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British Columbia Pulp Industry Reaches Accord

VANCOUVER, B.C. (AP) — Union and management negotiators announced early Friday they had reached agreement on the terms of a new contract, paving the way for an end to British Columbia's 11-week pulp and paper industry strike.

The terms were not announced. The agreement must be ratified by the rank and file workers.

The two unions involved, the International Brotherhood of Pulp, Sulphite and Paper Mill Workers and the United Papermakers and Paper Mill Workers of America, had been seeking a 12 per cent wage increase. The basic rate is now \$1.72 an hour.

The seven companies which operate the nine mills closed down Nov. 14 offered a 7 1/2 per cent pay boost, the amount recommended by a conciliation board.

The nine mills, which normally produce 10 per cent of the world's newsprint, are operated by Powell River Co. Ltd.; Alaska Pine & Blodell Ltd.; Columbia Cellulose Co. Ltd.; Canadian Forest Products Ltd.; Crown Zellerbach, Canada, Ltd.; and Elk River Co., Ltd.
