

# Yoncalla Blasts Elkton At Mid-Point Of B Race; Hornets Win Scoring Bee

Yoncalla took a stronger grasp on first place in the Douglas B League basketball race Tuesday night, downing second-place Elkton, the defending state champs, 46-29. The Eagles remain undefeated in the chase.

In another league game, three players from each team scored in double figures as Camas Valley dropped the host Canyonville Tigers, 73-62. Byron Baker had 26 points for the winners and John Patterson 21 for Canyonville.

In a non-league game, unattached Canyonville Bible Academy traveled to Days Creek to defeat the Wolves, 59-40.

## Hornets 73, Tigers 62

Points went through the hoop at better than four-a-minute Tuesday night at Canyonville as Camas Valley put down the host Tigers, 73-62. The loss dropped the Tigers into the Douglas B League basketball cellar.

Six players hit double figures in scoring, and both teams made better than 40 per cent of their field shots good. In the end, it was too much rebounding and height for the game Tigers.

Byron Baker's 26 points for the Hornets was nearly matched by John Patterson's 21 for Canyonville. Bob Burns had 19 and Paul Parrel 13 for Canyonville and Ray Looney 17 and John Wheeler 16 for Camas Valley.

Camas Valley got the range early and jumped into a 16-8 lead, with Baker making six and Looney five. Canyonville was held to two field goals.

**Hornets Ahead At Half**  
Canyonville got into the game in the second as Burns came through with six of his points and Patterson with five. Halftime ended with the Hornets ahead, 31-23.

Both teams took off at high speeds again in the third quarter, with Baker going wild, scoring five field goals and a free throw for 11 points. Patterson countered with seven for Canyonville as Camas Valley boosted the margin slightly to 51-40.

Had the fourth quarter happened earlier, the game might have been even wilder, with 43 points being scored by the two clubs—22 for Canyonville and 21 for Camas Valley. Wheeler of Camas Valley and Burns of Canyonville each scored nine points. Patterson had nine and Baker seven.

Canyonville managed to pull down 39 rebounds during the free-shooting contest, but that total was nearly doubled by the Hornets.

The Hornets made good on 31 of 70 shots for 44 per cent and Can-

yonville 22 of 51 for 43 per cent. Canyonville converted 18 of 34 free throw attempts as the Hornets were whistled down 22 times. Canyonville fouled 11 times, and Camas Valley canned 11 of 17 free shots.

The preliminary was won by the Canyonville junior varsity, 31-26. Chuck Oeils had 15 points for the winners, and Jim Hammett 10 for the losers.

## Eagles 47, Elkton 29

Rebounding from a 9-3 first quarter deficit, the Yoncalla Eagles took their fourth straight Douglas B League basketball victory Tuesday, with a 47-29 win over Elkton in a game played on the winner's court.

The Elks raced off to an early lead, behind the six points of Dave Compton, but Yoncalla hit for 14 big points in the second period to take a 17-15 lead at halftime. Jim Proebstal provided most of the Eagle second period points as he gathered eight of his 13 for the night.

With Yoncalla using a tight zone defense in the second half, Elkton was unable to break loose for any close shots and the Eagles went out in front by a 29-21 tally at the end of the third quarter. During

third quarter action the Elks lost the services of high-scoring Ralph Beal on five fouls, although the tight Eagle defense had allowed him only three points for the night.

## Elks Foul

Having to scrape to gain possession of the ball during the fourth period, Elkton was forced to foul, and before the game ended, lost two more players through fouls. Using a full court press, Yoncalla made the most of it by dropping in easy layups to run its total to 18 points in the period, against the eight for Elkton.

Neither club could hit from the free throw line as Yoncalla cashed in on only 17 out of 34 and Elkton on 15 out of 37. The Eagles were whistled down 20 times to 22 for the Elks.

Leading both clubs in the scoring column was 6-2 Jim Proebstal with 13 points, only player on either team to hit in the double figures. Bill Snider also chipped in with nine for the Eagles. Compton with nine points was high for Elkton.

Jayvee action saw Yoncalla take a close 24-20 win over the Elkton juniors, with Cliff Emory and Ron Revelle both hitting for nine points. Jerry Ross and Bradley Loveless were high for Elkton with seven each. Halftime score favored Yoncalla, 15-11.

## CBA Surprises Wolves, 59-40

Canyonville Bible Academy pulled the upset of the season in B school basketball action Tuesday night, with a 59-40 victory over the Days Creek Wolves in a non-league game played on the Days Creek floor.

Getting 22 points from Richard Sterling, CBA had little trouble in disposing of the taller Days Creek squad as it rolled to a 16-10 first quarter lead and increased it to 37-17 at halftime. Alfred Copeland, with seven of his eight points for the night in the first quarter, and Sterling with 11 points in the second period, were the main men for the winners in the opening half.

Hitting 320 from the field in the game, CBA collected another 15 tallies in the third panel, while the best that Days Creek could do was nine. Silas Richards nabbed six points for Canyonville to lead them in the period, which ended 32-26 for Canyonville Bible Academy.

With most of the reserves playing the fourth quarter, the winners managed to collar only seven points against the 14 for Days Creek, but the damage was already done.

Days Creek hit only 240 from the field and on only eight out of 21 from the free throw line in one of their poorest shooting nights of the year.

David McMurray followed Sterling in the scoring column for Canyonville with 13 points, while George Williams nabbed 10 for Days Creek.

## PCC To Meet In Los Angeles To Wrangle On 'Aid' Problem

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The troubled Pacific Coast Conference will examine new possible cures for an old headache — financial aid to athletes — at a San Francisco meeting March 14-16.

Announcing the dates Tuesday, commissioner Victor O. Schmidt said faculty athletic representatives and athletic directors will attempt to formulate a new program which would take effect Sept. 1.

Prof. Donald Wollett of the University of Washington heads a committee assigned to draft a three-point program.

Under the first, each school could award a limited number of grants to athletes, to cover tuition and subsistence, in return for a certain amount of work. Scholastic qualifications required for such aid would be somewhat higher than at present. No off-campus jobs would be permitted.

The second point would provide that an athlete not scholastically eligible for this aid could continue to receive such aid as is permitted under present rules. But the athlete would be counted in the limited number of students permitted to receive aid at each school.

Under the third point, a formula would be developed, if feasible, to permit fewer hours of
