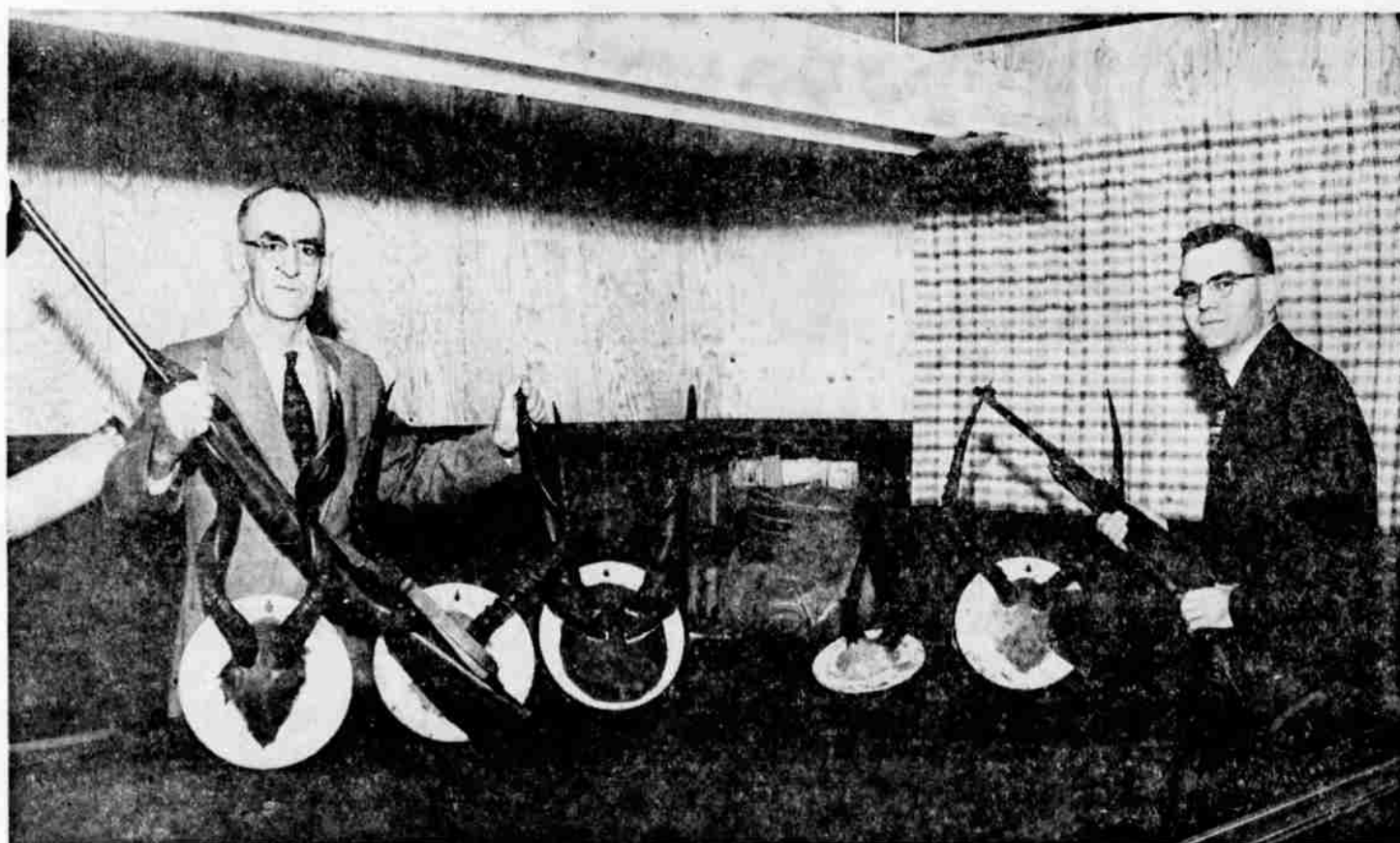
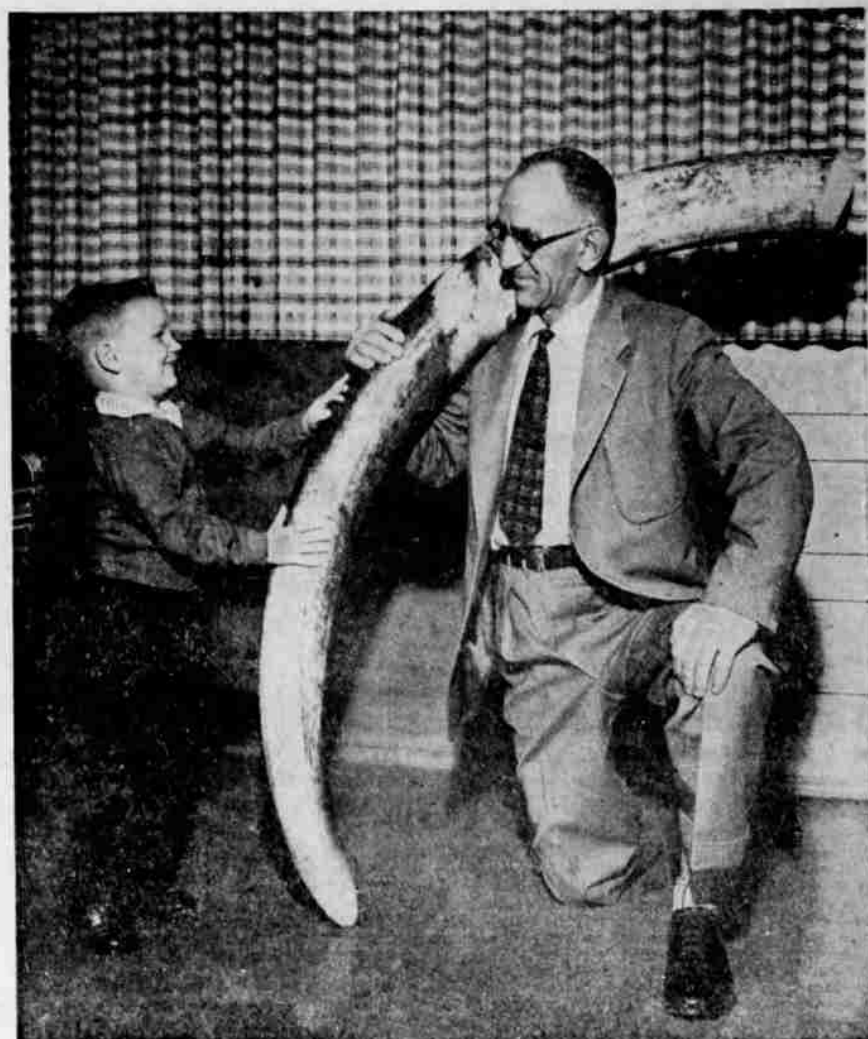

THE BEAUTIFUL HOME OF Mr. and Mrs. William Bailey on South Deer Creek boasts numerous trophies brought back from a safari to Africa by Mr. Bailey and son, Charles O. Bailey, at Roseburg. Bill and Charles were on a 35-day safari and spent 30 days of actual hunting out of Nairobi, Africa. They enjoyed the trip so much, they are already talking of making a second one. They both got 10 tons of animals apiece from their hunting.

MR. AND MRS. WILLIAM BAILEY and Mr. and Mrs. Charles O. Bailey are pictured at the top left with the Charles Baileys' sons, Michael William 4, and Gary Charles, 16-months-old. Bill Bailey is a well-known orchardist and Charles is teacher of the sixth grade at Dixonville. At the top right, Bill shows an 85-pound tusk from a six-ton elephant, which stood 12 feet high, to his admiring grandson, Mike. Center left, Bill and Charles hold their 458 Winchester-African guns and show mounted horns from African animals shot on the safari. In the center is an elephant foot.

BUFFALO horns, an elephant tusk and eland tails are shown by Charles and Bill in the lower left picture. All of the meat from the 20 tons of animals killed by the Baileys was used by natives in the villages close to Nairobi. The eland animals are similar to elk and weigh in the neighborhood of 1500 pounds. In the lower right picture Charles and his two sons, Mike and Gary, are shown with rhinoceros tusks and feet. The feet have been lined with wood and matching wooden tops make them useful ornaments in the game room. Bill and Charles took many pictures during the safari, which are also of much interest to their friends.
