

## Northwest States Increase Proportion Needed For New Federally Supported Roads

WASHINGTON — The three Pacific Northwest States have estimated their portion of the national interstate super-highway system will cost \$1,573,000,000, up 39 per cent from an estimate of two years ago.

At the same time the three states have added 72 miles to their estimate of roads which will be included in the national system. The new total is 1,941 miles.

The sharp increase in cost estimates was in conformity with a national trend, in which an average 37 per cent increase was noted, compared with the 39 per cent for Washington, Oregon and Idaho.

The old national estimates added up to \$27,600,000,000; the new figure is \$37,600,000,000.

The cost estimates—after approval by Congress—are important because future allocations of federal funds to the states will be based upon them. The federal government pays 90 per cent of the cost of the interstate program. The Bureau of Public Roads

cautions that the new estimates are not strictly comparable to the old. In some cases, mileage of the interstate system within a state has been altered and standards changed.

In the old estimate, Idaho figured it would need 127 million in federal state funds to build 559 miles of highways. It now estimates a need of 277 million for 611 miles.

Oregon's comparable figures two years ago were 727 miles and 378 million and currently are 717 miles and 626 million, showing a slight decrease in mileage but a sharp rise in costs.

Washington officials estimated they needed 554 million to build 592 miles of road; now have increased it to 670 million for 613 miles.

Cost estimates of eight of the 45 other states were at least double; four showed declines in their cost figures.

### Morgan Asks FPC To Not Grant Gas Rate Raise

SALEM — Public Utilities Commissioner Howard Morgan announced Tuesday he has asked the Federal Power Commission to reject the request by Pacific Northwest Pipeline Corp. for an increase in natural gas rates.

He said it would cost Oregon gas consumers \$700,000 a year, of which \$500,000 would be paid by industries.

## Lane DA Gives Magazine Dealers 10-Day Ultimatum

EUGENE — The district attorney's office has given magazine dealers here 10 days in which to remove alleged indecent and lewd publications from newsstands, or face possible prosecution.

In letters to magazine dealers, mailed Monday, Deputy Dist. Atty. George Woodruff said that we are genuinely concerned with the effect such indecent publications have on young people of the community.

He asked the dealers to "measure if you can, against the small profit to the storeowner, the effect of such publication with a easy reach of a borderline abnormal individual who may find the additional needed stimulus to make him a real menace to your community."

Woodruff said his office is prepared to prosecute those who "wish to ignore the simple dictates of decency as embodied in the law."

The letter did not specify which magazines the district attorney's office considers indecent. Woodruff, however, indicated they fall in the class sold as "men's magazines."

More than 275 of the letters were sent, according to Woodruff. They went to hotels, drug stores, news dealers and others known to sell magazines.

**NET EARNINGS UP**  
PORTLAND — The First National Bank of Portland has reported net earnings of \$5,389,885 last year, the third highest in the 93 years of the bank.

That amounted to \$3.37 per share, reported President C. B. Stephenson at the annual stockholders' meeting. He said it was 2.2 per cent less than the all-time reported for 1956.

The accident occurred near the Gervais SP depot. The force of the impact sent the car against the depot building.

Jack Earnest, Portland, head brakeman on the train, said the car was rolling and Mrs. Colby was trying to get out at the time of the crash. She was traveling alone.

It was the second fatal traffic death in Marion County during 1958.

### Arizona Man Purchases Woahink Lake Lodge

FLORENCE, Ore. — Aaron Hunter of Globe, Ariz., has purchased a lodge on Woahink Lake in one of the largest local real estate transactions in recent years.

The price was reported to be in the neighborhood of \$100,000 for the 57 acres with 3,800 feet of lake frontage, lodge and caretaker's cottage.

Mrs. Allie M. Kelley of Houston, Tex., was the seller.

## Strikers Ruled Eligible To Get Unemployment

SALEM — More than a hundred men who went on strike at the Fir-Tex plant at St. Helens in 1955 are eligible for unemployment benefits, the state Unemployment Compensation Commission ruled Tuesday.

The decision upheld the recommendation of its chief referee, Aubrey Tussing. It was a 2 to 1 decision with L. O. Arens opposing and Mrs. Cecelia Galey and William A. Calahan favoring the award of benefits.

The decision says that 103 strikers, who were represented by the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union and who filed claims in the fall of 1955 and in succeeding months, should get jobless payments.

Tussing had held the men were eligible after the company replaced them with new men.

About 300 went on strike, but many got jobs and did not apply for compensation.

The employer has 30 days to appeal the commission's ruling.
