WE WOULD like to see college football conversions worth one point when you can kick them, and 0-6 on the scoreboard when the try fails. In fact, if two-point conversions are going to be the law, let's make the dropkick worth, say, two points.

North Salem rose in the rankings but did not achieve the runner-up spot. That went to Grant of Portland, which has won nine straight games without a loss. North Salem has an 11-1 record.

Calhoun KO'D By Spider Webb In Fourth Round Surprise End

SAN FRANCISCO — One mistake and a right-hand smash have moved Spider Webb toward the top of the middleweight boxing picture Tuesday.

Aggressive Rory Calhoun, the muscular 160-pounder from White Plains, N.Y., made the mistake and Webb took full advantage of it to whip home a stunningly-timed punch that produced a fourth round knockout.

Calhoun had knocked down the 158½ pound Chicagoan for counts of 9 in both the first and second rounds of their Cow Palace battle.

Then came a more even third and the decisive fourth.

"I thought I hurt him and I walked into a punch," Calhoun ruefully related in his dressing room. "I knew he was waiting for a mistake, and I made it," he said.

Webb, noted more as a boxer than a puncher, caught Calhoun coming in with a perfect right to the jaw and the favored Rory went down for a count of nine.

Baylor Hits Below Season Average In Win

SPOKANE — Giant Jean Claude Lefebvre held Elgin Baylor's scoring below his season average Monday night as Seattle University stormed to a 75-53 basketball victory over Gonzaga.

The 7 foot 3 Frenchman spent 25 minutes checking Baylor and was credited with a great defensive effort. Baylor scored "only" 24 points, nearly seven below his season average.

Baylor, ranked third in the nation in scoring, came through with seven fieldgoals, his lowest output of the season. He scored on 10 of 12 free throw attempts. Lefebvre scored seven points.

The Chiefs led 37-22 at the intermission.

Swift Norm Trauba paced Gonzaga with 17 points.

British Columbia Games Invite Stars

VANCOUVER, B. C. — The world's finest track and field athletes have been invited to participate in British Columbia's Centennial Games here June 6-7.

Four-minute milers from both sides of the Iron Curtain have been sent special invitation to run a "centennial mile." Officials hope it will surpass the famous "miracle mile" of the 1954 Empire Games at Vancouver, in which Britain's Roger Bannister beat the then world record holder John Landy of Australia.

The invitational list includes England's Derek Ibbotson, present holder of the mile record with 3:57.8, Brian Hewson and Gordon Pirie; Czechoslovakia's Stanislav Jurjwirth, world 1,500-meter record holder; Poland's Stefan Lawandowski; the United States' Don Bowden, only U. S. miler to crack the four-minute barrier; Ira Murcum, William Williams, Bobby Morrow, Dave Sime, Charles Dumas, Tom Courtney and Bob Gutowski; Australia's Merv Lincoln; Herb Elliott, Albert Thomas, Allen Lawrence and Dave Stephens; Germany's Manfred German; Ireland's Ron Delany and Belgium's Roger Moens.

One of the best "names" invited is Vladimir Kuts, Russia's world-record-shattering distance runner. The Australian team has also been invited to compete in a Vancouver police sports meet and train at the Empire Stadium on their way to compete in the British Empire Games at Wales, later in June.

PALO ALTO, Calif. — The Oregon State Beavers chalked up their third straight Pacific Coast Conference basketball victory here Monday night by dumping the Stanford Indians 68-59.

The win moved the Beavers into third place while the Indians moved into the conference cellar, tying with Washington State with one win and five losses.

The Beavers, trailing 7-6 early in the first half, sank seven straight shots from the floor, including three by Dave Gambee, to take a 20-10 lead. Oregon State led 43-25 at halftime.

Gambee and Ken Nanson were high scorers for OSC with 19 tallies each, while Mike Tipton paced the Indians with 13 points.

Playing the par 72 Tijuana Country Club course, Harrison did it with rounds of 71-71-69-69-280, or eight strokes under par for the distance.
