Roseburg High School's muscular dystrophy drive will start this Friday and continue through Monday. It replaces the annual March of Dimes campaign.

The drive will be managed by the individual classes with much emphasis on class competition. Each class will have a major project for the drive. The seniors will have a steak banquet on Monday at the Elks club. The sophomores will have a car wash. The freshmen will have the mile of lettuce. These major projects will be supplemented by several minor projects and individual initiative in raising money.

The following are the rules for the drive:

1. There must be no breaking of county, state or city laws.
2. There must be no begging of money. Value must be received for any ticket sold.
3. Stay within Roseburg school district.
4. All projects must close on Monday, Jan. 27. Money may be turned in until Tuesday morning at 8:30.

NORTHFIELD, Minn. — "It's time to give American youth a first hand exploration of science," the president of St. Olaf College asserted this week.

Dr. Clemens M. Grams outlined a two-year program of summer institutes at St. Olaf which he said "might fan a scientific spark in the minds of qualified Midwest high school students."

A college committee will soon accept applications for these institutes. Students will be screened on the basis of aptitude and their high school records.

Atomic Sub Equipped To Fire Polaris

WASHINGTON — The Navy has told the Senate preparedness subcommittee the first atomic submarine equipped to fire the Polaris missile is being built at New London, Conn., by the electric boat division of General Dynamics Corp.

Asst. Secretary Garrison Norton testified at a closed-door session here that the Navy has decided to use, at least for its first Polaris submarines, the same type power plant as in the Nautilus, the first atomic-powered submarine.

The testimony was made public Thursday night after being censored by the Defense Department.

Rivalry Tough In Merit Exams

The intense competition in the National Merit Scholarships tests given recently is evidenced by the results of two seniors at Myrtle Creek High School.

Robert Shafer and Mike Walker scored 95 and 91 per cent respectively in the preliminary tests, but were not named among the 7,500 students to be examined further in final competition. A total of 255,817 seniors over the nation took the preliminaries.

Ten students from Myrtle Creek took the tests which covered verbal and quantitative aspects of academic ability. All 10 placed honorably in the examinations.

The quests of the finalists in the National Merit Scholarship program are 2,000 scholarships to be awarded in the U. S. A. Roseburg youth has achieved the finals.

Local officials report that competition this year for the scholarships was the greatest in the brief history of the program.

First Homemaker Winners Announced By High Schools

Three Senior Girls Named

"Homemakers of Tomorrow" are now being named among the high schools of Douglas County to take part in a state contest for which stakes are \$1,500 and a trip to Washington, D. C.

Already named are Phyllis Fasel of Oakland High, Linda Brookhart of Drain, Beverly McMurry of Canyonville high and Marjorie Bowker of Roseburg High. Others will be announced as they are named.

Got High Scores

These girls received the highest scores in written examinations on homemaking knowledge and attitudes given to senior girls in the graduating class in December.

Their examination papers will be entered in competition to name the state's candidate for the title of all-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. They will also be considered for runner-up awards to the state. For their initial triumphs, the girls received award pins.

The national winner in the fourth annual "Betty Crocker Search" conducted among 327,000 young women in 11,800 of the nation's public, private and parochial high schools will be announced April 17.

To Award \$106,000

General Mills is sponsor of the program designed to assist schools in education for home and family living. A total of \$106,000 in scholarships will be awarded this year.

Each state "homemaker" will receive a \$1,500 scholarship and an educational trip with her school adviser to Washington, D. C., colonial Williamsburg, Va., and New York City. A \$500 scholarship will go to the second-ranking girl in each state. The school of the state winner receives a set of encyclopedias.

The scholarship of the all-American homemaker will be increased to \$5,000.

RHS Students To Get Shots Of Polio Vaccine

Polio vaccinations will be given to Roseburg Senior High students Thursday in upper health room 1, above the gym.

Forms applying for the shots were given to the students during their physical education classes and were also available in the gym lobby for students not taking P.E. The forms must be signed by either parents or guardian.

Any student who had polio shots in 1954 or 1955 should have another booster.

The vaccine is administered free of charge by the Douglas County Health Department.

PTA Told We Already Have Aid To Education

EUGENE — People who say they are opposed to federal aid to education overlook the fact that it already exists, Jennelle Moorhead, vice-president of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers said here.

Miss Moorhead, who was the only Oregon representative at an educational workshop in the nation's capital the past weekend, said she learned that "tremendous amounts" of federal money already are being spent for aid to education.

But, she said, it is being spent through so many divisions of the government that it is "next to impossible to estimate how much money is being spent overall."

She said delegates at the conference did not take a stand on the issue of federal aid to education. Rather, they were to take the information gained back to their organizations for possible action.

THE ANSWER TO SPUTNIK?

President Eisenhower has called for a four-year, 1.6 billion-dollar program to spur science education for the missile and satellite age. Newchart, above, shows how the money is to be spent. Drafted by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, the seven-point program allows wide latitude to the states in the spending of the funds. Even so, indications are that the proposal faces heavy going in Congress— from those who oppose all Federal aid to education, from those who say the plan does not allow Washington enough control over the states, and from those who claim the program fails to meet the nation's needs.

HOW 225 MILLION DOLLARS WOULD BE SPENT IN FIRST YEAR:

- One billion dollars in Federal funds to be spent over four-year period
- plus 550-600 million dollars in state matching funds. States to have wide control at all levels.
- \$20 MILLION — To finance aptitude tests of students in 7th-9th grades.
- \$8 MILLION — To improve student counseling and higher education guidance.
- \$12 MILLION — To apportion 10,000 scholarships among the states.
- \$5 MILLION — To award graduate fellowships to future teachers.
- \$50 MILLION — To establish and operate foreign language training centers.
- \$5 MILLION — To obtain more and better science teachers, improve science equipment.
- \$50 MILLION — To National Science Foundation in programs assisting science education.
