Green, Camas Valley Slate Missionary Convention Here

Friday evening services will be preceded by a potluck dinner at 6:30. Mrs. Rupp will speak about her "most unforgettable experience" on the mission field. At all Sunday morning services Mrs. Rupp will speak, and the Rev. Erdel will give the final address of the convention at the evening service.

Family Of Woman Shot By Girard Paid By Army

SOMAGAHARA, Japan (AP) — A U.S. Army claims officer has delivered 629,396 yen (\$1,748.32) to the husband and six children of the woman William S. Girard shot to death.

Li Col. Joseph L. Haeefe, Nacoma, Tex., added 604 yen (\$1.40) of his own to bring the payment of "consolation money" to a round 630,000 yen. Then he knelt before a Shinto shrine dedicated to the late Mrs. Naka Sakai and knelt again in the mud to put flowers on her grave.

Accused Boy Says He Fired To Scare Hobby Shop Owner

SPOKANE (AP) — "I simply fired to scare him," Joseph R. Weston, 15, charged with first degree murder in the slaying of a hobby shop owner here Sept. 24, testified Tuesday.

"I didn't fire to hit him," said the boy in his own defense. "I wish I hadn't."

He also is charged with second degree burglary. Being tried with him on identical charges is Nicholas W. Simchuk, 14. Both have pleaded innocent.

Weston said he and Simchuk returned to Martin's shop, where they had earlier stolen a radio, because he got to thinking about a model airplane in the store.

When Simchuk approached the store, Weston told the superior court jury of nine men and three women, he (Weston) saw a man inside and shouted to his companion to run back to the car.

The boy said he picked up a .22 caliber pistol from the seat beside him and "fired out the right rear window."

Earlier testimony showed that Martin was killed by a .22 caliber bullet.

"I'll swear," said Weston, that the man fired four shots at them as they drove from the scene.

The guns he and Simchuk had stolen earlier were for target shooting only, Weston said, and added he couldn't remember telling Prosecutor John Lally that they had stolen the weapons as an "added safety precaution."

He denied they had returned to the store to obtain ammunition for a .32 caliber pistol Simchuk had and insisted he had a very good reason for not wanting his companion to have ammunition.

"It was like this," he explained. "While we'd be driving around, every time I'd look at him I'd be looking down the barrel of his .32 and he'd be going 'click' all the time."

Glendale Council Continues Efforts

The Glendale City Council at its regular monthly meeting at the city hall Monday night continued its efforts to cut through necessary red tape for putting through an extension of Montgomery Avenue.

The extension would require, according to Mrs. Gerald Fox, News-Review correspondent, a 15 foot easement of Southern Pacific right-of-way for a distance of about a quarter of a mile.

The railroad had previously agreed to grant a narrower strip, but the council has been arguing for a wider section.

A communication from the railroad offices read at the meeting indicated that granting the easement is under consideration. They require, however, a city map showing the extension and the strip of railroad property involved.

Permission has already been granted by property owners adjacent to the railroad for an easement. The property owners are, Richard Hayes and Frank Woodley.

Bob Harris, a member of the council and a licensed surveyor, was authorized by the council to furnish the required map.

The council also discussed the city's storm sewer system and plans were made for investigation to determine if larger drains are necessary.

Other business was of a routine nature, according to Arlet Smith, city recorder.

U. S. Wants Better Proof Russ Intentions

WASHINGTON (AP) — Better proof of Soviet good intentions was sought by the White House today as a condition for an East-West summit conference.

A letter made public from Russian Premier Nikolai Bulganin did not go far enough, a White House statement indicated, toward meeting Eisenhower's insistence that such a conference would "hold good hope of advancing the cause of peace and justice."
