Aptitude Test Use For High Schoolers Up

Graduates of 160 or nearly two-thirds of Oregon's private and public high schools last year used the job testing, counseling and placement facilities of the State Employment Service, according to Director Earl R. Lovell.

This represents an increase of 10 per cent over 1956 and a steady rise over the past few years.

"This increase reflects our recognition of the need of young people for aid in making a job choice," commented Lovell. "Our facilities help in uncovering their occupational potentialities and their capacity for making good in various jobs."

"We help them to become aware of the advantage of obtaining further training or education in terms of the nation's economic development. With a growing need for engineers, scientists, teachers and other skilled workers, we assist these young people in making definite plans for the future."

The general aptitude test battery, which covers over 500 job classifications ranging from semi-skilled to professional lines, has been developed and actively used all over the country by the U. S. Employment Service. Recognized by authorities as a most useful tool for vocational counseling, the battery test can be completed in about 2½ hours. In addition to aptitude tests, the employment service uses performance tests for such occupations as typing and shorthand.

The 26 local offices of the state system already are planning this year's testing, counseling and placement activities in cooperation with high school vocational guidance personnel all over the state. They hope to reach more than the 4,326 graduates assisted last year.

A school official who has been closely in touch with the program in recent years comments as follows: "Our youth are learning more about themselves, their aptitudes, abilities, and interests. They are being supplied with information concerning the world of work. They are becoming acquainted with the State Employment Service and some of its personnel. They are learning how to find a job and are picking up pointers on how to hold a job. The information they have received will help in planning and choosing careers. Furthermore, the interest generated by these services tends to increase their interest and participation in school work."

Association Accredits Myrtle Creek School

According to information released by the Northwest Assn. of Secondary and Higher Schools, Myrtle Creek High School has been fully accredited for the 1957-1958 school year.

Accreditation with the Northwest association means that the school has met all standards pertaining to buildings, the library, permanent records, graduation requirements, school atmosphere, academic preparation of faculty and administration, teacher and student load, activities, and bonding and auditing practices involving financial procedures.

Educator Claims Too Much Time Spent On Trivia

NEW YORK — An educator suggested Saturday that too much time is being spent on classroom trivia and not enough on encouraging talented boys and girls to develop ideas.

President C. V. Newsom of New York University told the Thomas A. Edison Foundation's national awards luncheon.

"Fifty thousand technicians are no substitute for 50 men who can synthesize new principles or can synthesize existing knowledge to obtain useful ideas."

"The mad scramble to keep ahead of Russia in the numerical production of scientists and engineers is ludicrous and based on misconception."

Newsom said his concern was with boys and girls who have unusual talents and the potential to promulgate new ideas of great significance.

"I believe sincerely that time spent in formal instruction should be diminished. We try to teach too much anyway, including a considerable amount of trivia that possesses only the justification of tradition."

'U.N.' Debates Arab Problems

All responsibility for care of Arab refugees was shifted to the Arab governments following a debate last week staged by the Roseburg High International Relations League.

In the debate each student represented a country and tried to follow the policies of that country. All debate was carried out according to the procedure used in the real United Nations.

Three resolutions were brought to the floor on the question of the Arab refugee problem. The first called for dissolution of the state of Israel. The second was for an increase of U.N. aid to refugees.

Both these were discarded, however, in favor of a resolution making the refugees wards of the Arab governments by 1960. This would force the Arabs to solve the problem themselves. In the past, they have been slow to assimilate the refugees into their countries.

This was the second model U.N. held by the club this year. The purpose is to prepare club members for a statewide model U.N. to be held this spring.

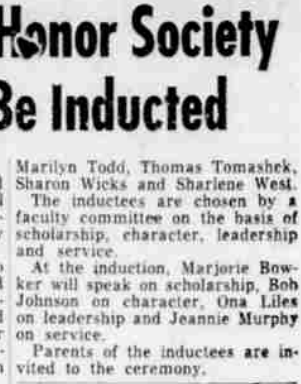
STUDENT BOTANIC

OSC Science Classes Increase 30 Per Cent

CORVALLIS — Oregon State College science classes have a 30 per cent greater enrollment this winter than a year ago.

Officials attribute this to the nationwide concentration on scientific progress.

F. A. Gillilan, dean of science, said the number of students majoring in mathematics increased 26 per cent. Science education showed a 51 per cent enrollment increase, chemistry 37 per cent, geology 32 per cent and chemistry 27 per cent.

There now are 1,183 science students compared to 912 last year, Gillilan said.

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
