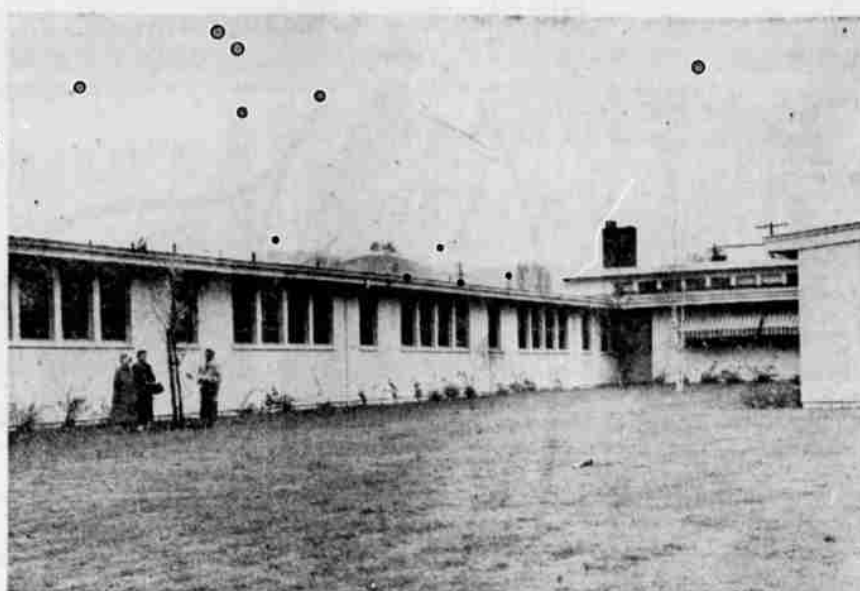
### Residents Move

## Joffrey Ballet On Stage Tonight At Senior High

The Robert Joffrey Theatre Ballet will be presented tonight at 8:15 p.m. in Roseburg Senior High School auditorium under Community Concert Assn. sponsorship. The Senior High is being used because of the more adaptable stage for dance productions.

Featured will be Beatrice Thompson, Gerald Arpino and Dianne Consoer as principals. Others appearing will be Francine Martinet, Marie Jaquet, Nels Jorgensen, Vicente Nebreda, Maria Grandy, Gayle Young and Alfonso Cata, with Johnathan Watts, courtesy of the New York City Ballet, as guest artist. Pianists are Helio de Soto and Howard Barr.

The program will consist of four ballets. The first will be "Pas Des Deesses," a romantic ballet, choreographed by Joffrey and with the music of John Field. In it the dancers duplicate the pose of the famous 1846 lithographs by Chalon depicting ballerinas of that period.

The second number will be a light dance, "Contretemps," which takes place in a French seaside resort. Next will be "Whirligig," a dance for ten, choreographed by Todd Bolender and using the music of Mozart. The concluding selection will be Joffrey's choreography of "Le Bal," with music by Emmanuel Chabrier. This is a lively pot-pouri of Spanish dance-tunes and rhythms, featuring the entire cast.
