

County Gets Heavy Rain In December

A mass of water deluged the county in December. The evidence appears on the latest report of precipitation figures released by the Douglas County Water Resources Survey.

The precipitation fell mostly during the last half of the month to bring on the high water just before Christmas.

After 15 days of only minor rainfall, all but one station began showing heavy measurements. For the next six days, the downpour continued. By the end of the month,

no station in the county showed less than seven inches of precipitation.

The highest recording was at the Idlewild Park-Rock Creek station which showed 18.26 inches. Three other stations showed more than 15 inches. They were Curtin 15.44, Sutherlin 15.33, Upper Steamboat 15.34 and Reston 15.33.

Roseburg got off relatively well in the downpour with only 9.23 inches. The smallest recording was at Tiller which showed 7.15.

The biggest downpour for any one day came at the Marial station on the West Fork of Cow Creek just west of the county line. On Dec. 20, 3.92 inches fell. Sutherlin Camp had the only other reading over three inches for any one day. On Dec. 20, a total 3.14 inches were recorded.

Eighteen days of two inches or more were recorded over the county.
