

Sweetland Protests Meet Called By Senator Gill

MILWAUKIE (U)—State Sen. Monroe Sweetland (D-Clackamas) protested Wednesday against a special Senate committee meeting called by state Sen. Warren Gill (R-Linn) to take up basic school support.

Sweetland said he had received an invitation to the meeting, Feb. 14.

"As chairman of the Senate Education Committee I am interested in working out the best possible policy in this perplexing field. But I most certainly shall not appear before any but the official Interim Committee on Education which was given this duty by the 1957 Legislature. I trust other responsible agencies, official or private, will likewise honor only the call of the legally constituted interim committee," Sweetland said in a letter to Gill.

Has No Standing
"Your 'rump' committee has no standing. Since I am not a member of the official interim committee, I am writing you thus without the personal feeling in the matter which members of that committee might feel."

Brothers To Get Mental Checks

ALBANY, Ore. (U)—Two brothers were charged Tuesday with first degree murder and then sent to the state hospital at Salem for psychiatric examinations.

The charges were filed against Andrew Wolfe, 22, Springfield, Ore., and his brother, Phillip, 20, an airman stationed at Larson Air Force Base at Moses Lake, Wash.

The two are accused of participating in the killing of William C. Howell, the 57-year-old Albany man was knifed to death Sunday.

The murder charges were filed against the Wolfe brothers by Linn County Dist. Atty. Courtney Johns.

When they later appeared in district court here, Johns and defense attorneys agreed the brothers should undergo the examinations.

They were ordered to the hospital by Judge Wendell Tompkins.

Ozark Farmer Sentenced For Cruelty To Child

LEBANON, Mo. (U)—Bert Blackburn, 26, an illiterate Ozark farmer, was sentenced Tuesday to three years in prison for mistreating a 3½-year-old son.

Blackburn's common-law wife Vellie Davis, 24, was sentenced to two years in prison the day before on a similar charge.

Little David Lee Blackburn was so mauled and starved when he was brought to a Lebanon hospital by Blackburn's mother three weeks ago that doctors feared he would die.

New Kind Of Coke May Help Increase Steel Development

BOULDER, Colo. (U)—A new kind of coke may lead to increased development of the steel industry in the West.

Tests on the coke are underway at the University of Colorado's chemical engineering laboratories.

John H. Blake, associate professor of engineering, is directing a project to make coke from low grade coal mined in the West to compete with coke from high-grade Eastern fuel.

Blake's project is sponsored by the Food Machinery and Chemical Corp. of New York. It needs coke for its plant in Pocatello, Idaho, and decided a year ago to experiment in the development of coke from fuel available in the West.

"In the past, coke for industrial use could be made only from the high grade coals found in the eastern part of the United States," Blake said.

"Shipping it to the West is not only too expensive for most industrial uses, but it has become increasingly difficult to obtain it all in this part of the country."

"We can make good coke right now."

"There's no question but that we could design a plant tomorrow using our technique. But we're trying to streamline the process, and should be able to iron out some of the kinks before we take the big step," Blake said.

Blake is experimenting with a fluid charring process.

"The potentialities are tremendous," he said. "The new process should be less expensive than the standard methods of coking anitracite (the eastern coal). And, of course, we are able to use coal never before available to industry."

DYNAMITER CONVICTED
CLINTON, Tenn. (U)—A jury of 12 fathers last night convicted Edward Cline, 44-year-old former convict, of conspiring to dynamite racially integrated Clinton High School.

Criminal Court Judge D. L. Hutson immediately passed sentence of from 2 to 10 years in prison as recommended by the jury.

Clifford Lowe, 30, on trial with Cline, was acquitted.

Principal Keeps Pupils After School Hours

KANSAS CITY (U)—M. Wayne McKanna, principal at Northeast High School, has revived an old fashioned punishment in an effort to snuff out rowdiness among pupils.

Offenders will be assigned to "eighth-hour class." The normal school day is divided into seven periods, so the eighth-hour pupils will be staying after school.

"It's time for an about face in handling discipline," McKanna said.

"We're going back to some of the things we used to do. There has been a philosophy that it is not good psychology to keep youngsters after school. I think it's time for that philosophy to go."

McKanna decreed a schedule of assignments to eighth-hour classes. Getting sent to the office for misbehaving will draw one period. Misconduct in class, once established by the principal, draws five. Misbehaving in eighth-hour class gets five more periods. Cutting a class is worth two. A pupil failing to respond to roll call in eighth-hour class is suspended automatically.

Nation's Traffic Death Rate Drops For 1957

CHICAGO (U)—The nation's traffic death toll in 1957 was 38,500, a 3 per cent drop from 1956, and marked the lowest mileage death rate in history.

"The 1957 record is, of course, definitely encouraging," said the National Safety Council, which announced the figures today. "It reflects an unmistakable improvement in traffic behavior and enforcement."

Deaths on the highways last year compared with 39,628 in 1956, which was one of the highest on record. The 1,100 fewer deaths in 1957 was the second largest reported in any year since the end of World War II and was surpassed only by a decrease of approximately 2,400 deaths in 1954, the council said.

The 1957 mileage death rate (deaths per 100 million vehicle miles) was 5.5 compared with the previous all-time low of 6.3 in 1956 and 1954.

Hatfield Would Debate Unander

PORTLAND (U)—G. H. Hatfield proposed Tuesday that he and Sig Unander go on a statewide tour for joint appearances in their campaign for the Republican nomination for governor.

To win in November, Hatfield said in a noon talk to the Metropolitan Club, "any Republican nominee must be ready, willing and able to publicly debate the issues of the campaign face to face with his Democratic opponent."

And so, he said, to get such a campaign going, "and in the interests of conserving party funds for the fall campaign, I invite Mr. Unander to accompany me."

Hatfield said the tour could be arranged so official duties would not be disturbed. He is secretary of state and Unander is state treasurer.

He added that if nominated he would invite the Democratic nominee to make a similar tour with him.

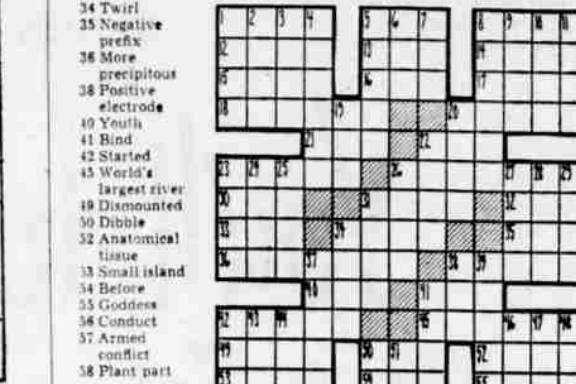
