

Pratfalls, Brawls Ball Up L.A. Pugs

LOS ANGELES — The scheduled main attraction was relegated to virtual obscurity at Olympic Auditorium Thursday night, when 4,200 fans went daffy over the post-race goings-on in the pre-round semi-main event.

It was this latter engagement that produced these items:

One fighter was decked between rounds.

At one point, both combatants were on the floor simultaneously.

The referee was attacked in the ring by a spectator.

The matchmaker eventually got into the ring himself to protect the referee.

The fight ended when one of the participants fell off his stool.

The gladiators in this one-ring circus were Senor Alvaro Gutierrez of Mexico and L. C. Morgan of Youngstown, Ohio.

It started out like a fair scrap. Morgan, 140, and Gutierrez, 144½, exchanged some nice deliveries, and the only irregular incident in the early going occurred when Morgan hit Gutierrez low by accident in the first round. He was docked a point.

Both Boxers On Deck

The first hint that this was no ordinary affair came in the fourth, when Morgan delivered a right that left Gutierrez in a horizontal posture. As Morgan stepped back to admire his work, he tripped over his own feet and fell backward to the deck.

The fighters got up, almost simultaneously, just before the bell that ended the round. The

crowd was going looney.

Seconds after the fourth round ended, Morgan stumbled across the ring and let Gutierrez have it with a right to the chin. Gutierrez didn't go down. But the exhausted Morgan did, and had to be carried to his corner.

Morgan came back and managed to score two knockdowns in the fifth, but he was badly spent when it was over.

Mexican Fans Angry

The many Mexican fans in the crowd were enraged at what he'd done to their hero before the fifth round started. As the sound and fury mounted, a burly Latin, unidentified, charged into the ring and started hammering on referee John Thomas. Several ringfighters hopped to the official's defense, and matchmaker George Parnassus joined them.

Debris was flying through the arena when the bell for round six sounded.

But it was all over. Morgan tried to get off his stool, but collapsed before he could take a step. It was a technical knockout for Gutierrez.

Bell Not Answered

Thomas ruled that Morgan had not answered the bell for the sixth round. When this happens, under California rules, the decision reverts to the previous round.

In what was supposed to have been the main event, former lightweight champion Lauro Salas, 128, Los Angeles, lost a split decision to Ernesto Parra, 128½, Mexico City, in 10 rounds.

Stanford Signs Jack Curtice

STANFORD, Calif. — Stanford fans accustomed to hearing their football coach predict victory probably won't have to change the habit.

Cactus Jack Curtice, who moves from the University of Utah to Stanford March 1, is just as likely as not to pick his own team to win, contrary to coach custom.

Curtice, 50, and Stanford came to agreement formally yesterday, as expected, that he would be head football coach for five years.

Salary terms weren't divulged. Sources in Salt Lake City placed them at \$17,000 annually for coaching football and \$2,000 for leadership at a summer boys' camp.

All my life I have yearned for a taste of a big-time operation," Curtice said in Salt Lake City.

He remarked to one of his Utah players, "I have to leave but I kinda thought you would want me to accept the challenge."

He will be the sixth coach in 34 years at Stanford.

He succeeds popular Chuck Taylor, noted for predicting Stanford would win.

Curtice comes to the Pacific Coast Conference after winning 4 Skyline Conference titles in eight years. He'll use about the same wide-open brand of T formation as Taylor. Chuck quit coaching at the end of the 1957 season to become assistant athletic director.

Basilio, Robinson To Sign For March 25 Chicago Bout

CHICAGO — It should be with considerable wariness that Carmen Basilio puts his middleweight title on the line in a rematch with Sugar Ray Robinson March 25 at Chicago Stadium.

The big arena, which will be scaled for an indoor record gate of \$500,000 based on a 22,000 attendance, is the scene of some of Robinson's most dramatic triumphs.

There, on Feb. 24, 1951, he stopped Jake LaMotta in the 11th round to win the 160-pound crown.

There, on April 16, 1952, he defended it by chilling Rocky Graziano in the third round.

There, he climaxed a comeback Dec. 9, 1953, by knocking out Bobo Olson in the fifth round to regain the title.

There, he again regained it May 1, 1957, with a fifth-round kay of Gene Fullmer.

Robbie Loses Title

Basilio dethroned the 37-year-old Robinson last Sept. 27 in Yankee Stadium and vacated his welterweight title.

It was a bruising 15-rounder with Basilio getting a split decision.

But Robinson proved he still could go at top speed for the full distance.

The two will sign fight contracts Thursday in Chicago.

Jim Norris, International Boxing Club president, said, "We were guaranteed \$275,000 from theater-TV and we expect it to go much higher than that."

The fighters each will receive 30 per cent of the proceeds from the gate, television, radio and motion picture rights.

Flying Boxcar Skids To Stop On Foam

MOSES LAKE, Wash. — Unable to get its wheels down, a giant Flying Boxcar skidded to a landing on a foam-coated runway here Thursday night after five crew members had parachuted to safety.

Officials at Larson Air Force base said the pilot and co-pilot, who stayed with the crippled C119, were unhurt. One man who bailed out suffered a broken ankle and all received bruises and scratches, the Air Force said. The plane, attached to McChord Air Force base, near Tacoma, was not seriously damaged.

First Lt. Edwin S. Giddings, 28, the pilot, was credited with making a "beautiful landing" on the 5,000-foot runway which crash crews coated with fire-fighting foam. His co-pilot was 1st Lt. Leonard G. Walker, 24.

Those who parachuted were 1st Lt. John T. Law, 24, T. Sgt. Richard R. Lennemann, 26, S. Sgt. Hubert W. Egert, 24, and airman Leonard R. Wallace, 34, all of Tacoma.

Lennemann broken an ankle, officials said. All five were held overnight at the base hospital.

The transport was on a flight from Pendleton, Ore., to Portland when the main landing gear would not come down, the Air Force said. It was decided to use the long runway here for the emergency landing.
