

Top-Ranked West Virginia And NY Teams Unbeaten

Top-ranked West Virginia and untested St. John's of Brooklyn are the only clubs still unbeaten in major college basketball, but the situation might be different were it not for injury and illness.

The Mountaineers and Redmen might have the company of Cincinnati, Kansas or Kansas State if two or three players had been able to stay healthy.

Second-ranked Kansas (12-2) has been knocked off by Bradley and Oklahoma State. But although Oscar Robertson, the leading major college scorer, was fit and played in both defeats, the Bearcats' big man, 6-10 Connie Elkins, was out with a broken bone in his foot.

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Southern Oregon suffered its first Oregon Collegiate Conference defeat of the season, Tuesday night, a 68-40 trouncing at the hands of Oregon Tech.

And Oregon Tech now appears to have a good chance to draw even with SOC, the conference leader, in a pair of games this weekend with winless Oregon College of Education.

Southern Oregon now has a 7-1 conference record and is idle the rest of the week. Oregon Tech is 5-1. Oregon Tech rolled to its Tuesday night victory behind the 21-point effort of Charlie Eogle, a 6-9 giant who also led OTI in grabbing rebounds.

OTI held a slender 28-22 halftime lead, but poured in 40 points in the second half while holding Southern Oregon to only 18.

Maybe the toughest injury of the season was the broken leg that sidelined North Carolina's Joe Quigg. He had been the rebounder and take-charge guy for the Tar Heels, who were unbeaten in winning the NCAA title last year. They stretched the string to 37 games before losing to West Virginia, and now are eighth-ranked at 12-3.

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'East' Pro Cage Stars Beat West Team, 130-118

ST. LOUIS — "This one gave me more satisfaction than any All-Star victory the East has ever won."

Boston's Red Auerbach was talking and the old pro of his Boston Celtics, Bob Cousy, smiled and nodded.

"This one," Auerbach said, "was in St. Louis. We would rather win here than anywhere."

The favored East team, 10 points down early in the last half, battled back and won going away, 130-118, with Cousy dazzling.

They did it despite an all-out effort by Bob Pettit, the St. Louis Hawks star, who set new NBA all-star records with 28 points and 25 rebounds. And they did it despite a partisan St. Louis Arena crowd of 12,854, which gave Auerbach and his Celtics a strong boost.

Pettit's performance earned him the Most Valuable Player award for the second time. Cousy, himself a two-time winner of the honors, had 20 points and 10 assists and was second in the voting.

Auerbach said he couldn't pick a turning point.

"We just began hitting and they weren't," he said.

West coach Alex Hannum was downcast but praised the efforts of his West all-stars.

"I felt mighty sick when I saw Bobby (Pettit) on the floor after Slater Martin had gone out," Alex said.

Pettit suffered a slight knee sprain. Martin had what physicians termed a torn muscle fibre.

Hannum said a two minute cold spell late in the game was the difference. Cousy tossed in seven straight points while the West was getting a lone field goal in this stretch and a one-point East lead grew to six.

Akins Levels Tony DeMarco In Welterweight Contest

BOSTON — Virgil Akins, the battling church deacon from St. Louis, was headed for the welterweight elimination tournament today after blasting former champion Tony DeMarco into probable retirement.

"We're going to go along with our original agreement with the National Boxing Assn. and the World Committee to enter the championship tournament," said Bernie Glickman, co-manager of Akins.

DeMarco 26, was attempting to shake off effects of a vicious beating absorbed before being stopped in the 12th round last night at the Garden.

Despite the advice of four doctors that he be hospitalized, DeMarco checked in at a hotel and spent the night under the eyes of handlers.

"As far as I'm concerned, Tony is all through fighting," said manager Rip Valenti. "Even if he wants to fight again, I'm the guy who holds the contract and I'm going to decide this time."

Showing no ill effects from sweating off more than a quarter pound to make the 147-pound limit, Akins floored DeMarco three times before Referee Eddie Bradley called a halt at 1:53 of the 12th round. Three months ago Akins knocked out DeMarco in the 14th round.

The fight last night was for the Massachusetts version of the world's welterweight title, which Akins won in the same ring with DeMarco last Oct. 29.

Akins, a master of a waiting game to set up an opponent, floored DeMarco the first time with a right uppercut and two lefts in the eighth round. DeMarco pulled himself up at the count of seven and finished the session trading punches.

DeMarco appeared to have the better of a punching duel in the ninth round, but took unmerciful punishment in the 10th while refusing to go down.

A pair of left hooks, one to the body followed by one to the head, felled DeMarco in the 11th. When Tony bounced back swinging, Akins dropped him again with a left to the body. But the game DeMarco wouldn't quit, weathered the round and then came out for the 12th to take more punishment before the referee ended matters.

Basilio-Ray Robinson Fight House Is Scaled

CHICAGO — Tickets for the championship fight between mid-dleweight titleholder Carmen Basilio and challenger Sugar Ray Robinson have been scaled to a top of \$10 for ringside seats by the promoting International Boxing Club.

The IBC Tuesday announced prices will range from a top of \$10 to \$5 with an expected gross gate of \$500,465 and a net \$467,333.90 based on attendance of 19,000. The fight is set for March 25.

These figures could be exceeded, however, since the Chicago Stadium can seat 19,535 and take in several thousand standees.

Texas A & M Nears Coach Search End

COLLEGE STATION, Tex. — The Texas A&M Board of Directors meet in special session today amid indications that the school's stormy search for a football coach may be near an end.

The board was expected to formally cancel its instructions to a four-man directors' subcommittee and hand the task of recommending a coach back to the Faculty Athletic Council.

The chairman of the faculty group, Dr. Chris Groneman, disclosed his group has stopped interviewing candidates. He refused to elaborate.

Dr. Groneman said the board has a three-page list of coaches suggested for the job. Among them: Jules V. Sikes, now at East Texas State; Bill Barnes, an assistant at UCLA; Bill Yoeman, aide at Michigan State; Tom Landry of the New York Giants professional coaching staff; Henry (Hank) Stram, backfield coach at Notre Dame; Hal Lahar of Houston University; Thurmon Jones, a high school coach at Dallas, and Elmer Smith, a Bryant assistant who has been held over.
