Planned Gun Use Claimed In Case Of Teenage Pair

NEW YORK — Financial failure looms for most of the nation's movie theaters and film makers if the public's interest in old movies on television continues to rise, the New York Times says.

An article Monday by Bosley Crowther, the Times' movie critic, said old movies have come to command close to one-fourth of the nation's television-viewing time since last September.

The Times story continued: The public spends four times as many hours a week looking at old movies on TV as it spends attending new ones in theaters.

This development began noticeably with the influx of top-quality old movies on free TV last fall. A direct consequence of the trend is a seven million drop in average weekly movie attendance in the last quarter of 1957, compared with the same period in 1956. This meant a loss of about 50 million dollars in net theater grosses.
