Senate Group Approves Milk Program Extension

WASHINGTON — A Senate Agriculture subcommittee approved a bill Wednesday calling for a three-year extension of the school milk program at a cost of 75 million dollars a year.

The bill now goes to the full Agriculture Committee. It would continue the federal-state program of providing low-cost milk to pupils. The subcommittee also approved a three-year extension of a program providing surplus dairy products to the armed forces and Veterans Administration installations, with no dollar limit spelled out.

A third bill approved by the subcommittee would extend for two years a program designed to eradicate brucellosis, a dairy cattle disease. It would authorize use of 20 million dollars a year of Commodity Credit Corporation funds for this purpose.
