

# Roseburg Takes Nod At North Bend

## Sutherlandlin Wrestlers Cop Title In Sub-District Wrestling Meeting

Nabbing seven individual championships and placing 18 wrestlers in the district tournament, enabled the strong Sutherlandlin Bulldogs to walk away with the sub-district wrestling tournament held in Sutherlandlin over the weekend.

The Bulldogs had a total of 162 points in the two-day affair, with the Roseburg Indians a close second with 138 points. Myrtle Creek with 46, Douglas with 41, Glade with 14 and Yoncalla with three points rounded out the rest of the field.

Roseburg grabbed off five individual titles, while Douglas walked off with the other in the two-team dominated tournament. The Indians placed the most wrestlers in the district meet, with 20 slated to see action. Myrtle Creek will have seven, Douglas five and Glade two, while Yoncalla failed to land a spot.

Winning titles for the Bulldogs were Gordon Avery at 98 pounds, Jerry Perez at 115, Durrell Giegax at 125, Layton Ferguson at 136, Norm England at 141, Ron Parazzo at 177 and Roger Barrick at 191. Roseburg winners were Felix Raddatz at 106, Ken Jacobs at 148, Russ Pinar at 157, Stephan John at 168 and C. B. Simons in the heavyweight division.

**Trojan Triumphs**  
The only grappler able to break the Roseburg-Sutherlandlin hold on individual titles was Marvin Nickol of Douglas, who nabbed the 130-pound title.

Sutherlandlin also walked off with six second place and five third places, while Roseburg had four second, five third and six fourth place finishers. Myrtle Creek had one third, two second and four fourth placers, while Douglas had two second and two fourth. Glade had one third and one fourth place qualifier.

A total of 110 wrestlers participated in the tournament, with the top four wrestlers in each weight

classified to enter the district meet, with the top four winners out of sub-district meets held in Eugene and North Bend over the weekend.

Only one pin was recorded in the championship finals in some of the best wrestling seen in the area in several years. Simons of Roseburg pinned Tom Byford of Myrtle Creek in the heavyweight class for the only pin.

Two other top matches during the final day came in the 125 and 148-pound weight, where two wrestlers from the same school were

forced to go into overtime to win. In the 125-pound class, Durrell Giegax and Larry Modrell of the Bulldogs ended in a 4-6 tie, but Giegax picked up a single point in the overtime period to win 7-6.

Two Roseburg wrestlers furnished the action in the 148-pound match, as Ken Jacobs and Berry Serafin were all knotted up at 9-0 at the end of the regular match. Jacobs then picked up two points in the overtime period to gain the close win.

A referee's decision also decided one match, which involved two more Sutherlandlin wrestlers. Parazzo gained the nod over Jim Vattman in the thrilling 178-pound clash. Perez became the only one to defend his title, as Ed Cearley in the 168-pound class, the only other defending title holder, had to settle for third place.

The meet was started Friday afternoon and was run off like clockwork, thanks mainly to the fine job done by Leroy Johnson of Sutherlandlin, who directed the meet. Johnson is the Bulldog wrestling manager.

In the other two sub-district meets held over the weekend, North Bend and Springfield dominated the action. North Bend qualified 18 wrestlers in the meet held at North Bend, while Springfield nailed down 20 places in the one held at Eugene. Springfield is the defending district champion. Only

other schools with over 10 qualifiers will be South Eugene with 18 and Marshfield with 15.

The Roseburg Indians and the Springfield Millers stand together at the top of District 5-A-1 basketball standings after Saturday night's action. Roseburg called into a tie for first place by downing the North Bend Bulldogs 33-30 to give both teams a 4-1 mark at the end of the first half of play.

In the only other league game played Saturday, the Marshallfield Pirates stepped back in the winning column with a 66-47 victory over the winless Cottage Grove Lions. South Eugene and Springfield were both idle but the Millers dumped the Axemen in a Friday game to assure themselves of at least a tie for the top spot.

Playing ball control all the way

gave the high-flying Roseburg Indians a 33-30 victory over the North Bend Bulldogs Saturday at North Bend, in a crucial District 5-A-1 basketball tilt.

The win for the Indians pulled them into a first place tie with the Springfield Millers, both with 4-1 records in league play, and gave the Bulldogs a setback in their march for district honors.

About the only bright spot on the third Bend squad was the brilliant game turned in by big 6-6 center, Bob Jacobson, who scored 20 of the Bulldogs' 30 points, beside leading both teams in rebounds.

Jacobson hit all 10 of the North Bend points in the fourth quarter and half of their points in the third quarter, but he only six points the whole first half.

**Barrington Connects Early**  
The game started out like both clubs were off to the races, but once the Tribesmen had a lead they went into the old-fashioned half-court game and fought off the Bulldogs for the rest of the way.

Tom Barrington started the ball rolling for Roseburg with a big sweeping hook shot in the early seconds of the first period, followed by a free throw by Larry Sloan to give the Indians a 3-0 advantage.

Tom Younkens then hit from the side to pull North Bend to within one point, but a pair of free throws by Barrington and Wes Jackson gave the Indians another three-point bulge. Jacobson then hit on a field goal and a free throw to tie the game up at 5-5.

This marked the high spot for the Bulldogs, as Roseburg drilled seven straight points through the hoop to take a 12-5 first quarter lead.

At this point, Coach Bill Harper inserted Rod Heenrich into the lineup, and Heenrich drilled two

field goals through the hoop, along with a two pointer by Larry Sloan, to give the Indians an 18-5 lead, their biggest of the game.

Here the game started to turn into the possession stage, as Roseburg took only the shots that were almost assured of falling through. North Bend took advantage of two Indian mistakes just before the half ended and pulled to within eight points at 20-12 at intermission.

**Lead Narrowed**  
North Bend picked up another two points on Roseburg during third period action, with Jacobson nabbing four, but a basket by Jackson just before the quarter ended gave the Indians a 26-20 lead going into the final eight minutes of action.

Sloan started the fourth period with a short jumper from the side, followed by a single free throw by Barrington to push Roseburg out to a 29-20 advantage, but Jacobson drilled a fielder and four straight free throws through the nets to pull North Bend to within three points, at 29-26, with three minutes left in the game.

Two free throws by Gary Cripps gave Roseburg a 31-26 lead, but Jacobson again hit to narrow it down to three again.

Jacobson was caught fouling Barrington at this point, and when he missed the free throw, Wes Jackson went high in the air to tip it in and put the game almost out of reach of the Bulldogs, with just under a minute left to play.

A final field goal by Jacobson made the final margin three points, 33-30.

For the second straight game Roseburg cut the fouls called against them to less than 10. For the game the Indians were called down only eight times, while North Bend was nabbed 12. Of the 10 free throws attempted by North Bend, Jacobson had nine of them, hitting on eight, while Arlis Akin missed his only try.

Roseburg attempted only 33 shots at the basket, hitting on 12 of them to give them a .364 average for the game, against the 11 for 43 and .256 mark for North Bend.

For the first time in league play Roseburg was out-rebounded, with the Bulldogs grabbing off 28 rebounds, 14 by Jacobson, against only 18 for Roseburg.

Sloan and Jackson each collected nine points to lead the Indians in the scoring column.

Roseburg will rest until next weekend, when they will travel to meet South Eugene on Friday and return to meet Springfield on the Indians' trip to Eugene on Saturday.

Cal rests Friday and then meets Southern California in a return engagement Saturday and traditional rival Stanford next Monday.

Southern California is at Stanford Friday and Oregon is at Washington Saturday.

The ball-controlling Bears grabbed an early lead over UCLA, outplayed them during the first half, moved further ahead in the second half and then squeaked a desperation rally in the final minute with one of their own.

Bear scoring honors went to Al Buch with 15. Don McIntosh with 13 and Earl Robinson with 11.

Southern California topped Washington State 54-49 and Oregon defeated Idaho 82-75 Saturday.

The Idaho loss, second in two nights, dropped the Vandals from third to fifth in the PCC rankings. Southern California and Idaho tied for second.

The Trojan-Cougar game, played as the first half of a twin bill with the UCLA-Cal tilt, started as a WSC show. After scoring only one field goal in 8 minutes and 29 seconds and trailing 10-5, the Trojans came alive to jump ahead 23-21 at the half. They remained ahead thereafter.

Oregon's Charlie Franklin, a Los Angeles product, poured in 35 points to lead his mates past the Vandals. After the Ducks trailed 36-33 at the half, the 6-foot-3 Franklin sparked a second half rally that carried the game tie-hit 11 field goals and sank 13 of 14 free throw attempts.

Roseburg defeated fifth-ranked North Bend Saturday night, 33-30, after trimming Marshfield, No. 8 team in the Associated Press poll, 47-40 the night before.

North Salem, No. 3 team, turned in three victories in the week, running its season record to 17-1. Milwaukie, Lebanon and Springfield were its victims.

The No. 1 and 2 teams, Grant of Portland and Klamath Falls, each took a pair of victories in the week. Grant beat Jefferson in an overtime at, and then trounced Madison, 89-45, while Klamath Falls measured Medford twice, 59-34 and 70-59.

South Eugene, which has been slipping since its great pointmaker, Charlie Warren, was injured, fell in Springfield, 31-42, for its third defeat of the season.

Springfield had a record of 10-7 after its 1-1 week, the defeat being a 44-37 count by North Salem.

North Bend, No. 5 last week, beat Cottage Grove, 60-47, making its week an even division, 1-1.

Astoria, No. 6, had little trouble with Beaverton, 55-36.

Springfield, which won and lost in the week was the No. 7 team last week. No. 8, Marshfield, also

divided a pair, recovering from its beating by Roseburg with a 66-47 trimming of Cottage Grove.

No. 9, Pendleton, had a pair of close wins—49-48 over Baker, and 47-42 over La Grande.

The 10th place team, Roosevelt of Portland, beat Lincoln, but then lost to Franklin.
