

## Baylor Keeps Big Scoring Lead

Elgin Baylor of Seattle University has begun to pull away from the field in his drive to repeat as collegiate basketball scoring champion of the Pacific Northwest.

Through Saturday Baylor had raised his total for the season to 408 points and was 36 ahead of his closest competitor, David Gardner of Northwest Nazarene.

On a basis of per-game production Baylor was even farther in front. His average was 29.1 compared with 23.26 for Chuck Curtis of Pacific Lutheran and 22.25 for Gardner.

Curtis was third on the scoring ladder with 349 points, closely followed by Gary Simmons of Idaho with 344 and Doug Smart of Washington with 340.

Two other players were above 300, Loren Anderson of Seattle Pacific with 328 and Jack Day of St. Martin's with 323. Day was the free throw leader of the pack with 125 conversions. Baylor was tops in field goals with 149. Day was dropped from his squad this week, however, because of study difficulties.

Rounding out the Top Ten were Bill Hollingsworth, Southern Oregon, at 299; Larry Howard, Eastern Oregon, 279, and Dave Gambee of Oregon State and John Winters of Portland University, tied at 278.

## Roseburg On Road At Cottage Grove

The main spotlight will be turned on two important league clashes this weekend in Douglas County as another 16 basketball games and the Glide Invitational Wrestling tournament make up the schedules for the 16 county schools.

One of the main clashes will be the important District 5-A-1 game between the Roseburg Indians and the Cottage Grove Lions Friday. Roseburg is fresh from an upset 46-37 victory over front-ranked South Eugene and will be out to pick up its second league win of the season against one loss at Cottage Grove.

Top game in the Umpqua Valley League will be Friday night at Douglas as the Trojans will attempt to move into a three-way tie for first place with a victory over the Sutherlin Bulldogs.

Douglas Could Tie  
A tie for first place and Riddle in a tie for first place with 4-1 records after the Trojans dumped the Irish 46-18 Tuesday night at Riddle. Douglas with a 3-1 record can move into a tie with the other two teams, as they will both be on the sidelines in league play.

Riddle will step out of league action to meet Canyonville Friday night at Riddle.

Douglas B League action for the weekend will find first place Yoncalla traveling to meet Camas Valley and Days Creek on the road against second place Elkton. Yoncalla leads the pack with a 6-0 record, while Elkton sports a 4-2 mark.

District 6-A-2 action will find the Douglas Pirates in another important game, traveling to meet Rogue River on Friday, and returning home against five losses. Willamette is tied for second place in the standings with a 5-1 record.

The only other Friday game will send the Canyonville Bible Academy varsity team against the Roseburg Sophomore squad. The Indian Sophomore team has dropped but one game in 11 starts this season, but will have its hands full against the Pirates.

Only other Saturday night game on the docket is a return game at Douglas, which will send the Trojans against Cottage Grove. The Lions tripped Douglas by two points the first time the teams met for their only win of the season and Douglas was out to even the score.

The Glide Invitational Wrestling Tournament will find over 80 wrestlers participating in the two-day affair. Teams from Sutherlin, Douglas, Myrtle Creek, Yoncalla and Glide are entered.

## Earwood Still Leads UVL; Tiger Tops B Loop Scoring

Fred Earwood of the Riddle Irish still remains on top of the Umpqua Valley League scoring race after five games, with a total of 84 points and a 16.8 average, down somewhat from his 20.7 average of last week. He was held to only 22 points in two games this week, hitting his season's low of eight points against Myrtle Creek Tuesday.

Pulling into the second place slot after five games is Jim Murray of Myrtle Creek with 67 points and a 13.4 mark. Murray replaces Bill Eswine of the Glide Wildcats, who dropped down to third with 64 points in five games and a 12.8 average. Eswine was held scoreless in one game against Myrtle Creek this week, but rebounded with 19 against Oakland Tuesday.

Baker, playing one less game than Patterson, has hit for 33 points and a 15.5 average, tops in league play. Baker had the high single game of the season in league play last Friday, hitting for 25 points. The previous high was 23 by Patterson.

Third place in the scoring column goes to Ralph Beal of Elkton, who has dropped 86 points through the hoop in six games for a 14.3 average, second only to Baker's.

Fourth and fifth places go to Canyonville, with Bob Burns nabbing third with 79 points in seven games and a 11.3 average, and fourth to Paul Parrett with 77 points in seven games and an even 11-point average.

Only one new face appeared in the top 15 scorers in the league during the week. Mac McClellan of Camas Valley took over the 15th spot with 36 points in four games and an even nine-point game average. This dropped Tom House of Elkton out of the top 15.

Camas Valley nabbed four of the 15 places, with Canyonville, Elkton and Days Creek each getting three. Yoncalla collected two.

The Yoncalla Eagles find themselves on top of the league with a 6-0 record, with Elkton in a solid second place with a 4-2 mark. The Eagles have the best offense of the league, hitting for an average of 52 points per game, while allowing only 37.8 points per game for the opponents.

Canyonville, resting in the loop cellar with a 1-7 record, has given up an average of 58.3 points per game to rank first in that department. Camas Valley is a close second in points given-up-per-game, allowing its opponents an average of 57.3 points per game.

## Five Local Schools Enter 82 Wrestlers

No less than 82 wrestlers will converge on Glide this Friday and Saturday to participate in the first Glide Invitational Wrestling Tournament. The tourney will have one session Friday and two Saturday, with the finals slated to start at 7:30 p.m. on Saturday.

Teams from Sutherlin, Myrtle Creek, Douglas, Yoncalla and Glide will enter, with Sutherlin slated to bring two teams.

The Bulldogs will bring the largest number of wrestlers to the meet, with 35 entered from the two squads. The varsity team will have 23 members and the Bulldog jayvee team 12. Douglas has 18 entered. Myrtle Creek 15, Glide 10 and Yoncalla four to make up the remainder of the field.

Unbeaten Listed  
Out of the 35 wrestlers entered from Sutherlin, five of them have yet to drop a match this season. Jerry Peters, last year's state champion at 123 pounds, has nine straight wins as does Durrell Giger at 130 and Bob Linstead at 136 pounds. Wayne Carroll at 136 is undefeated after six bouts and Stan Schrieber has two in a row, also at 136 pounds.

Sutherlin has a record of 10 wins, one loss and a draw in 12 matches this season and will go into the tourney as the definite favorite.

Douglas only has one undefeated wrestler on the season, Marvin Nickel at 130 pounds with five straight wins to his credit. Floyd Whit at 157, Larry Evans at 175 and Weisz at 98 pounds each have a 4-1 record for the year, in two other strong weights for the Trojans.

Myrtle Creek also has an undefeated wrestler in Claris Hughes at 141 pounds. Hughes has won three straight bouts and is one of the favorites in his class. The Vikings also boast of a top wrestler in Ed Cearley at 168 pounds. Cearley has won three and lost two over the season.

The host Glide team, in its first year of grappling, has one of the top wrestlers in the 122-pound class in Charles Starnes, who has won six out of eight for the season, dropping matches only to the Perez of Sutherlin. Starnes also has one draw to his credit. Mike Hill at 157, Larry Manske at 135 and Bruce Manske at 115 pounds all have a 5-4 record for the year, but have pulled several upsets among them.

Eagles Send Four  
Another first year team, the Yoncalla Eagles, will send four wrestlers to the tourney. Jerry Mathis at 157 pounds is the only undefeated Eagle, winning his only start of the year. Doug Holloman at 175 and Wilbur Evans at 175 each have a 1-1 mark for the season, while Paul Mill at 168 has dropped his only two starts.

The Friday session will start at 5 p.m., with all wrestlers slated for weigh-in at 3:30 p.m. On Saturday the semi-final rounds will start at 1 p.m. and will run to 5 p.m., with the finals slated to open at 7:30 p.m. and run until the meet is over.

## Campanella Better, But Still Critical

GLEN COVE, N. Y. — Dodger catcher Roy Campanella continued to shake today, but he still hasn't proven today, the paralysis which struck him from chest to toes in an auto accident.

The burly, 36-year-old baseball veteran has regained some feeling in his hands, arms and upper chest.

A hospital bulletin issued through the Dodger Brooklyn office Thursday said Campanella continued to show improvement in spite of a "somewhat restless night," but he had not been in pain and his temperature was slightly above normal.

"There is further improvement in the paralysis of the feeling and he is able to move his fingertips a little," the bulletin said.

He still is on the critical list. Campanella, a three-time National League's Most Valuable Player with the Brooklyn Dodgers, was injured early Tuesday. His car skidded, hit a telephone pole and turned over.

In Tractor  
Campanella suffered a broken neck. He has been in a form of traction since a 4 1/2-hour operation to relieve pressure on a nerve.

His wife Ruth spent 2 1/2 hours at his bedside yesterday, but he slept through the visit. The Campanellas have six children.

The 215-pound catcher has been taking fluids through the mouth, but has been fed intravenously. Doctors still consider the overall picture encouraging but admit it may be months or years before he returns to normal. They are hopeful the paralysis eventually will disappear.

There is little hope that Campanella will be able to return to baseball as a player. Not only would there be physical danger because of the injury, but at 36, even Campanella probably would not be able to come back.

He already had signed for 1958 with the Los Angeles Dodgers, although taking a cut to an estimated \$36,500 after a poor year last season.
