

Chamber Secretary Gives Humorous Talk To Kiwanians

Roseburg Kiwanians heard Harold Reame, chamber of commerce manager, in his entertaining presentation of "See Ourselves as Others See Us," narrated and illustrated with placards at their Tuesday meeting in the Umpqua Hotel.

The chamber manager, who has addressed some 5,146 meetings of this type, gave a running account, accompanied by the illustrated placards, of the types of people who attend and take part at meetings and discussions.

Twenty-two different kinds of people were personalized and described, including such types as the initiator, encourager, playboy, harmonizer, evaluator, expeditor, hand-shaker, compromiser, monopolizer, doubter, fact-seeker, whisperer, zipper-mouth and others.

Of the zipper-mouth, Reame said that it is this type of person, despite his apparent inactivity, that gives him "profound faith in the uniqueness of every individual" and proves that every person has something to contribute to a meeting, borne out by his presence.

All the other types, too, contribute their part to the well-rounded discussion, and each person can see something of himself in these types, he concluded.

Also introduced at the meeting was Gwen Harper, Spokane, a member of the regional staff of the Camp Fire Girls Council. She expressed thanks to the club for its labor in developing Camp Fire as a summer camp for the local Camp Fire Girls and extended an invitation to the club to visit the camp in the summer when it is buzzing with activity.

Club President Frank Dixon disclosed plans of Kiwanis to form a Boy Scout troop here in the future.

37 Douglas Co. Boys Will Make Portland Tour

Thirty-seven Douglas County boys will travel to Portland Saturday for a weekend of sightseeing at the expense of a Portland newspaper, The Oregon Journal.

The boys will make the trip under a statewide "See Portland" project sponsored by the paper. More than 300 boys from throughout the state, all carriers, will receive the tour as a reward for fulfilling a subscription requirement.

Veterinarian Wins \$128,000 On TV Quiz

NEW YORK (AP) — An Abbeville, La., veterinarian who came to this country nine years ago won \$128,000 on a TV quiz program Tuesday night for his knowledge of obscure details of the 1876 presidential election.

Ukrainian-born Dr. Alexander Sas-Jaworsky identified pictures of the candidates, Samuel J. Tilden and Rutherford B. Hayes, and also recalled that it was Hayes who became the 19th president; the four states in which votes were disputed were Oregon, Florida, South Carolina and Louisiana; the independent on the electoral commission was David Davis and he was replaced because he was elected to the Senate; and Davis' replacement was Supreme Court Justice Joseph Bradley.

Next week Sas-Jaworsky can return to the program, CBS' "The \$64,000 Question," and begin a series of questions leading to \$192,000.

Boy Faces Charge Of Killing Mother; Doesn't Know Why

ROXBURG, Idaho (AP) — Tearful Tommy Brophy, 15, sat waiting in a whitewashed jail cell Wednesday while court officials sought an attorney to defend him on a charge of first-degree murder.

The clean-cut youth, described as well-behaved and obedient, is accused of pumping two shotgun blasts into his mother, 36-year-old Nellie May Hinckley, then firing a rifle bullet into her head.

Crying, the teen-ager told a reporter Tuesday, "I don't know why I did it. I just don't know."

He talked with Quentin Foley of the Idaho Falls, Idaho, Post-Register shortly before the inquest into his mother's death. The coroner's jury later ruled Mrs. Hinckley died by criminal means and "Tom Brophy is guilty thereof."

Had Gun In Room

"I had the shotgun and rifle in my room," the weeping, dark-haired boy told Foley. "My mother was in bed. She got up to go to the bathroom and when she came out I shot her with the shotgun."

"She ran screaming into the living room. I shot her again." The shotgun pellets tore through her upper chest and into her stomach. Tommy said she didn't do anything. "She just looked at me and said, 'Tommy, Tommy, she was breathing funny, she was bothered me. I went into the bedroom and got the rifle and put it to her head and shot her again.'"

That was Monday morning. Tommy's stepfather, Hyrum Hinckley, found the body when he came home for lunch. Tommy and a friend were picked up by officers later that day north of this East Idaho town.

Tommy's father, Tommy Brophy Sr., is a railroad dispatcher in Butte, Mont.

The youth's arraignment was continued Tuesday until the court could appoint an attorney to defend him.

Oregon Reports Balmy Weather Around State

It was 39 degrees at customary cold Baker in Eastern Oregon Tuesday, and that was the coldest spot in the Pacific Northwest.

The mild winter showed no signs of abating. In contrast to the East's wintry storms, the Northwest's weather was balmy with some rain. Snow melt put many streams bank full and there was some concern over flooding by tributary streams in the Columbia Basin.

The Weather Bureau said Jan. 7 was the last day of a normal winter temperature at Portland since Jan. 1. The average has been 10 per cent above the customary readings.

Walla Walla had a low Tuesday morning of 50, after a high of 55 Monday. "Springtime temperatures prevailed," said the Weather Bureau.

At Baker, fuel dealers said pressed log sales were down by half, coal sales were off a third, oil sales were down all the way from 10 to 30 per cent, and natural gas consumption was down 10 to 20 per cent.

The Portland Gas and Coke Co. said that for the heating season which started last Sept. 1, gas consumption was down 13 per cent. Clothes through the country east of the Cascades where winter generally is cold, said they hadn't moved their supplies of winter clothing.

The Bonneville Power Administration, with an unaccustomed surplus of power, said at least a fourth of the surplus was due to the mild winter and consequent light heating demands.

3 Cubans Held; Arms Seized

HOUSTON (AP) — About 50 officers raided a house near Seabrook on Galveston Bay Tuesday and reported finding it "jammed full of weapons and ammunition," presumably destined for a Cuban revolution.

One customs agent said "millions of rounds of ammunition" were seized along with "every conceivable type of weapon."

Three Cubans were arrested here Monday and charged with conspiring to violate the National Firearms Act while allegedly collecting weapons and ammunition for use in efforts to overthrow Cuban President Fulgencio Batista.

Charged with conspiring to commit an offense against the United States were: Pedro Luis Chaviano Reyes, 44, an exiled Cuban Army Sergeant who said he had been living in Miami, Fla., for the past year; was a tool and die maker in Miami, and Francisco Obregon, 38, who said he was a Miami television repairman and came to Houston because he had been told work was easy to find here.

A fourth man was arrested but released without being charged. Chaviano and Obregon are Cubans and Villanueva said he became a naturalized United States citizen in New York in 1953.

Spokane Officers Probe Two Deaths From Stabbings

SPOKANE (AP) — An intensive investigation has been launched surrounding the fatal stabbing of a Spokane barber Monday night.

Amador D. Vivit, 47, died an hour after he was found on the floor of a back room of his shop. He had been stabbed seven times with a butcher knife he owned.

Police said three customers were in the shop when Vivit, sitting on a couch, suddenly jumped up and ran into the back room. Then, police were told, the customers heard Vivit shout and a slump to the floor. They saw no one else in the room.

Spokane County Coroner Dr. William E. Jones said "the possibility of suicide has not been ruled out."

Vivit's wife told Police Feb. 7 that she had been robbed of \$1,617 at her home by two men who bound and gagged her. Vivit told police three days later his wife was missing.

SPOKANE (AP) — A man was stabbed and killed with a butcher knife in a downtown hotel room early Tuesday.

Marion Holcomb, 46, was found dead in his bed at the Ryan Hotel, a knife wound in the heart, and a 73-year-old man told police he stabbed him.

Detective Perry Miles said elderly Frank Edwards told him he awoke about 2 a.m. Tuesday, found an intruder in his room and feared he was being robbed. He said he picked up a butcher knife.

"A scuffle took place and the knife went in Holcomb," Miles said. "Investigation indicates the door to Edwards' room appeared to have been open."

Holcomb lived two doors down the hall from Edwards in the hotel but they didn't know each other, Miles said. The detective said Holcomb managed to get to his own room after the incident, lay down on the bed and died.

Wage, Hour Commission Slates Hearing Thursday

SALEM (AP) — The state Wage and Hour Commission will meet here Thursday to hear testimony on a proposal to change regulations governing employment of women and minors in respect to sanitary and physical welfare conditions.

State Labor Commissioner Norman O. Nilsen said the discussions will center on standards of cleanliness, lighting, ventilation and other health protections. These regulations have been in effect since 1941.

Boy Identifies Accused Kidnaper

EVERETT (AP) — Eight-year-old Lee Cray named from the witness stand George Edward Collins, 21, as the man who kidnapped and held him for four days last September until he escaped.

The boy testified Tuesday at the first degree kidnapping trial of Collins. Collins is accused of abducting the boy from a schoolyard at nearby Lynnwood last Sept. 23 and holding him for \$10,000 ransom.

Mrs. Katherine Meyers, 21, facing similar charges, will go on trial next Monday.

The boy also told interestingly how his abductor took him into the woods to watch a "battle" between two spiders.

Spider Episode

Lee said the spider episode took place on the third day of his captivity. The next day, he said, they went back to the woods to see how the spiders were doing. It was on that day that the unemployed aircraft worker allegedly tied him to a tree with a belt, from which the boy later escaped by unbuckling the belt with his teeth.

Earlier in his testimony, the boy was asked by Superior Judge Charles B. Denny and Dennis Britt, defense attorney, whether he knew the meaning of the oath he took before testifying.

"It means you've sworn to God you will not say the wrong thing," said Lee. Then he pointed out Collins as his kidnaper.

Lee also told the jury of nine men and three women how he was alternately held inside Collins' car and in the automobile's trunk.

The boy was preceded to the witness stand by his parents, an aunt, two postal employees who handled the ransom note and an FBI agent.

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State Department Accuses N. Korea Of Hijacking Plane

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department accused Communist North Korea Tuesday of "hijacking" a South Korean commercial airliner that landed in North Korea Sunday.

Press Officer Lincoln White said Communist behavior in the plane incident "demonstrates again the absence of good faith or sincerity which are needed if any progress is to be made in the settlement of the Korean problem."

White added in a statement it seems obvious North Korea agent or several of them forced the South Korean plane to land in North Korea. It was bound from Pusan to Seoul, both in South Korea.

He noted that among those aboard were the American pilot, Willis P. Hobbs, Vallejo, Calif.; Lt. Col. Howard McClelland, a U.S. Air Force officer assigned to the U.S. Military Advisory group in Korea, two German nationals and 30 Koreans including members of the Korean armed forces.

"The North Koreans have acknowledged the presence of the aircraft in North Korea," White said. "According to press reports, some persons were wounded and received medical treatment upon landing."

"This would seem but another provocative act by the Communist authorities in North Korea," he said.

Mental Patient Escapes, Gives Up

STEILACOOM (AP) — The 14-year-old boy who confessed strangling little Kathryn Lane Ruoff in Seattle in June of 1956 escaped with another inmate from Western Washington Hospital here Tuesday night but both surrendered three hours later.

John Earl Ray Barker was committed to the mental institution after the body of the four-year-old daughter of State Rep. Richard Ruoff was found in a garage.

Dr. Robert W. Brown, hospital clinical director, said Barker and Stanley Peterson, 17, Bremerton, escaped at 8 p.m. from a group returning to their wards from the hospital auditorium after attending a social hour.

Three hours later, Dr. Brown said, Peterson telephoned from a telephone booth a mile from the hospital and told officials he and Barker wanted to surrender.

RECEIVES SHARE

WASHINGTON (AP) — Oregon received \$4,653 and Washington \$4,078 as their share of federal mineral lease receipts for the last six months of 1957, the Bureau of Land Management announced Monday.

FBI Help Asked In Investigating Train Derailment

MOYIE SPRINGS, Idaho (AP) — The Spokane-International Railroad Co. asked the FBI Tuesday to assist in the investigation of a freight train derailment near here.

"We can't say that sabotage is involved, but the wreck occurred in the same area where we have had similar difficulties," said Fred C. Rummel, company president.

"In that same region we have had switches thrown and articles placed on the tracks."

Three diesel locomotive units and 15 loaded box cars left the tracks Monday and 100 yards of track was torn up.

"We have not determined the cause of Monday's wreck, but we have asked the FBI to assist our men in the investigation," he said.

A broken rail was tentatively blamed for the derailment. Most of the 70 cars in the train were loaded with fertilizer from British Columbia. Five cars were smashed and some rolled down a small bank.

Conductor Edward W. Pringle of Spokane received minor cuts but no one else was injured. The train was enroute to Spokane.

Churchill Sick With Flu; Has Good Night

NICE — 8 ailing, 83-year-old Sir Winston Churchill was reported by a member of his household to have passed a good night.

A staff member at the villa where Churchill is vacationing said the former Prime Minister had suffered a chill and required rest. He insisted that the aged statesman's condition is not serious.

The informant also used the word "cough" in describing Churchill's sickness.
