### Morse Urges Restoring Funds For Garibaldi

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Morse (D-Ore.) says the federal government should reconsider cancelling funds intended for construction of a boat basin at Garibaldi, Ore.

Morse told the Budget Bureau yesterday that the project in Tillamook County, Ore., was one of a number cancelled when the bureau limited the Army Engineers' funds to 630 million dollars.

Morse said in a letter to Pervival Brundage, the bureau's director, that Congress last year had appropriated 400 million dollars for boat basin projects.

The bureau's action, Morse said, was in effect "an item veto" of an action Congress had taken.

Cancellation of bid calls for the Garibaldi project was a sharp blow to an area plagued with substantial unemployment, Morse said.

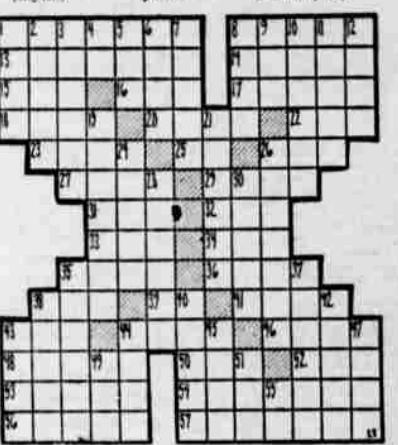
