(Continued from Page 1) achieved a certain result which the other had not.

Higher Temperature
The United States reported achievement of temperatures higher than those reported by the British—six thousand degrees centigrade against five million.

The British, on the other hand, reported sustaining the temperatures for a longer period of time—for periods of thousandths of a second as compared with Millionths of a second reported by the Americans.

The higher American temperatures were achieved in particular experiments that began just last month, whereas the British apparently achieved theirs several months before.

Neither country, however, alluded to any significance in such differences in results or time when achieved.

Temperatures of at least 100 million degrees—sustained for per-haps several seconds—would be required to obtain useful power from the hydrogen, or fusion, reaction.

Innocent Pleas Entered To Armed Robbery Raps

BAKER, Ore. — Pleas of innocent to armed robbery charges were made here Thursday by two men arrested earlier in the month after a running gun fight. Jack Norman Gibb, 18, and Wesley Earle Davis, 30, both of Portland, entered the pleas.

Circuit Judge Lyle Wolf granted a request by Davis that he be allowed to have psychiatric examinations at the state hospital in Pendleton.

No date was set for trial.

The two men still face charges of assault with intent to kill. They have made no pleas to these charges.

Police captured Davis and Gibb near here two weeks ago after a chase that started 180 miles to the west near Boardman, Ore. They had escaped shortly before that from jail at Anacortes, Wash.

Accused Thief Located In Douglas County Jail

The sheriff's office had no trouble locating a man accused of being involved in a couple of thefts in the Riddle area — he was handily in the county jail Thursday.

Charles C. Myers, 40, of Riddle, is currently serving time for driving with a suspended operator's license and having no muffler on a vehicle. Wednesday, he was slapped with a couple of other charges — receiving and concealing stolen property and petty larceny.

He and William E. Plemons, 28, Box 372, Riddle, are accused of stealing a pickup load of lumber and of having in their possession bathroom fixtures and building materials stolen from a Riddle house.

Plemons was arrested Wednesday on the same charges and currently is free on total bail of \$2,750.

Both men are scheduled for a busy day in Canyonville justice court next Wednesday. They are slated for trials on the petty theft charges and preliminary hearings on the stolen property counts.

Funeral services will be held in the Chapel of The Roses Saturday at 2 p.m. with the Rev. Robert Hemple of the Nazarene Church officiating. Burial will be in the Civil Bend Cemetery, Winston.

Army Acknowledges Russia Has Fired ICBM, Brucker States At Hearing Friday

WASHINGTON — The Army acknowledged Friday there no longer is any doubt the Soviets have fired an intercontinental ballistic missile.

The flat statement came in testimony by Secretary of the Army Wilber M. Brucker, made public in heavily censored form by the House Armed Services Committee.

"There isn't any doubt about the fact that the Russians have launched and fired at least one and possibly two long-range, that is, intercontinental ballistic missiles," Brucker told the committee Tuesday. The rest of his testimony at this point was deleted from the published transcript.

About On Par
At another point, however, Brucker said he thinks the United States is "just about on a par" in the development of long-range missiles and ahead in the general field of shorter range guided missiles.

Brucker told the committee the Army "very soon" will try to launch a satellite with a Jupiter-C missile. He strongly implied the Army will try to avoid publicity on the attempt. Failure of the Navy's Vanguard rocket in its first try to carry a satellite into space touched off a roaring controversy as to whether too much advance publicity aggravated the damage to U.S. prestige.

Brucker said: "I would rather not go into the details of the thing because we are endeavoring to the best of our ability not to have the thing happen that happened with the Vanguard."

However, when Brucker was asked whether he would not announce a satellite test until there was a successful one, he said: "No, I am going to be very frank about that. If we fail, we are going to tell them."

The censored testimony also carried a strong implication that the new solid propellant missile the Army has been authorized to develop may approach the 1,500-mile range of intermediate range ballistic missiles. The Army was taken out of the IRBM field in 1956 by a Defense Department order despite what Brucker said were strong objections from the Army at the time. Use of missiles with more than 200 mile range was assigned to the Air Force.

Brucker said elsewhere he is not aware of any harmful service rivalry in the missile field, but that he thinks the Army's efforts on its IRBM Jupiter generated constructive rivalry.

Roseburg Postmaster's Mother Dies Thursday

Heien Carstens Isohn, 78, mother of Roseburg Postmaster Clyde W. Carstens Sr., died Thursday at the home of her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Colby, in Hayward, Calif. as a result of a heart attack.

Mrs. Isohn was born April 16, 1879 in Chicago. Her husband, William Carstens, a Roseburg cabinet maker, died in 1932. She was a member of the Roseburg Rebekah Lodge No. 41. She moved to Red Bluff, Calif., in 1938 and made her home there until a few years ago, when she moved to Hayward to reside with her daughter.

Survivors include two sons, Clyde W. Carstens, Roseburg, and Richard Carstens, Red Bluff, Calif., and the daughter, Mrs. Colby, Hayward, Calif., and six grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held Monday at Red Bluff.

Portland Girl, Age 13, Gives Birth To Baby Boy

PORTLAND — Portland police said Friday they had learned a 13-year-old Portland girl gave birth to a 7-pound boy at her home Sunday.

They said the girl, an eighth-grade student who weighs 170 pounds, apparently was unaware she was pregnant and the parents had no advance knowledge. The girl and the baby were taken to a hospital, where they are reported in good condition.

Police said the girl named a 19-year-old former service man, not now in this area, as the father. The parents said they intend to rear the baby. Besides their 13-year-old daughter, they have another, younger, child.

Marine Shoots Sergeant Following Conviction

HONOLULU — A Marine steward who had just been convicted by a summary court-martial badly wounded his sergeant Thursday and then held out for a chaplain before surrendering to a Marine spokesman at the Kaneohe Marine Corps Air Station said Pfc. Henry E. Lindsay Jr., 22, Nashville, Tenn., wounded Sgt. Clarence R. Wimbish, 31, Richmond, Va., with five shots from an automatic pistol in a barracks.

Wimbish was hit in the right leg, left shoulder and right hand. He underwent surgery at Tripler Army Hospital and was reported in good condition.

President, Wife Stay Later, Drink Champagne Toast

WASHINGTON — President and Mrs. Eisenhower stayed later than usual, drank a champagne toast together and generally seemed to enjoy the state dinner they gave Thursday night for Speaker of the House Sam Rayburn.

They were in jovial good spirits as they smilingly said good night to Rayburn and his sister, Mrs. W. A. Thomas of Dallas, and saw them to the door of the White House.

Then the President and the first lady walked into the state dining room where a late buffet had been set up for after-dinner guests. They paused there together to lift glasses of champagne in a toast before the musicale guests joined them.

The program of music was supplied in the east ballroom after dinner by the Revelers, a five-member professional vocal group from New York. When they had finished their selections of popular music and had sung a special encore of "I'm an Old Cowhand" for Rayburn, the President suggested: "Let's have another."

The singers complied with "Women in the Shoe."

The president's request number carried the musicale program over time to 11:09 p.m.

Afterwards, he and Mrs. Eisenhower spent 15 minutes chatting separately with groups of guests at the buffet where cakes, sandwiches, coffee and American champagne were served.

This was the second of six state dinners the Eisenhowers are giving for top officials, diplomats, the supreme court, military and science leaders during the 1958 White House social season.

Supersonic Bomber Has Shield Of Electrons

SAN MATEO, Calif. — An American supersonic bomber now flying can surround itself with a shield of electrons to ward off any attacking missiles.

The automatic defense system being built into Convair's new 1.120-m.p.h. B58 Hustler is one of the most spectacular applications of electronics in Defense, President Don G. Mitchell of Sylvania Electronic Products, Inc., said.

"It has flown and it works," Mitchell reported after addressing the San Francisco Council of the West Coast Electronic Manufacturers Assn.

The shield will increase the attack effectiveness of manned supersonic bombers.

Heiress Abandons Plans To Marry In Scotland

AMSTERDAM, Netherlands — Runaway heiress Tessa Kennedy and aviation son Dominic Elwes abandoned their efforts to get married in Scotland and headed by plane Friday for Curacao in the Dutch island in the Caribbean.

The couple slipped aboard a plane almost unnoticed at Scotland's Prestwick Airport Thursday night and flew to Amsterdam. Early Friday they took a KLM airliner for Willemstad, Curacao.

The plane stopped briefly at Nice but airline officials would give no information on the passengers.

Miss Kennedy is the 19-year-old daughter of a British sugar magnate. Her suitor is 26, the son of society painter Simon Elwes.

Accused Bank Robber Held In New Hampshire

NASHUA, N. H. — William J. Paul, 43, was arrested here Thursday on a warrant accusing him of the \$7,878 holdup of the Tigard, Ore., branch of the U. S. National Bank of Portland.

FBI agents and police recognized him and picked him up. Later he was arraigned before U. S. Commissioner Myer Sidel.

After the Tigard holdup July 10, 1957, the FBI obtained warrants accusing Paul, who has a long record, and Jack D. Whelp, 19, a native of Oregon, recently has worked as a magazine salesman.

Paul was spotted by police in Nashua and Lowell, Mass. He has relatives in both places.

DRUNK DRIVER FINED

Marelda M. Painter, 32, Reedsport, Thursday was fined \$200 for drunken driving. The fine was levied by Sutherland Municipal Judge Hazel D. Green.

Pacific Storm Hits Northwest; Damage Slight

A Pacific Ocean storm romped across coastal areas Thursday night and early Friday, dumping torrents of water from California to Northern British Columbia, causing some flooding but little damage.

One death occurred in hardest-hit British Columbia, where Bradley Matthews, 6, drowned when he fell into a swollen creek at Burnaby, near Vancouver.

Some Vancouver Island points reported more than six inches of rain. The Vancouver airport on the mainland measured 2.66 in 24 hours and Nanaimo, B.C. had 2.43.

A large area of southwest British Columbia reported a splinterwork of flooding, with 30 families evacuated from homes in Alberni, 90 miles north of Victoria, when an overflowing creek inundated surrounding land.

Roadways Blocked

Rockslides blocked roadways. Part of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway track 27 miles north of Vancouver was washed out. Passenger service around the affected area was maintained by boat.

Oregon got the stiffest gales, with one coastal station reporting gusts up to 115 miles an hour and a steady velocity of 100 miles an hour for two hours Thursday afternoon.

The windy spot was at Mt. Hebo, top velocity. The station is at a 3,200 foot elevation on the northern Oregon coast.

Slight Injuries Suffered In Automobile Accident

Slight injuries were suffered Thursday night by Stanley Anderson, Rt. 1 Box 970, Roseburg, when he wrecked his car on Highway 99B at the Shady overpass.

A passenger, Roy Weatherford, was thrown out of the car but escaped injury, according to state police.

The accident occurred when Anderson's 1950 sedan skidded on wet, slippery pavement, state police said.

Police did not list the extent of Anderson's injuries, but they were not serious enough to require any hospital treatment.

Loon Lake Subdivision Reported Being Planned

Two men are starting a subdivision of summer and year-round homes on Loon Lake, it was reported at Thursday night's meeting of the Douglas County Planning Commission.

The property to be subdivided is located on the west side of the lake near Salander Creek. It is presently being surveyed by a county surveyor's crew.

The two men planning the subdivision are Frank Rose of Reedsport and Ernest Lee of Winchester Bay. An unusual aspect of the plan is that the only access to the subdivision will be by water. Lumber for the houses will be floated in by barge.

County Surveyor Fred Darby said a preliminary plat of the property will be ready for consideration by the commission at the Feb. 27 meeting.

In other business, the commission gave a 30-day delay to its examination of the Melrose Cemetery plat at the request of Surveyor James Daugherty. The plat will be examined Feb. 27.

Administrators Rehired In Myrtle Creek Schools

Full-time administrators in the Myrtle Creek Public Schools were re-appointed Thursday night in a special meeting of the school board. School Supt. Marion Winslow of Coos Bay attended the meeting to discuss the teacher-salary program in effect in the school district there.

Two Myrtle Creek administrators received three-year contracts in accordance with a new state law requiring that term for persons working in the district for three years, provided, as in the case of Myrtle Creek, that there is an average daily membership of over 800.

Those winning three-year contracts were Supt. Al Neet and high school Principal Myrl Barkhurst. Anton Bryant, principal of the upper elementary school, and Ray Cuffenberry, Tri-City School, each received one-year contracts.

KILLS SIX OFFICERS

SEOUL, Korea — A South Korean army captain shot and killed six fellow officers and non-coms and then himself last night in a mysterious gunfight at Hongchun, 60 miles east of Seoul.

Training Sessions For Homemaking Being Conducted

Homemaking training sessions are being conducted by the Douglas County Home Extension Service with some 400 local women participating.

A preliminary meeting was to have been held today at the extension offices in the Post Office Bldg. Extension agents, Hope Tacchini and Carol Dawson remind county homemakers that they are available to help solve all homemaking problems and request invitations into the homes around the county for this purpose.

A demonstration kitchen was also scheduled to take place this morning at the courthouse.

Training meetings to project leaders in February are planned for giving lessons in various committees. Each leader gets four training sessions, then gives four lessons. The project may run through early March, it was estimated.

A demonstration kitchen is also planned at the courthouse next Monday, between 10 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. Meetings of home extension unit program planners are held in conjunction. Meetings have been held previously at Scottsburg and Myrtle Creek.

All phases of home economics are handled in the projects, including home management, buying, clothing, family relationships, budgeting, foods and other items.

Excommunicated Priest On Trial For Murder

NANCY, France — Nervously fingering a rosary, a 37-year-old excommunicated priest went on trial today on charges of murdering a teen-age girl and the unborn child she carried.

The courtroom was jammed and hushed as Guy Hanoeyers, former priest in the village of Urcelle, faced before Court President Louis Faoc.

Wearing a somber suit and an open-collared white shirt, he listened with lowered head as the president read out the accusation.
