Out of the rumbling and roaring over Roseburg High's defeat of previously undefeated South Eugene, came the local high school's third greatest athletic achievement of the past five years. The Roseburg boys and girls hopped right to the spirit of the thing after the game last Saturday night and made the most of totting players off the floor.

THE WIN Saturday night, first by a Roseburg hoop team over Eugene High South (or South Eugene) in 20 years, must rank with the 1933 football team's first win over Medford in 25 seasons.

High school records show that it was Roseburg's first basketball victory in 20 years over the Eugene school, but actually the drought may have been over 28 years. There is a two-year lapse in the records that show no outcome of games after the 30th year (about 1938). Then back in 1930, Roseburg shows a win.

Possibly some of the old-timers in this part of the country have a better recollection than the record books and could set the thing straight.

ANY WAY YOU LOOK AT IT, it's been a long time between Roseburg's first football win over Medford came after a 16-game series, covering some 25 years.

Third, among the list of Roseburg High athletic achievements over the past five years, in our book anyway, is the long tennis winning streak (of national proportions) set by local high school net teams from 1951 through 1955.

Among other noteworthy things which took place at the local gym Saturday was the attendance figure which was by far the biggest of the season for any one high school game. The place was well over half full of its 2,800 capacity. The state's top team is a drawing card anywhere, as is the Axemen's fine all-around athlete, Charlie Warren.

Too bad that the fans couldn't have seen more of the all-star, who had to give way to a bad

West Virginia Holds Poll Lead But Loses 1st Game

West Virginia's Mountaineers no longer are unbeaten, but they're still the top-heavy choice in today's Associated Press college basketball poll-based on games through Saturday.

Duke's stunning 72-68 upset ended West Virginia's winning streak at 14 last night, but came too late to be reflected in the balloting by the nation's sportswriters and broadcasters.

Unranked Duke, only a so-so 7-3 for the season, put the ax to West Virginia's 14-game unbeaten streak.

Free Throws Win
West Virginia had the edge from the field, hitting 27 field goals to

Duke's 26. But the Blue Devils, and Atlantic Coast Conference entry, connected on 20 of 25 free throws while West Virginia was blowing 8-0.

Duke's 6-5 Paul Schmidt bird-dogged 6-10 Lloyd Sharrar, the big man of the Southern Conference. Joe Harris gave the lead to Duke for keeps at 60-59.

Two More Upsets
There were two other upsets last night. Sixth-ranked Oklahoma State, which had climbed a notch by running its winning streak to 12, was beaten 70-64 by Houston.

Eighth-ranked Kentucky was trimmed 71-52 by Georgia Tech. Kentucky now is 12-4.

The Mountaineers totaled 1,008 points in the poll to 834 for runner-up Kansas. They were the first pick on 73 of 110 ballots.

Cincinnati, led by the nation's top scorer, Oscar Robertson, continued to advance, jumping past Kansas State into third place by a narrow margin.

Grant High Takes Poll Lead From Axemen; Indians 14th

Grant High of Portland, which has moved up a notch each week in the Associated poll on Oregon high school basketball, has now reached the top.

The only undefeated team in class A-1 ranks, Grant received seven votes for first place in this week's poll to take over the No. 1 spot from South Eugene, which lost its first game of the season last weekend.

Axemen Get Three 1st
South Eugene, which was topped by Roseburg, 46-37, got three votes for "first place, but fell to third in the poll, while Klamath Falls moved from fourth to second place. Of the 17 sports writers and broadcasters taking part in the poll, four gave first-place votes to Klamath Falls.

North Salem is in fourth place and thereafter come North Bend, Marshfield, Pendleton, Astoria and between Jefferson of Portland and Hermiston for the last two places a tie in the top 10.

Two teams fell out of the top 10. Roosevelt, tied for sixth place last week, dropped out after Grant pinned the first defeat of the season on Roosevelt. Beaverton, No. 8 last week, also dropped out after Astoria took over the Metro District lead by spilling Beaverton.

Roy Campanella Badly Hurt

GLEN COVE, N. Y. — Veteran catcher Roy Campanella, a mainstay of the Los Angeles Dodgers, received a fractured neck early Tuesday when his car skidded, overturned and crashed into a pole.

He was pinned in the wreckage half an hour after the accident at 3:30 a.m., and was pronounced in critical condition following his removal to Glen Cove Community Hospital.

The 36-year-old Campanella, who has been beset by injuries of one kind or another during his long baseball career, was returning alone to his home here following a New York television appearance when the mishap occurred.

The crash made noise so great that a number of persons rushed from their homes in the vicinity to investigate. Among them was a physician, Dr. W. S. Gurnee.

Dr. Gurnee gave Campanella an injection but said later the baseball player felt no sensation from the needle and that "it doesn't

look good for his baseball career."

Police informed Campanella's wife at home and took her to the hospital. The couple have six children, ranging in age from 4 to 18. Only Monday the Dodgers had signed reserve catcher Ruben Walker. For the position they also have John Roxborough and some youngsters.

"But you just don't replace a fellow like Campanella," said Burzelle Bava, Dodgers' vice president, at Los Angeles.

Campanella signed his 1958 contract with the Dodgers for \$36,000, a salary cut after a poor season in 1957.

He had batted .242 in 103 games. His 80 hits included 13 home runs, nine doubles and 82 runs batted in.

Campanella was preparing to leave for Los Angeles, where he had taken a tentative lease on a new home.

He is owner of a flourishing Harlem liquor store, and a \$38,000 yacht which has been put up for sale.
