

Indians Down Coquille, 69-45

10 Players Join In Score As Tribe Wins 6th In Row

Playing one of their top games of the season to date, the Roseburg Indians downed the Coquille Red Devils in a non-league basketball game Saturday on the Roseburg floor by a 69-45 tally.

In winning their sixth straight game and their ninth of the year against three losses, Roseburg received scoring help from 10 of the 11 players Coach Bill Harper inserted into the lineup, with the 16 points of Larry Sloan topping them all.

The Red Devils made a close game of it in the first half, but the well-rounded scoring of the Indians, along with the sharp backboard work, began to tell in the second half and the Indians slowly pulled away for the win.

Both clubs hit well from the field, with Roseburg hitting on 26 out of 54 attempts from the field for a .481 average, while Coquille cashed in on 20 out of 43 and a .465 average.

Sloan Leads Attack

With Larry Sloan dropping in nine of his 16 points in the first quarter, Roseburg moved out to a 18-13 lead and increased it to 37-26 at halftime. Jim Jarvis was the main gun for the Red Devils as he collected 12 of the Coquille first half points. Sloan ended the half with 13 points.

After taking a 13-7 first quarter lead, Roseburg held Coquille to only nine points in each of the final three quarters to take the easy win. Halftime score favored the Indians 25-16.

With Ed Lorenzen hitting for six points in the third period, the Indians hit for 15 points, against the nine for Coquille to hold a 40-25 playing going into the final period.

Millers Defeat Tribe In Wrestling Matches

The Springfield Millers more than made up for the loss tagged on them the last time they met Roseburg, by trimming the Indians, 34-6, in matches held Saturday on the Miller mats.

Roseburg snapped a 24-match winning streak the last time the two teams met, but were able to pick up only two decisions out of the 12 matches this time.

Only winners for the Indians came in the 105 and 129-pound classes, where the two Walter brothers, Frank and Gene, picked up identical 6-0 decisions. Frank Walter in the 105-pound weight trimmed Sid Martin and Gene Walter in the 129-pound division beat Keith Barnes.

In winning, Springfield only picked up two pins, by Leroy Williams over Bill Wennerberg in the 135-pound class, and by Jim Florin over Pat Wilson in the 156-pound class.

The top match of the meet came in the 140-pound class, where Scott Gibson of the Millers edged Bill White of the Indians by a close 2-1 tally, both boys getting their points in the second period. Another top-flight match was in the 122-pound division where Charles Abshire of Springfield took a 6-4 decision over Charles Jones of the Indians.

Springfield also took the measure of the Roseburg jayvee team by a closer 29-15 score. Roseburg took two of the matches by pins, against three for Springfield, but managed to pick up only one more decision and a draw.

Pins for Roseburg came in the 147-pound class, as Gilbert Langhoff pinned Mervin Brown, and in the 105-pound weight where Joe Griffen of the Indians pinned Ron McAdams.

Top jayvee bout came in the 97-pound class, where Alan Mortensen of Roseburg and Olie Ivey of the Millers wrestled to a 2-2 standoff.

BERKELEY, Calif. — The Oregon State Beavers suffered their first Pacific Coast Conference basketball defeat Saturday, going down before the University of California, 61-51.

The victory tied Cal with UCLA for the PCC lead with a record of 5-1. OSC now is 2-1.

The game was pierced by whistle-blowing as 36 points were made from the free throw line. Three men fouled out of the game, five others had four fouls each and four more had three.

The Bear built up a six-point lead in the last eight minutes of the closely fought contest and OSC had to foul to gain possession of the ball.

Dave Gamber, the league's defending scoring champ, paced all scorers with 15 points while Cal's Al Buch came through with 14.
