon. Look for more fresh hams, too.

POULTRY:

Turkey still gives a lot for money spent. All this season's crop of turkeys have been frozen. As we use supplies, prices may go up. Roast a whole turkey and freeze half for later use. Or choose half or quarter turkeys if you prefer. Eggs continue about the same as last week with large sizes giving best value. Remember that eggs furnish complete proteins so they can be the mainstay of any meal of the day.

SEAFOODS:

Crabs and crabmeat are the brightest seafoods on this week's market list. You'll find fresh fillet of sole and red snapper, too. Both are expected to become more plentiful as the month progresses.

DAIRY:

According to the latest nationwide food survey by USDA, Americans need to drink about 10 percent more milk to offset existing calcium deficiencies. Serve mugs of steaming hot chocolate before bedtime to assure your family improved health.

U.S. Going Into Space Business, States Quarles

WASHINGTON — Deputy Secretary of Defense Donald A. Quarles said Thursday the military is "going into the space business" with a new agency authorized to plan such things as space ships.

Quarles spoke with newsmen as a senior member of the Senate House Atomic Energy Committee. Rep. Holtfield (D-Calif.), called for a "Manhattan Project, if necessary, to develop a space vehicle." The World War II Manhattan Project developed the atomic bomb.

Quarles, saying he was not going to get into the realm of science fiction, declined to say in so many words that the Defense Department is planning "a space ship."

"It depends on what you mean," he said. "If you mean anything that goes into space, certainly we will get into that."

ARPA passed its first hurdle in Congress Wednesday when the House, presented with the issue in a surprise move unanimously voted authorization.

Wood Utilization Session Planned

A problem thought by many to be a key to Southwest Oregon's economic troubles—greater utilization of wood and wood products—will be the theme of the Northwest section meeting of the Forest Products Research Society Jan. 20-21 in Corvallis.

John H. Syme, vice chairman of the section, said the session will combine the presentation of important research results with actual tours of plants in the Corvallis area.

Technical sessions will include discussion of such topics as the effect of overlays on flexural properties of particle board and compression in hot-pressing Douglas fir veneers. Among plants to be visited are those of the Cascades Plywood Corp., Lebanon; Brown Co. (bituminized fiber pipe), Corvallis; and Chapman-Woods, Inc. (particle board), Philomath.

The afternoon of Jan. 21, those in attendance will be conducted through Oregon's new all-wood, \$500,000 Forest Research Center.

Wholesale Food Prices Continue On Upswing

NEW YORK — Wholesale food prices, as measured by the Dun & Bradstreet Index, continued on the upswing this week for the third successive week.

At \$6.45 the index compared with \$6.41 last week and was 3.2 percent higher than the year-ago figure of \$6.13. This week's figure equals the 1937-38 high established last Dec. 16, which was the highest for any week since June 21, 1955.

The index represents the total cost at wholesale of one pound each of 31 foods in general use.
