All three leaders walked off with victories Friday night in the close District 5-A-1 basketball race, with Springfield holding onto first place with a 4-1 record after downing South Eugene 51-44.

Roseburg and North Bend stayed in a tie for second place, both with 3-1 records, to set the stage for the Saturday night tilt between the two clubs. Roseburg dumped Marshfield 47-40 on the Roseburg floor, while North Bend was taking victory Cottage Grove 60-47, at Cottage Grove.

Saturday night games will find Roseburg traveling to North Bend and Cottage Grove traveling to meet Marshfield. South Eugene and Springfield will both be idle.

Playing a slow deliberate style of offense and making good on almost 40 percent of their shots, enabled the Roseburg Indians to take their third District 5-A-1 victory of the year, 47-40, over the Marshfield Pirates in a game played on the Indians' maples Friday night.

The Indians, playing one of their top games of the season, marched out to an early lead and held it throughout the game, with Marshfield never able to come closer than four points after the first period.

Roseburg took the first lead of the game on a free throw by Wes Jackson, but Marshfield then snared its only lead of the game, 2-1, on a field goal by big 6-6 Mel Counts.

Gary Cripps then took over and drilled three straight baskets through the hoop, and coupled with a single one by Bob Steele,

Jumping off to an early lead and holding it throughout the entire game, gave the Marshfield jayvee basketball team a 49-33 victory over the Indian jayvees in a game played on the Roseburg floor Friday.

With six different players nabbing points in the second quarter, Roseburg took a 30-21 halftime bulge, as they blistered the hoop for a better than 450 mark during the first half.

Neither team seemed able to get rolling in the third quarter and Marshfield picked up two points on the Indians to make the score read 35-28 going into the final period of action. Jackson picked up three of the Roseburg five points in the third panel, while four Pirates split the seven Marshfield points.

With less than four minutes to play in the game Marshfield cut the Indians lead down to four points, but five straight free throws by Steele gave the Indians the added support that they needed and they held on for the win.

Even with Counts in the Marshfield lineup, Roseburg still managed to control most of the rebounds, with Barrong picking off 16 and Sloan 12 for the game. The final seven points made by the Indians in the game came on free throws as the Pirates were forced to come out after the ball and fouled in the process. Marshfield was called down 16 times during the game on fouls, with Roseburg cashing in on 15 out of 22 free throw attempts. Roseburg was whistled down only five times in the game, with the Pirates able to hit only two out of the five attempts.

Cripps led the Roseburg scoring attack with 11 points, but both Sloan and Steele chipped in with 10 in the well-balanced attack. Counts paced the Pirate attack with 11 points, followed by Spurgeon with 10.

Roseburg will travel to meet North Bend tonight, with the winless Indians in a first place battle with Springfield with a 1-1 record. Both teams are tied for second now with 3-1 records in league play.

The Douglas Trojans and the Riddle Irish moved out in front of the Umpqua Valley League race Friday night, by picking up their fifth wins in league play against one loss.

The matches, which started Friday noon, will run all day Saturday, with third round matches slated to start at 2 p.m. and finals at 7:30 p.m.

Roseburg has 20 wrestlers in the finals Saturday, while Sutherlin has 18. These are only boys that have a chance to place in the top four of each weight and qualify for the district meet that will be held in Roseburg next weekend. Jerry Perez of Sutherlin, the only other defending district champ, walked through two opponents, pinning both of them in the second round. Darrell Giegax and Layton Ferguson, both of Sutherlin, also protected their un-

defeated records, each winning two matches during the day.

Frank Walters of Roseburg was the only other double winner, as he pinned the first day, taking two opponents in the 106-pound class.
