Fish, Game Legislation Talked By Gun Club

Plans for cooperation with the legislative interim committee on fisheries and participation in the public hearing to be conducted by the committee in Roseburg, March 11, featured the regular meeting of the Roseburg Rod and Gun club Tuesday night.

The committee, headed by Rep. W. O. Kelsay, Roseburg, is touring the state to determine sentiment concerning possible consolidation of the fish and game commissions. It also seeks opinion as to whether laws now are adequate for the best possible development and use of the fishery resource and how game birds and big game can best be managed.

The committee, Kelsay told the Roseburg club, has completed a swing through eastern and central Oregon and is preparing for a series of meetings through the interior valleys of western Oregon. Meetings in the coastal zone will follow.

Offers Facilities

The Rod and Gun club authorized the use of its facilities at Winchester for the hearing, appointed a committee to prepare a statement on behalf of the club and instructed that the officers do all possible to advertise the public aspect of the meeting and urge all interested persons to attend.

The committee is making an open minded study of all phases of the fish and game resources to the state and of management policies and practices, Rep. Kelsay said. No member of the committee to his knowledge, he said, has so far formed a definite opinion concerning any recommendations. It is seeking to obtain all possible information received and determine whether there is need for additional legislation.

Each session of the legislature, he said, finds one or more bills seeking either to abolish one or the other of the two commissions or to bring about their consolidation. But many factors are involved in any change from present organizational methods, he told the members of the Roseburg club. The Game Commission, for example, is supported entirely by fees paid by sports anglers and hunters. It is self-supporting. The Fish Commission, however, receives much of its support from the public treasury. Many people, Kelsay said, feel it is not proper to use Game Commission revenue to support a commercial fishery which can't pay its own way. On the other hand, he explained, there is much duplication and overlapping in hatchery effort, management, supervision, vehicular travel and clerical

work, resulting in some waste of money.

Kelsay expressed a personal opinion that much work remains to be done by both commissions in clearing streams to open additional spawning areas and said he favored general fund appropriations to speed this essential work. He also expressed his appreciation for the service being given the committee by former Rep. John P. Amacher.

It was indicated that a proposal will be made at the hearing that the present legislative act forbidding the taking of sturgeon in the Umpqua River be repealed and that the sturgeon fishery be opened to regulation by the Game Commission.

Regional Game Supervisor James Vaughn said a limited sturgeon fishery would make fish available

for management study. Under the present prohibition, he said, no satisfactory management is possible because no fish are being caught or examined.

Club members heard reports from committees and officers, and from delegates to the recent state convention of the Oregon Wildlife Federation, with which the Roseburg club is affiliated.

Charles S. Collins, of the Roseburg club, who is to be installed at the June meeting as president of the state federation, was presented, as was Ernest Black, recently elected regional vice president.

Following the business session the club members were entertained with a motion picture film depicting a duck hunting trip on partly frozen Alaskan waters. A Dutch feed concluded the meeting.

Local Hunters' Skill (?)

Controlled hunts by the Oregon Game Commission are indicating that Oregon hunters today aren't the skilled and potent marksmen traditionally typical of the Far West. In fact, says James Vaughn, regional game supervisor, the word "marksman" in connection with at least some Oregon hunters must be used loosely.

Reporting to the Roseburg Rod and Gun Club on a recent controlled elk hunt in Coos County, Vaughn says the hunt apparently was successful in its purpose, but with small credit to the hunters.

Steelhead Migration Up On North Umpqua River

Improved water conditions have resulted in a material increase in the rate of steelhead migration in the North Umpqua River, members of the Roseburg Rod and Gun club were told at a club meeting Tuesday night.

Because of unusually low water earlier in the season, the migration had lagged considerably behind normal, according to reports from the regional office of the Oregon Game Commission.

Since the first of the month, however, the club was told, more than 1,000 fish have been tallied through the counting station at Winchester dam, bringing the total to date to more than 2,800, fifth best out of 12 years for the same date.
