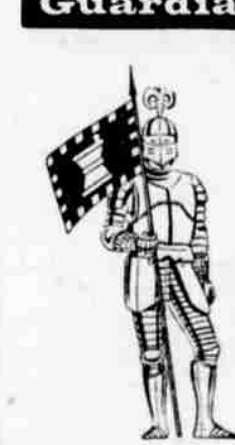

## Recession No Longer Mild; Effects Being Felt More And More In Big Industries

NEW YORK — The dull statistics which record a business recession, but cannot mirror its human drama, rolled out again this week as a subtle change came over the phraseology of economists and government leaders commenting on it.

It was called a recession. The word "mild," which had prefixed previous descriptions, was being dropped. So was the phrase "breathing spell." Obviously, a recession is a recession, and its "mildness" depends upon how it affects you.

It isn't mild to the railroad industry. A steel industry with more than one-third of its capacity standing idle isn't suffering from mildness. Nor is the situation mild to workers laid off in auto, aircraft and other industries.

**Evidence Everywhere**  
Evidence of a capital goods recession was everywhere, although it remained an interesting point that nondurable goods industries were doing quite well. Department store sales in the latest week rose 1 per cent above last year.

However, freight carloadings ran 16 per cent under a year ago, steel operations proceeded at around 60 per cent of capacity, auto output was off around 40,000 cars from 1957 and coal production at 8,705,000 tons compared with 10,250,000 tons a year ago.

Heavy construction contracts awarded so far this year run 37 per cent under the same period last year. The three biggest producers again cut the price of copper, which is now at its lowest level in nearly five years.

Various monthly statistics also emphasized the existence of a recession. **Unemployment High**  
Unemployment in December was the highest for that month since 1945 and the highest for any month in three years. Both indus-

## Retail Sales Up Over That Of '57

NEW YORK — Dun & Bradstreet reported last week that the volume of retail sales over the U. S. during the week ending Wednesday was "one or two points above" that of the corresponding 1957 week.

Total dollar sales were estimated at unchanged to 4 per cent higher than a year ago on the basis of spot checks. The trend was attributed to "continued clearance sales promotions."

The weekly Dun and Bradstreet survey showed most noticeable gains in purchases of linens, men's apparel and furniture. Also listed above last year's sales were sales of linens, major appliances, television sets, women's cloths, coats, accessories and dresses, lingerie and children's clothing.

Food sales remained at about the same level of the previous week, the survey showed. Dun & Bradstreet regional estimates of sales compared with 1957 included: Pacific Coast down 3 to up 1 per cent.

## One Post Office Urged For Coos Bay, N. Bend

WASHINGTON — The cities of Coos Bay and North Bend ought to forget local pride and approve a unified post office operation, Rep. Norblad (R-Ore) said Monday.

He asked the Post Office Department to look into feasibility of establishing the single office to serve the two cities and adjacent territory.

Norblad said it was "hard to understand why the federal government should be penalized by additional costs of maintaining two post offices."

The department, he said, now is negotiating for construction of a new post office in North Bend.

"One main post office for both communities with substations in Coos Bay and North Bend could afford similar postal service with very material savings to the government," Norblad said.

He noted that the two communities had rejected proposals that they consolidate into a single community, but said they should be able to forget local pride so far as the post office is concerned.

Norblad has been a frequent advocate of consolidations or production changes to increase post office economy.

## New Training Centers Foreseen

PORTLAND — The head of a legislative interim committee on education says the time may come when some present functions of Oregon Technical Institute are spread to a projected group of vocational schools throughout the state.

State Sen. Don Husband, Eugene Republican, said here recently that Oregon Tech does a fine job of teaching in technical fields.

Some day, however, he said, the present vocational departments at OTI may be handled by a network of new training centers which Oregon would establish throughout the state.

His remarks followed a comment by a union leader that vocational training should be handled through labor apprentice programs rather than by state institutions.

James Marr, executive secretary of the Oregon Labor Council, told the committee that OTI now is spending money on fields in which it should not teach.

Another labor leader, Jess Bell, said that he feels Oregon Tech is filling a great need.

Bell is a vice president of the state Labor Council. Husband said that when the committee holds its next meeting at Salem in February it will consider the functions of community colleges.
