Salem Sergeant Rescues Two In Plane Explosion

NAHA, Okinawa (AP) — As a four-engine transport plane took off from the air base here, Marine Sgt. Clifford Herman of Salem glanced through a window and saw one engine burst into flame.

Moments later the U. S. bound craft, carrying 31 persons, crashed and caught fire.

The plane broke into three pieces and, as passengers scuttled to freedom, Herman took a final look through the craft.

In that brief glance, he saw an unidentified Army man stunned and bleeding. Herman helped him to safety and then pawed through the wreckage.

This time he found another man, S. Sgt. James Hopkins, 23, Little Rock, Ark. Herman half-carried Hopkins through a hole in the fuselage.

Then the shattered plane was ripped by an explosion. Herman received a cut on the head.

The crash occurred here Saturday. Tuesday the Marine Corps said it is investigating Herman's feat for a possible award for bravery.

Clothing-For-Needy Drive Set At Riddle

Starting Monday, Riddle school children will start gathering bundles of used clothing as part of World Clothing Week, reports Supt. Kenneth A. Stuart.

The drive will continue through Friday. It is part of a nationwide campaign to raise three million pounds of used clothing, shoes and bedding for orphaned and needy children and adults in the United States and overseas.

World Clothing Week is conducted by schools in cooperation with the Christian Children's Fund Inc., an international charitable organization which assists orphans and other needy children in the U. S. and 33 countries.

The clothing is collected for handicapped areas of America by the Christian Children's Fund to help needy children. It goes to aid orphans and other needy children. Also, free clothing and bedding is distributed during disaster emergency situations.

Every pupil has been given literature to take home, explaining the purpose of the drive and asking the cooperation of parents and friends. It calls for all types of wearable infants, children's and adult clothing and shoes to be brought to school during the week.

Gov. Folsom Praises Indian Win Over Klan
MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP)—Gov. James E. Folsom of Alabama threw in a couple of war whoops for the embattled North Carolina Indians Wednesday and said he hopes they'll continue to whip the pale face.

After reading in his newspaper about latest developments in the Indian-Klux Klan battle, Folsom issued this statement:

"The white man has mistreated the Indian for 400 years. This is one time I'm glad to see a hope the Indians continue to beat the pale face."

Armed Indians broke up a Klan rally near Maxton, N.C. last Saturday night when they learned the demonstration was intended as a warning to them against race mixing.

DON'T CASH CHECKS
PORTLAND (AP)—Bar operators were told Wednesday by the Oregon Liquor Control Commission to stop cashing bad checks from prison parolees.

Too often, the commission said, these bad checks result in the convicts having to go back to prison, adding to the cost of the government.

Chiropodists To Change Name; Carters Return

Legislation to change the name of the Oregon State Chiropodists' Examining Board will be introduced at the next session of the State Legislature, Dr. E. W. Carter, Roseburg, a member of the board, reports.

The action will be in line with the change in name recently adopted by the National Association of Chiropodists, which has now become officially known as the American Podiatry Assn.

Members of the profession have been known for more than 40 years interchangeably as "chiropodists" and "podiatrists," Dr. Carter explained.

"Podiatry," being the word used to describe the science of study and treatment of disorders of the foot, has been determined by the profession to be the more suitable for professional use, Carter said, and as rapidly as possible the terms "chiropodist" and "chiro-podist" will be replaced.

Ambitious Venezuela Head Overstepped Powers, Claim

Plump, bemedaled Gen. Marcos Perez Jimenez ruled oil-rich Venezuela and its six million people from behind the scenes and as benevolent dictator for nearly 10 years.

Though he seldom made big headlines and never resorted to bombast — he had big ambitions to make Venezuela the leading economic nation of Latin America.

As the 43-year-old leader of a nation with important iron mines and the world's second richest oil fields, he made great progress toward his objective. Believing Western-style democracy bred chaos and disorder, he tried to follow a Portuguese-style dictatorship.

Overreached Self
But he apparently overreached himself when he had himself overwhelmingly re-elected to a new five-year term as president last Dec. 15 in a yes-or-no plebiscite. There was no opponent on the ballot.

With a revolver on his desk, Laureano Vallenilla Lanz, the interior minister, announced the "overwhelming" election to newsmen as a television receiver in the
