The Roseburg squad, which last week vaulted into the No. 5 position in the Associated Press Poll, was beaten twice over the weekend.

Friday night No. 8 South Eugene nudged Roseburg 49-30, and Saturday night sixth-ranked Springfield turned the tide, 42-38. Springfield sank 16 of 30 field goal attempts in its victory.

Roseburg last week made its first appearance of the season in the poll after upsetting two of the top 10 teams in the state.

South Eugene continued its winning pace Saturday night with an easy 71-48 victory over Cottage Grove. John Polhemus got 19 for the winners.

Two other teams in the top 10 Saturday night clinched berths in the state A-1 basketball tournament.

No. 1, Klamath Falls, got its journey position by trimming Ashland, 70-37. And fourth-ranked Astoria clinched a place in the prep classic by downing Milwaukie.
