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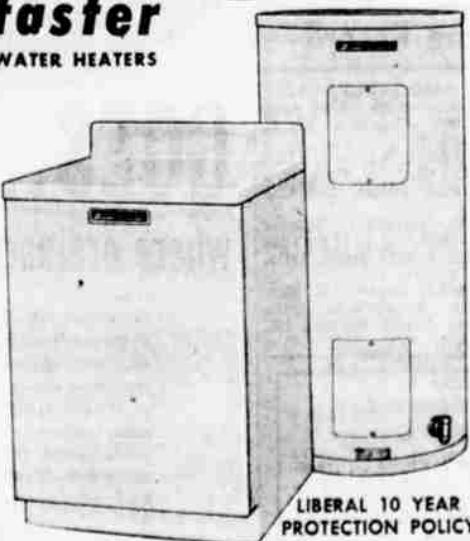
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Community News Briefs

Miller's action, taken in a letter to Mayor John T. McKennan, followed by one day the sudden resignation of Deputy Police Chief Vincent D. Fiore, whose finances also are being investigated.

Miller expressed confidence his financial affairs would be found "in good order."

UP Erroneously Listed For Pullman Increases

SALEM — Public Utilities Commissioner Howard Morgan's office said Thursday it had erroneously listed the Union Pacific Railroad as having received approval for an increase in Pullman sleeping car rates.

The increase, effective Feb. 15, applied in Oregon only to the Southern Pacific's "Cascade" passenger train between Portland and Klamath Falls.

The Southern Pacific said the rate for roomettes between the two points would increase from \$8.10 to \$9.70.



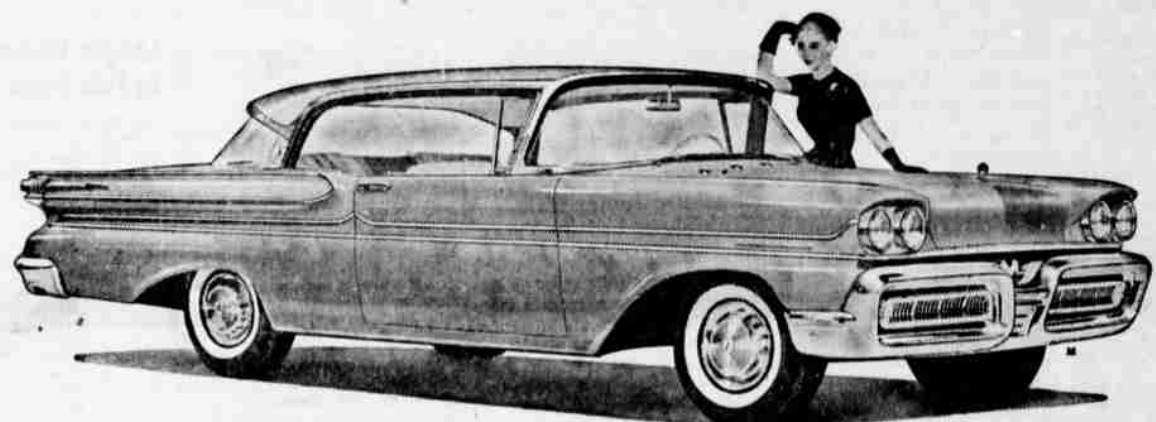
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
