OSC's Clay Stapleton Mulls For Iowa State

CORVALLIS, Ore. — Clay Stapleton, an assistant football coach at Oregon State who has been mentioned for the head coaching spot at Iowa State, has the praise of OSC Athletic Director Roy Keene.

Stapleton, OSC Coach Tommy Prothro's top assistant, came here three years ago after coaching service at Wyoming and Wofford College.

"If Iowa State is looking for an outstanding man who is familiar with the single wing system, Stapleton certainly fills the bill," Keene said.

Iowa State is looking for someone to succeed Jim Myers, who took over as head man at Texas A&M.

Stapleton was not available for comment Thursday.

Ducks Feted At Banquet

PORTLAND — The President of the University of Oregon says the school's football team "upheld the great spirit of amateur athletics" in the last Rose Bowl game.

"Our team put their heart into the Rose Bowl game for their school and their state," Dr. O. Meredith Wilson told a rally for the squad here Thursday night.

The Oregon squad "never resembled mercenaries hired for an afternoon's work," he told a crowd estimated at 1,500 persons.

Wilson was one of a long line of speakers at a two-hour rally for the squad and its coach, Len Casanova.

When his turn came to speak, Casanova remarked that the rally was a "lot more fun than being hung in effigy." That was a reference to a 1936 incident, in which Casanova was hanged in effigy on the campus.

The rally was the latest in a series of commendations for Oregon's spirited performance in the game, despite the Ducks' 10-7 loss to Ohio State. Another speaker, Dick Turner of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, said that Oregon was "the best football team in the country."

The chamber was one of the sponsors of the event.

Many of the fans at the rally spent a large part of the evening chatting with the Oregon players. They also ate fried chicken from the box lunch that was included in the \$2 price of admission.

Eddie Arcaro, first active rider to be elected to the Jockeys' Hall of Fame at Pimlico, is the only Jockey ever to pilot two Triple Crown winners.

HANFORD, Calif. — Highway patrolman Paul Cleveland nursed a bloody, numb thumb Friday and what he claims is a world nonstop bowling record—550 games in 87 hours 35 minutes.

"I tried to make the record as tough as possible to beat," said the weary 39-year-old Hanford of five when he ended his marathon at 1:35 a.m.

Cleveland, who knocked down 89,284 pins for an average of 162 a game, praised supporters who collected \$2,000 for him "to put Hanford on the map."

Dick Tuttle, Eugene, Ore., bowled 527 games last Sunday, averaging 125.6.

Found penniless in Miami last week, Foxx has accepted a job as coach for the Boston Red Sox farm team at Minneapolis in the American Assn.

In addition, Old Double X will serve as a batting instructor for the entire Red Sox organization whenever the need for special help to a player arises.
