Based on the estimated figure of the Boston Red Sox contract he signed Thursday, the 33-year-old slugger will keep only \$3,000. The federal government will get 85 per cent of the first \$100,000 and \$3,000 on each \$5,000 above it or \$80,340.

Lopes To Meet Collazo In Tonight's TV Fight

SYRACUSE, N. Y. — Joey Lopes battles Damascio Collazo, a relatively unknown Cuban, in a fight Friday night at War Memorial Auditorium.

For Lopes it's an "everything to lose, nothing to gain" affair. Originally Lopes was to fight Paolo Rossi in New York's Madison Square Garden, but the 10-round fight was switched to Syracuse by the International Boxing Club and then Collazo was substituted for Rossi. An injured heel caused Rossi's withdrawal.

Lopes, 28, of Sacramento, Calif., fought lightweight champ Joe Brown to a draw in 10 rounds last summer, was given a title try, but went down in the 11th in his second match with the champ.

Collazo, 29, has a record of 42 victories, nine losses, one draw and one "no contest." Lopes' record is 12-14-3.

The fight, to be broadcast and telecast (NBC Radio TV) at 7 p.m. PST, will be scored on the round system. In case of even rounds a point system is used to help around a draw.

16-Foot Vault Predicted For Olympian Athlete

NEW YORK — This is the year Olympian Bob Gutowski will fly over the 16-foot pole vault barrier, predicts Occidental coach Chuck Coker.

"He'll do it this year, all right," said the coach of the outdoor world record holder. "Bob is one of the truly great athletes. Two weeks ago in his first attempt for height, since June, he cleared 14-10. He doesn't vault much in training. He conditions himself through weight - lifting and sprints."

Gutowski, 23, a six-foot, 150-pounder, will make his indoor debut of the season in the Millrose Games at Madison Square Garden Saturday night. He will be defending a share of the title he and two-time Olympic champion Bob Richards won with vaults of 15-6 a year ago.

That was the highest Richards, now retired, ever soared. But the Occidental ace kept climbing. Last April 27, he cleared 15-8 1/2 to shatter the great Dutch Warmerdam's world outdoor record of 15-7 1/2 that had stood for almost 15 years.
