

# Roseburg Pulls 46-37 Upset Over South Eugene

## Axeman Warren Held To 5 Points In League Clash

An upset victory by the Roseburg Indians over South Eugene Saturday night, coupled with a Springfield win over Cottage Grove threw the District 5-A-1 basketball race into an early confusion. Springfield downed the Grovers 40-40, while Roseburg tripped Eugene 46-37.

The win for the Millers gives them a perfect 2-0 record in league play, with North Bend, who was idle last week, in second place with a 1-0 mark. Roseburg and South Eugene are both 1-1. Marshfield, losers to North Bend, are 0-1 and Cottage Grove 0-2.

Jackson, Roseburg broke loose for 14 points in the final panel to break a 20-year Eugene domination over the Indians and gave the Indians their first league win of the season against one loss.

It was the tough rebounding of the Indians along with a blazing fourth quarter scoring spree that spelled the difference in the end, as Eugene could manage only six points in the fatal fourth, after playing the Indians on almost even terms throughout the first three periods.

For the game, Roseburg collected 40 of the 53 rebounds collected by the two clubs combined.

**Indians Defense Axeman**

In the fatal fourth period for Eugene, the Axemen were able to gather only six points, four of them in the final minute of play, as the tight Roseburg defense held them to but four field goals during the second half, three of them in the final panel.

Larry Sloan was the big man for the Indians in the fourth, as he leaped through the Axemen defense for four straight field goals and boosted them to a 39-33 advantage with less than four minutes left. In the period Sloan hit for 10 points to give him game honors with a total of 17.

The clubs battled on even terms throughout the first three quarters, with the Indians taking a slight 13-12 lead at the end of the first quarter.

**Tribe Acquires Lead**

Gary Cripps, Barrong and little 5-7 Bob Steele each hit a quick basket to start the third period and the Indians were off to a lead that they never gave up. Gregg Wilner added four points for the Axemen in the third quarter, which ended with the Indians out in front by a 32-31 count to set the stage for the fourth quarter finish.

After shooting at a 455 clip during the first half, Eugene was able to connect on only four out of 17 shots in the second half and ended the game with a 297 mark from the field.

Charlie Warren, high scoring Axeman center, was forced to the sidelines mid-way in the third quarter with an injured back and did not see further action, to rob the Axemen of any backboard strength that they might have had. For the game Warren could hit on only five points, one of his lowest scoring games of the past two years.

Following Sloan in the Indian scoring column was Jackson with 11 points and Barrong with 10. Rick Cerkoney was top man for the Axemen with nine points, followed by Neil Goldschmidt with seven.

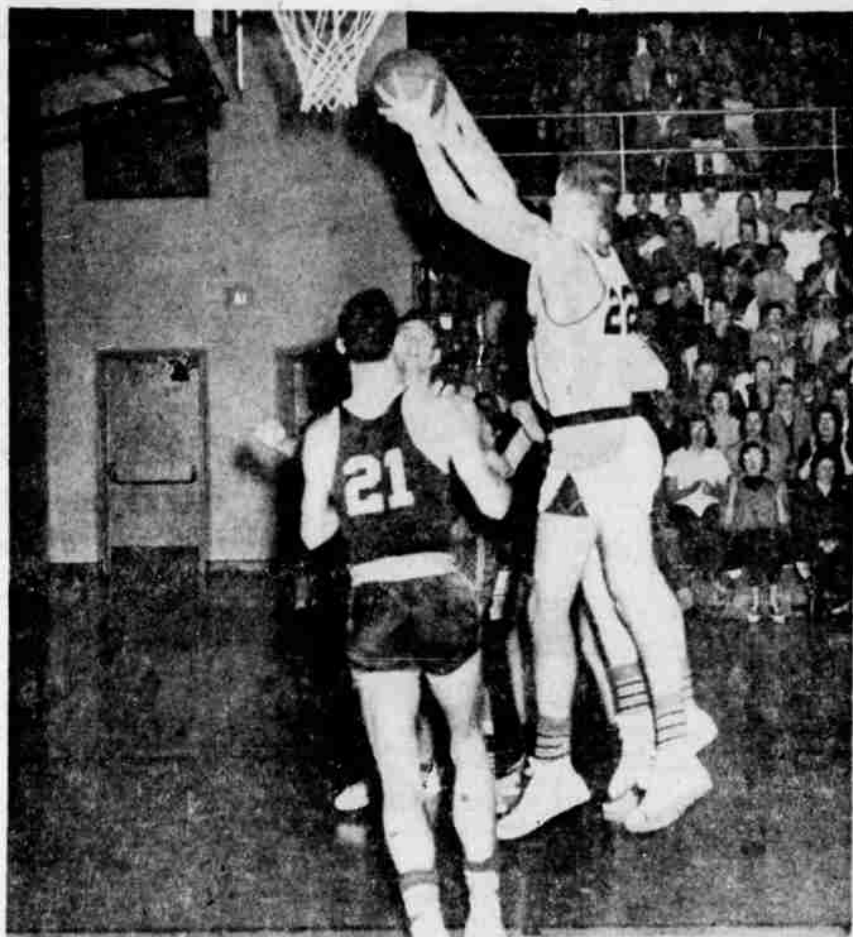
The Indians will rest until Friday night, when they travel to meet winless Cottage Grove in their next league action.

## Only Grant Has Perfect Record

Grant of Portland emerged from last weekend as the only class A-1 high school basketball team in the state with an unblemished record.

Roseburg made it possible and provided one of the biggest upsets of the season by knocking over previously unbeaten South Eugene, 46-37 Saturday night.

South Eugene, ranked No. 1 in the weekly Associated Press poll, had gone into the game with a 17-0 record. Roseburg, tied for 11th place last week, had a 9-4 record. Grant, which won two games last week, has an 11-0 record.

Roseburg did what no other team this season has been able to do: Stop big Charley Warren, who has been averaging 29 points a game, scored at least 23 in every game until Saturday. Roseburg held him to five.

**Warren Has Injury**

Warren, however, was handicapped by a back injury and was in action only half the game. He suffered the injury earlier in the season.

Larry Sloan led Roseburg to victory by scoring 17 points.

Four other teams from the top 10 in the AP poll won games Saturday night.

Klamath Falls, ranked No. 4, walloped Crater High of Central Point, 67-30, for a second straight night.

Fifth-ranked North Bend won its second consecutive game in an invasion of Central Oregon, downing Bend, 67-59.

Marshfield, rated No. 9, trounced Redwood, 71-59, and the No. 10 team, Hermiston, defeated Milton-Freewater, 55-49.

## 15 Cage Tests, Wrestling On Week's Sports Schedule

Another sport-filled week is in store for the 16 Douglas County high schools this week, as 15 basketball games, one wrestling match and the Glide Invitational Wrestling Tournament are on the schedules.

The Roseburg Indians, after splitting their weekend games in District 5-A-1 action, will only have one game on the schedule for this week, traveling to meet Cottage Grove Friday night. Roseburg was defeated by Springfield 68-35 last Friday, but came back to knock off first-rated South Eugene Saturday 46-37.

Only five games are on the Tuesday schedule, but all of them are league games.

In Umpqua Valley League action, first place Riddle, which

dumped the Douglas Trojans last Friday 36-34, will be at home to Myrtle Creek in another crucial tilt. The Vikings are in second-place tie with Douglas, each with a 3-1 record. Riddle has a 4-0 mark in league play.

The only Tuesday night play will find the Drain Warriors looking for win number two in District 5-A-2 play by playing host to second-place Pleasant Hill.

Eight other games are on tap for Friday night, highlighted by the Roseburg-Cottage Grove scrap.

The only Umpqua Valley play of the day will have Sutherlin playing host to Douglas. The Bulldogs stand 2-2 in league play.

In Douglas B League play for Friday, Yoncalla will travel to Camas Valley and Days Creek will be on the road against Elkton, who stand second in league play with a 4-2 record. Canyonville Bible Academy will travel to meet the Roseburg sophomore team to round out the B action for the week.

**Non-leaguer Scheduled**

In a non-league game, Riddle will be at home to Canyonville, while Myrtle Creek, Oakland and Glide will all be idle.

Drain will finish first half play in District 5-A-2, traveling to meet Willamette, also on Friday.

The Glendale Pirates have another tough weekend on their schedule, traveling to meet Eugene River on Friday night and then returning home for a game against Brookings on Saturday. Glendale and Brookings are tied for the loop lead, each with a 4-1 record.

The only other weekend action will find the Douglas Trojans playing host to Cottage Grove. The Grovers tipped Douglas by two points the first time they met for their only win of the season to date.

The lone wrestling match for the week will find the Douglas squad traveling to meet Sutherlin on Tuesday, but six schools will get together in a two-day meet at Glide over Friday and Saturday.

Teams from Sutherlin, Glendale, Douglas, Myrtle Creek, Glide and Yoncalla will meet in the first Glide Invitational Wrestling Tournament. The Roseburg Indians will also field a jayvee team in the meet, as will Sutherlin.

Matches will start on Friday morning, with the finals scheduled to be held Saturday night.

## Game Commission Stands By May 24 Trout Opening

**PORTLAND (AP)** — Despite protests from a number of coastal organizations, the trout fishing season in Oregon coast streams will not open until May 24.

The state Game Commission followed recommendations of its biologists Saturday, and set the late opening date as a move to protect young salmon and steelhead.

**Steelhead Season Extended**

It includes the Umpqua and Rogue Rivers.

Elsewhere in the state the general season will open April 26 and run through Oct. 31. The high Cascade lakes opening will coincide with the May 24 coastal opening. The lakes closure will be Oct. 3.

Bag limits remain generally the same as last year.

The commission banned use of live, dead or preserved fish in most waters. In the ocean and tide-water, however, herring, candlefish, sardines, anchovies and bullheads may be used as bait. Dead fish or parts thereof may be used in Gerber, Drews and Owyhee reservoirs, in Klamath and Coos lakes and in the main stem, sloughs and flood plain lakes of the Willamette and Columbia rivers, and in the main stem of the Snake.

**Year-long closure in the upper waters.**

The winter steelhead season in the Alsea River was extended to March 31, with a bag limit of two fish daily; four in possession or in seven consecutive days.

The winter deadline on the Siuslaw River was extended to the first bridge above Wilhelm Creek. Devils Lake in Klamath County was closed to angling from motor-propelled craft.

## South Eugene Dumps Jayvees

A fourth-quarter Roseburg rally fell three points short Saturday, as the Indian jayvees went down to a 55-52 defeat at the hands of the South Eugene jayvees in a game played on the Roseburg floor.

After leading throughout the entire first half, Roseburg saw a 29-17 halftime lead melt under a third quarter Axemen rally and fall behind 41-34 going into the final quarter. The Indians also held a 17-11 first quarter lead.

The fatal third quarter for the Indians saw them collect only five points, while South Eugene was hitting for 14. Roseburg outscored the winners 14-11 in the fourth quarter, but seven out of 10 free throws in the final period for Eugene gave it the hard-earned win.

From the field Roseburg hit two more goals, but Eugene collected 23 out of 32 free throws, while the Indians could hit on only 16 out of 26, to give them the needed edge.

Lynn Baxter with 11 points in the first half was the main reason the Indians were on top, but three Eugene players had seven each in the final half to provide the narrow margin. The win for the Axemen was their ninth of the season against one loss.

Baxter was high point man for Roseburg with 18 points, followed by Bill Mundt with 11. Noster was tops for Eugene with 14, followed by O'Connell with 12.
