Members of the Yoncalla Women's Study Club held a potluck luncheon and meeting Thursday afternoon at the city hall.

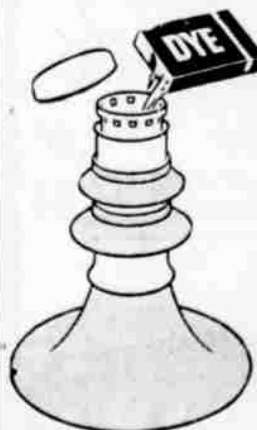

PORTLAND (AP)—Carl A. Schram, Portland contractor, left an estate valued at \$3,267,149 when he died last September, appraisers said Tuesday.

They said most of it was in stocks. He also was half owner of the Parker-Schram Construction Co., his partnership in which was valued at \$440,764.

The widow, Ida Marie Schram, and three sons, all of Portland, were named as heirs. Mrs. Elaine Nichols, Oregon City, a sister, received \$10,000.
