

District 5-A-1 Start Features Basketball Slate

Opening league play in District 5-A-1 basketball action highlights this week's Douglas County hoop play, in which a total of 17 games are on tap for the 16 high schools. Also scheduled are two wrestling matches.

With a six-game winning streak going for it and a record of nine wins and three losses for the year, Roseburg opens league play Friday and Saturday nights against two of the top 10 teams in the state. On Friday, the Indians will travel to meet the Springfield Millers, then return home for a game against number-one rated, South Eugene, on Saturday night.

Umpqua Valley basketball action will roll into its second big week with six games on the schedule. League-leading Douglas and Riddle will put their perfect 2-0 records on the line Tuesday in a tune-up for the all-important clash Friday night between the loop leaders. On Tuesday, the Trojans will be at home to the Glendale Wildcats, who dropped their first two league contests, while Riddle will travel to meet the Sutherlin Bulldogs, 1-1 in league play. Marathon Bowling Record Falls Again

EUGENE (AP) — The newest claimant to the marathon bowling record is Dick Tuttle, 22, University of Oregon freshman. He put on 60 hours and 33 minutes of bowling before quitting after his 516th consecutive game Sunday afternoon. Tuttle said he surpassed the old record when he rolled his 502d game.

He used both hands in an attempt to prevent blisters, but wound up with blisters on both thumbs. He averaged 129.5 points. This and other recent marathon efforts caused Dick Phipps, a Salem bowling alley manager, to announce plans for a marathon bowling contest.

Phipps said it will be held at his Salem alleys, starting at midnight next Memorial Day, with the entries limited to 16.

Maturity Race Slated Saturday At Santa Anita

ARCADIA, Calif. (AP) — The richest race in the world for 4-year-olds will be run Saturday at Santa Anita.

It is the Maturity at a mile and one quarter and is expected to gross \$160,000. It will bring together two of the top performers in the 3-year-old ranks in 1957, Round Table and Promised Land. Travis M. Kerr's Round Table has won 13 of his last 14 starts. Last year he won \$689,334. He won galloping in the \$27,300 San Fernando Stakes, his most recent start at Santa Anita.

Promised Land, owned by Mrs. Ethel D. Jacobs, won his last start here, too, the \$12,000 El Peco Ranch Handicap, in which he was timed at 1:47 3/5 for a mile and one-eighth.

Motors brought up the rear in 2:21, with 4 teams using only 2:10; State Highway and Idle Hour together with F & J Loggers and Roseburg Lions were last in the Cascade at 2:19.

Governor Wants Power To Extend Hunting Season; Collins New President Of OWF

CORVALLIS (AP) — The governor of Oregon should be given authority to extend a hunting season when fire conditions delay opening of the season, Gov. Robert Holmes believes.

"There is a defect in the law. Though a governor can delay the hunting season, he cannot extend it," Holmes told the Oregon Wildlife Federation Saturday.

Last year Holmes announced he was delaying the deer season because of dry forests, but then after sudden heavy rains he allowed the season to open on schedule. This caused considerable confusion, he said.

Holmes also urged a comprehensive conservation program for fish and game to plan for Oregon's growing population in the future.

Charles C. Collins, Roseburg, was elected president. Collins has been executive vice president, a position which will be filled later. Named secretary was Jack Williams, Portland. Roshal M. Groves, Lebanon, was re-elected treasurer. The new officers take office in June.

Other speakers took up the question of game law enforcement and could not agree on

whether a good job was being done.

Judges Will Lenient
Jack Williams of Portland said judges are too lenient. He said a recent survey showed \$100 was the largest fine imposed last season for a hunter with an untaged deer.

Other speakers, however, said the courts were doing a good job. William Morse, Portland, said more than 93 per cent of the 2,694 persons arrested for game law violations in 1956 were convicted.

A resolution at the closing session Sunday called for addition of more lands to the waterfowl refuge in the Klamath Basin.

The resolution supports the federal Fish and Wildlife Service recommendations of 1956 for the area. This includes opening of 10,000 acres of land at Tule Lake to homesteading.

Land Addition Eyed

It also calls for addition to the refuge of land already owned by the government at Tule Lake, Lower Klamath Lake, Upper Klamath Lake and Hank's Marsh area. It also asks acquisition of 3,171 acres of private land in the Upper Klamath Lake and Agency Marsh area.

The federation opposed a proposed Nez Perce Dam or any other high dam on the Snake River downstream from the Salmon or Imnaha rivers.
