Pro Sports Federal Legislation Liked By Football, Basketball

NEW YORK — Football and basketball appeared happy today with prospective federal legislation for pro sports, but about all baseball could say for the bill was "thanks for notin'."

In brief, the bill would make only commercial aspects of baseball, football, basketball and ice hockey — concessions, ticket sales, stadium rentals, etc. — liable to antitrust laws. Other aspects — reserve clauses, player drafts, farm systems, territorial rights, etc. — which are "reasonably necessary" to the sports would escape monopoly jurisdiction.

It's that "reasonably necessary" phrase which troubles baseball, and even some members of the subcommittee.

Particularly upsetting to baseball officials was the fact the House Antitrust Subcommittee threw the television problem back into their laps.

Chairman Celler (D-NY), who drafted the bill, said it "encourages baseball to work out a television agreement," however. He defined "reasonably necessary" as anything "not detrimental to either the public or the sport itself."

The courts will decide what is detrimental he added. Pro sports have known that all along.

Celler agreed the bill may not be perfect. He said he plans to let "the dust settle a little bit" before introducing it to the full Judiciary Committee.

One baseball official, who declined to be identified, said: "We could have reached a TV agreement long ago. The problem isn't between the majors and the minors."

"But say we reach an agreement, blacking out major league telecasts in minor league areas when those minor league clubs are playing at home. The majors are happy, and the minors are happy. But then a TV station in a blacked out minor league city says we are denying its right to telecast major league games. Then we all go to court. Even if we are found to be right in taking 'reasonably necessary' action, it has cost us money. We win the battles, but we lose the war because we go broke."

What baseball wanted, and didn't get, was a bill listing what it could and could not do in restricting TV under antitrust laws — thus making costly court action unnecessary.

Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick, while not commenting directly on the bill, said he hoped the Judiciary Committee would not recommend legislation "that

would subject organized sports to the constant threat of litigation."

Approval of the reserve clause is a load off baseball's mind. The clause, giving a club title to any player it signs until he retires or is traded, is the foundation of the sport.

As for territorial rights, Celler said he would not favor a rule which would permit "one club from preventing another to move into its territory. That would not be fair or reasonable to the public, or to the sport itself." He added, however, that it would be "reasonable" for the invading club to compensate the original club "in some manner." That's what the majors are tussling with now.

Rep. Keating (R-NY), minority leader on the subcommittee, said the "reasonably necessary" provision would antagonize baseball's "many friends" in Congress, jeopardizing passage of the bill. He would favor an amendment which would clearly establish the reserve clause and other "sporting" aspects as being free of antitrust jurisdiction.

Bert Bell, National Football League Commissioner, said the bill was "a wonderful job. We are very appreciative and delighted."

Maurice Podoloff, president of the National Basketball Association, said, "Without having read the bill, it appears very fair and cooperative."

Baylor's Scoring Burst Threatens Leadership

Elgin Baylor of Seattle threatened the pace setting Oscar Robertson and Wilt Chamberlain of Kansas for individual basketball scoring honors among major college players Friday following a 60-point spree.

Baylor upped his average to 31.7 points a game Thursday night in leading Seattle to a 94-91 victory over Portland. The Seattle flash tallied 24 field goals and 12 free throws for the highest individual point production of the year.

Robertson, whose 56 points against Seton Hall at New York's Madison Square Garden was the previous high, held to first place but his average slipped to 32.7 when he tallied only 30 points in Cincinnati's 59-39 triumph over Miami of Ohio. Chamberlain, idle, remained in second place with 32.4.

Bill Don Hennen, only other member of the top 10 in action Thursday night, scored 26 points as the Panthers best St. John's of Brooklyn, 86-73. His average fell off a percentage point to 26.5.

University Of Utah Grid Position Taken By Nagel

SALT LAKE CITY — Hand some Ray Nagel, who flew quietly into town under an assumed name, happily came out in the open Thursday to accept the head football coaching job at the University of Utah.

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Cal's Defense Talked By Coach

BERKELEY, Calif. — "Defense is our cushion."

That's how basketball coach Pete Newell explains California's surprising first place tie with UCLA in the Pacific Coast Conference. Both have 5-1 records.

"We don't have much of a margin for error," Newell said Thursday. He was referring to the Bears' lack of offense. "But," he added, "we compensate with a 102 per cent defensive effort."

California is fourth in the nation in team defense and tops in the PCC, limiting conference opponents to a mere 45 points a game.

Newell's cagers are at the bottom of conference statistics in field goal shooting percentage and next to last in total scoring.

Newell claims this California team is playing as near to its physical potential as any team he has ever coached. He came to the Berkeley campus from Michigan State in 1954. Before that he coached the San Francisco Dons to the National Invitation (NIT) Championship in 1949.

"This team's ball handling is good and these boys do not give the ball away. Their concentration on both offensive and defensive plays is excellent."

"Though we don't have any great height our rebounding is as good as I could want. The boys have an aggressive determination to do the job on the backboards and they do it."

The Bears starting team averages 6 feet 3 and ranks third in the PCC in rebounds.

Warren Spahn, 36, and Alvin Dark, 35, stowed away official contracts yesterday amounting to a reported \$105,000 between them.

Spahn, his career threatened when he lost his fast ball a couple years ago, will receive a reported \$65,000 from the world champion Milwaukee Braves. That would make him the highest paid pitcher in the majors.

Bob Nieman, Baltimore power-hitter, and pitcher Tom Gorman of Kansas City, were other vets to sign yesterday while the youngsters had representation among right-hander Bob Trowbridge of the Braves, right-hander Tom Brewer of the Boston Red Sox, catcher — first baseman Gus Triandos of the Orioles, and catcher Danny Kravitz and rookie outfielder Emil Panko of Pittsburgh.

Roy Campanella Critical Still With Leg Paralysis

GLEN COVER, N.Y. — Roy Campanella remained on the critical list Friday. His legs still paralyzed.

But there was definite improvement in the condition of the 36-year-old Los Angeles Dodger catcher injured in an automobile crash early Tuesday.

A hospital bulletin late Thursday said that Campanella had regained some feeling as far down as the abdomen, a distinct improvement. A Dodger official also reported that Campy was able to move his fingertips a little. Previously, his sensitivity had been limited to the upper chest, arms or hands.

Huckleberry pie, hamburgers and corn on the cob drew the most enthusiastic reaction from a young Swedish girl who compared her country and the United States at the weekly Roseburg Rotary Club meeting Thursday noon at the Hotel Umpqua.

She is Margaret Aulin, 17, an exchange student senior at Medford High School. She arrived in the United States in August from her home town, Stockholm through the efforts of the American Field Service and under the sponsorship of the Medford Rotary Club. She will live a year with Mr. and Mrs. Frank C. Bash of Medford.

Likes Americana

With classic charm, the fair-skinned Swedish girl told of her impressions of the United States. She took particular note of the informal friendship of Americans. "We don't smile as much as you," she said.

She was also impressed by the high standard of living for women. She said women in Sweden, not having mechanical household marvels, concentrate more time in the home.

Margaret obviously took pride in her country's tradition of liberty. She pointed out that slavery had been abolished centuries ago.

Listing some of the differences between the two countries, she outlined the strong role government plays in addition to having heavy holdings of timber (about a fourth of the standing amount) and minerals, the state supports

State To Call More Witnesses In Murder Trial

SPOKANE — The state was expected to call further witnesses Friday as the murder trial of two Spokane teenage boys went into its 10th day.

Charged with first degree murder and second degree burglary are Joseph H. Weston, 15, and Nicholas W. Simchuk, 14. Both have pleaded innocent to the charges.

They are accused of fatally shooting Manley G. Martin, 63, during a burglary of Martin's hobby shop here Sept. 24.

Police Lt. Perry Miles told a Superior Court jury Thursday that Weston admitted to him firing one shot at Martin after the man first fired two bullets at Simchuk who was running from the store.

Weston said he was sitting in a car and Simchuk was running toward it, Miles said.

"He said he didn't know how the man missed—he was only 10 feet from him (Simchuk)," the officer testified.

Miles said Weston then told him of firing one shot from the car window to "frighten the man."

He said Weston told him the shooting occurred after Simchuk had gone up to the shop to re-enter it and get some gun ammunition. Weston said he spotted the man in the store and shouted to Simchuk to run, the lieutenant told the court.

Sheriff William J. Reilly's testimony earlier Thursday was substantially identical to that of Miles.

Holt, Orphans Take Off For San Francisco

HONOLULU — An Oregon farmer and 96 Korean orphans took off in a chartered plane Thursday night for San Francisco. The orphans are being adopted by families in the United States.

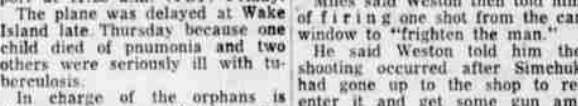
Their Korean National Airways chartered plane was due to land at San Francisco International Airport at 11:25 a.m. (PST) Friday.

The plane was delayed at Wake Island late Thursday because one child died of pneumonia and two others were seriously ill with tuberculosis.

In charge of the orphans is Harry Holt, Creswell, Ore. His daughter, Molly, said the dead child was eight-months-old Sandy Whang who succumbed despite the efforts of a doctor aboard the plane.

The two children ill with tuberculosis are among 12 of the orphans similarly afflicted who are bound for the National Jewish Hospital at Denver, Colo.

At Honolulu the plane was met by Hawaii Red Cross nurses.
