Advanced Training In Nursing Offered

Increased opportunities for advanced education and training in nursing are now available through the Veterans Administration. The agency says that at the present time there are nursing vacancies at the Roseburg VA Hospital.

Included in the program offered are in-service training for management and supervisory positions, hospital training and nursing specialties, orientation programs, attendance at nursing institutes and workshops in places throughout the nation and leave and financial assistance to selected nurses for attending college.

During the fiscal year ending June 1957, 109 VA nurses attended universities under the above-mentioned program, with tuition, salary and leave taken into consideration, depending upon the university program undertaken.
