

Garden Clubs

GLENDALE

The Glendale Federated Garden Club, at the request of the school board, has worked out plans for landscaping and beautifying the high school grounds.

Club representatives met with the school board last week to report on the work. They believed plans, drawn to scale, of proposed plantings, and brought estimated cost schedules for purchase of necessary shrubs.

Two cost schedule sheets had been prepared, one for shrubs of a minimum size and one for larger shrubs which would include and match some available at a modest fee from a local source. The estimated cost of the very small shrubs was about \$125, and the estimated cost for the larger ones was \$200.

The garden club committee, which included Mrs. Homer Edson, chairman, Mrs. Howard Martin, Mrs. Tom Patterson, Mrs. C. Smith, and Mrs. Ed Harris, and the board discussed the ideas presented.

The board accepted the plans tentatively upon the provision that the garden club attempt to raise money for their purchase. The board expressed appreciation for the careful and excellent work of the committee but pointed out that the school budget, pared to the minimum last year before it was passed, left no margin for purchase of beautification materials.

They promised the club every cooperation, however, and Superintendent Norder said he believed it could be arranged to have some of the high school boys help with the planting when purchase has been made. School mechanical drawing students had previously cooperated with the club in preparing of the scale drawings of the building.

The garden club decided to make procurement of the landscaping materials a community project, since it does not have sufficient funds of its own to do the work.

farm forest acts

Camas Valley is becoming quite a forestry-minded community, with many of its residents engaged in the practice of sound forest management. Many of its residents have discovered that forestry is a worthwhile useful fact, not a fancy.

Since 1952, inroads have been made in forestry in this beautiful little valley surrounded by mountain ranges. Perhaps it's the mountain air that gives its forest owners that additional zip to plant thousands of trees and prune and trim their growing samples of timber. At least they are getting the job done in a workmanlike manner and can be proud of their achievements.

Juan Schwendener was one of the early ones to plant and culture Christmas trees and salvage snags on his tree farm. Unfortunately, fire swept in and ravaged part of the land. Even so, he is planning to reforest this portion. Fire is something that all landowners, both large and small, must often contend with, as it respects the rights of no one.

SEVERAL YEARS AGO Bob Wheeler undertook a commercial thinning on his place, which has increased the growth rate of the remaining trees on his tree farm. At present he's planning to prune crop trees in his pre-commercial stands. He's also headed for a planting project to bring unproductive fields back into the production of trees.

Stewart Neely and his able wife are also among the earliest ones to practice pruning, shearing and stump culture on Christmas trees on their woodland on Camas Mountain. For five or six years they have been engaged in an industrious program of producing high quality trees which they market annually in a neighboring state. Their tree farm is probably one of the most outstanding of its type in western Oregon and shows the results of methodical and persistent good forest management.

Louis Papst, who has been mentioned in a previous article, is another industrious Christmas tree farmer. During the past year he enclosed his cultured trees with a deer fence to protect his investment.

ANOTHER FOREST landowner who has recently entered the field of producing quality Christmas trees is Ted Heilman, long-time resident of the valley. With the assistance of two able people, he is engaged in an intensive program of pruning, shearing and stump culture on his Camas Mountain woodland. In addition, he has recently completed the planting of some 25,000 trees on another area on the valley floor.

One youthful Christmas tree grower, whose name escapes me, sold cultured trees for the first time this year in conjunction with another producer of cultured trees from another area. Both realized returns far in excess of the usual uncultured wild trees, indicating the worth of culturing.

While Christmas trees dominate the forestry picture in Camas Valley, where nature has been very prolific in its production of the much sought-after lowland white or grand fir, other phases of forest management are in practice there also. Furthermore, excellent Camas Valley is making excellent progress in this field, other sections of the county are making good progress too. Ike Wants Union Finances Made Public, Report

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP) — Secretary of Labor Mitchell Monday said President Eisenhower will ask Congress for legislation requiring unions to make their financial records public.

This is part of a "middle of the road" labor program which the President will propose, arranged by the Clark County Republican Central Committee.

The President's proposal will call for penalties for unions which refuse to disclose their records on handling of union funds and pension programs. These penalties would include the loss of the union's tax-free status and loss of certification as bargaining agents by the National Labor Relations Board, he said.

Another point of the program will require union officers to be elected every four years by secret ballot, Mitchell said.

Discussing the nation's economic outlook, Mitchell said he looked for improvement by mid-summer. Contributing factors, he said, will be a 5½-million-dollar increase in missile and defense spending, continuation of the highway construction program, and more home construction.

Mitchell speaks Monday night at a Republican \$25-a-plate fund raising dinner Hudson's Bay High School here.

Northwest Civil Defense Heads Map Program

SPOKANE (AP) — Civil defense directors from four states met here Monday to map the groundwork for a detailed program of survival in the event of an enemy attack.

"State lines would vanish in the event of an emergency," said Charles Halls, Washington state civil defense director.

"We're trying to determine how many evacuees from a state in Washington could be absorbed by north Idaho," the food supplies necessary, what routes to take depending on the atomic fallout pattern and the advance warning, if any."

More than 20 CD representatives from Washington, Idaho, Oregon and Montana attended the meeting. Halls said details of the survival plan would be completed by the state office after the Spokane huddle.

Halls said the Spokane meeting was part of a nationwide program sponsored by the Civil Defense Administration to formulate mutual aid plans among neighboring states.

Industrial Consumers Get Back Cutoff Power

PORTLAND (AP) — Pacific Northwest industrial customers have gotten back 180,000 kilowatts of interruptible power that had been cut off by the Bonneville Administration Nov. 1.

Interruptible power is that sold with the agreement that it can be terminated in case of a power shortage.

Water supplies in reservoirs behind the region's power dams have been built up by precipitation and above normal temperatures.

Bonneville said restoration of the cutoff is effective until at least Jan. 31.

Crushing Of All Religion In Russia Urged By Pravda

MOSCOW (AP) — The newspaper Ukraine Pravda, official Communist Party organ for that Soviet republic, said Monday that while religion persists in the Soviet Union primarily as a curiosity, it remains a problem and must be stamped out.

Religion persists among "unstable and uneducated" elements, the paper said, and anti-religious lectures alone are not enough to combat it.

"All the forces of ideological influence must be mobilized in a struggle against religion—the cinema, radio, television and class and individual discussions," the newspaper said.

Some of the restrictions on religion were relaxed in the Soviet Union after the death of Stalin in 1953, but atheism remained the official doctrine of the ruling Communist party. In recent months the party has returned to the offensive against religion.
