

Nathan Leopold Again Asks For Release From Prison

JOLIET, Ill. (AP) — The Illinois parole and Pardon Board has again under consideration Nathan Leopold's plea for release from Joliet Prison where he has served 33 years for his part in the 1929 slaying of a teen-age Chicago boy.

The 33-year-old balding convict, wearing prison blue jeans and a striped shirt, appeared before the board Wednesday and asked for parole. It was his fourth attempt to gain freedom. His last plea, for executive clemency, was turned down by Gov. William G. Stratton, who said that release on parole requiring supervision, was preferable to pardon.

Consider Plea

The board is to meet Feb. 20 and 21 to further consider Leopold's plea. A board spokesman said a decision would be made a few days later.

Leopold, in a half hour of testimony, told the five-man board: "I am an old man, a broken man, who pleads for your compassion. I want a chance to find myself, to know I can do good outside."

Leopold revealed his desire to work for a mountain hospital in Puerto Rico, 80 miles from San Juan. He said he was offered \$10 month and living expenses by the hospital.

Leopold told the board he was released into the 1924 murder of 14-year-old Bobby Franks in Chicago by his teen-age idol, Richard S. "Doc" Barker.

He made his plea for parole after his attorney had presented witnesses, affidavits, letters and

Continued Support Of Domestic Parity Wheat To Be Asked

SPOKANE, (AP) — Continued support of domestic parity for wheat will be recommended Friday to the full convention of the National Assn. of Wheat Growers.

The group's program committee reaffirmed Wednesday its backing of the program and expressed opposition to Agriculture Secretary Benson's request for more flexibility in the price support plans.

The committee, led by Kenneth Kendrick of Texas, also recommended that the conservation reserve program be strengthened and that more wheat be used as feed.

Support also was voiced for a congressional move to freeze the wheat support price at \$2 a bushel. The administration had announced plans to reduce that support to \$1.78 a bushel.

Benson's request that he be permitted to flex support prices between 60 and 90 per cent of parity, compared with the present range of 75 to 90 per cent, was flatly opposed by the committee.

Donald Moos, Edwall, Wash., a committee member, said flexible price support "appears not to have done the job it was designed to do." He added that further flexibility, particularly with respect to wheat, will not solve our mounting problem.
