

## Arsenal Of Prohibition Era Bared By House Job

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Benjamin Halicki, 39, broke through a secret compartment Sunday while repairing a staircase in his mother's North Philadelphia home.

Inside the compartment was an arsenal of 60 pistols and hundreds of rounds of ammunition which police said may have been placed there by gangsters during the Prohibition Era. Along with the guns and ammunition were six deep sea fishing rods wrapped in a Philadelphia newspaper dated May 24, 1922.

Det. Inspector George Kronbar said the bullets were of various caliber and included wooden dum dum types. He said some of the weapons were loaded.
