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UNIQUE CALENDAR

A unique and most interesting calendar came to my desk a few days ago. It is a calendar offered by the Oregon Historical Society, dedicated to the preservation of Oregon's historical heritage.

Illustrations are photographs and drawings concerning events and activities of the state's early days.

The front cover shows a Coos County logging scene in which oxen, ten to the team, were yarding huge spruce logs.

Illustrations deal with the arrival of the railroad in Portland, Tillamook Rock lighthouse, early day log rafting, Columbia River fishwheel, Portland waterfront with windjammers loading grain, the Cascade portage railroad, Portland's first theater, and others depicting early day conditions, scenes and activities.

Oregon's centennial year, 1959, is mentioned on each page.

During the centennial year we doubtless will be hearing a great deal about Oregon's history. It is a subject that has too little attention.

A young country ordinarily is not interested in its mileposts. It is too busy promoting progress to think about the preservation of records. It isn't until the country becomes old enough to take pride in its past that the collection of historical data becomes important.

Oregon hasn't paid much attention to its history until late years. A few dedicated persons established the Oregon Historical Society a comparatively few years ago and have made determined effort to locate and preserve records, letters, articles and pictures connected with Oregon's history. As the years pass this data grows in recognized value and public appreciation. But there still is a vast amount of material which should be made available to the Society. The Society also is deserving of more help in the acquisition and maintenance of facilities for housing its records.

DOING IT THE HARD WAY

COSTLY RIGHT OF WAY

Another friend who also remains anonymous, has a sense of curiosity and an interest in computations.

He was interested in the suit brought by the Stumbo Brothers to get right-of-way money from the State Highway Commission for a 16-foot strip overlooked when the land for Highway 99 was acquired.

The plaintiffs claimed their land was worth slightly more than \$250,000, based on sales made at \$2 for two square inches into which the plot was divided and offered to the public. Coupled with claimed interest, court costs, etc., the total involved in the Stumbo claim approached \$400,000, this friend reported.

Inasmuch as highway costs ordinarily are figured by the mile, the Stumbo formula, works out at around \$128,000,000 per mile, which, if generally adopted, would make highway costs in Oregon a trifle high, my friend opines.

WASHINGTON — (NEA)—With this session of Congress less than a month old, there are strong indications that President Eisenhower will get less of his legislative program enacted than in any of his first five years in the White House.

Rep. Richard M. Simpson (R-Pa.) chairman of this year's Republican congressional election committee, told the GOP dinner rally in Washington that the administration's score was:

In the Republican — controlled 83rd Congress, 1953-4, over 70 percent of President Eisenhower's program was approved.

In the Democratic — controlled 84th Congress, 1954-5, only 46 percent of the President's program was approved.

In 1957, first year of the Democratic — controlled 85th Congress, the score went down to 37 percent.

A further drop in 1958, second year of the 85th Congress, would mean that two out of every three Presidential recommendations to the new session would fail by the wayside.

WHAT HAS HAPPENED is that a largely Democratic — inspired revolt against Eisenhower policies and leadership has developed in Congress in spite of the President's personal popularity.

The revolt is receiving silent support from some of the GOP Old Guard conservatives who in the past have just gone along with the new Republicanism for the coastal ride.

There is a strong feeling among Democrats that they will sweep the 1958 congressional elections. No one is predicting how many more seats the Democrats will win. But they are counting on larger majorities than they now hold.

Republicans won't openly admit belief in this trend. But many of the candidates for re-election are

preparing to run scared. First reports reaching Washington on the GOP dinner rally, which on the President Eisenhower addressed from Chicago by TV, failed to eliminate the scare.

THE PRESIDENT'S talk was considered a good restatement of his ideals. But it was not seen as the fighting speech that had been promised to send party workers raring out to coral votes.

This year's Democratic revolt was sparked by Sen. Lyndon Johnson's criticism of the administration's defense program before President Eisenhower's State of the Union message.

It has now been supplemented by congressional proposals for atomic — powered satellites for outer space control introduced by Democratic Sen. Anderson of New Mexico. Gore of Tennessee and others, they go far beyond anything proposed by Republicans.

The resulting chastisement which Secretary Ezra Taft Benson got from the Senate Agriculture Committee indicates the bitterness of Democratic opposition to administration farm policy.

THE RECOMMENDATION for a five-year extension of reciprocal trade agreements is meeting opposition which may cut it down to three years or less, even with new escape clauses.

Administration plans to cut back on welfare grants to the states and to transfer some welfare responsibilities from federal to state governments are natural for congressional opposition.

It is an even bet that Congress will vote appropriations totaling more than the \$4-billion dollar budget requested by President Eisenhower. This will be a complete reversal of the economy drive of last year.

In fact, all signs now point toward a typical election-year, run-away session of Congress. There's no telling what will finally emerge.
