Campy's Future Still Clouded

GLEN COVE, N.Y. (AP)—The future of Roy Campanella remained clouded today.

Time may determine whether the 37-year-old Los Angeles Dodgers' catcher will recover from the broken neck he got in an auto accident Jan. 28.

He is in Glen Cove Community Hospital, still paralyzed from the hips down and his muscle strength has not improved.

Harry C. F. Gifford, administrator of the hospital, said yesterday, "The longer the paralysis remains unchanged, the less one can expect for the future."

There was no mention whether he'll ever play baseball again.

Gifford's report said, "The consensus remains that specific predictions can not be made at this time as to the degree of neurological improvement." It added an ominous note that the slight improvement shown in the first week has tapered off.

Campanella's general medical condition was termed "satisfactory." The likeable, roly-poly baseball player with the squeaky, high-pitched voice was showing a great deal of interest in his surroundings. He has been listening to the radio and soon will be able to watch television.

Roy's wife says she's not discouraged—"I think it's just going to take time. Anything to do with nerves takes time."

Gavilan's Comeback Stopped By Tiger

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Ralph (Tiger) Jones, a tough-skinned boxer from Brooklyn, sidetracked Kid Gavilan's comeback attempt with a split decision last night and the Cuban admitted afterward, "he good fighter—better than I expect."

Jones claimed Gavilan butted him over the eye in the ninth, inflicting a cut. The Kid denied this, saying, "I feel right hand land real good—bang on the eye." There were no knockdowns in the 10-round bout.

Gavilan weighed 154 1/2 and Jones 154 1/2.

Gavilan said he thought he won, but had no alibi.

Jones admitted the 32-year-old Kid from Camaguey, veteran of 140 ring battles and holder of the welterweight title from 1951 to 1954, "hit me with one bolo that I can remember."

Gavilan showed occasional flashes of his old speed but Jones, 29, took everything Gavilan had. He kept boring in, bothering the kid with a sharp left to the head and mixing it with a good right that frequently found its mark.

STOCKHOLM (AP)—Frank Cammack, 21-year-old ski jumper from Wenatchee, Wash., was injured seriously Tuesday when he fell on his head in a practice jump.

Doctors said he had broken a cervical (neck) vertebra and suffered a severe brain concussion. He will be hospitalized for a long time. The physicians described his injuries as serious but not critical.

SPAHN WEARS COWBOY DUDS

MEALESTER, Okla. (AP)—Warren Spahn, pitching star for the Milwaukee Braves, has a different garb in the off season.

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Nino Valdes Records Howl

NEW YORK (AP)—"How about me?"

That came in an anguished howl Thursday from hulking Nino Valdes during a discussion of the heavyweight situation and champion Floyd Patterson's next title defense.

"Why I no get chance?" asked the 6-3, 210-pound Cuban, waving his right hand. "I No. 1 contender before and no get chance. I beat Ezzard Charles and he get two title fights with Rocky Marciano. Me? I get none."

"I show everybody now. I knock out (Alex) Miteff in Garden Friday night. I make big explosion and show the peoples and commissions."

The 33-year-old Cuban and his opponent, 32-year-old Alex Miteff of Argentina, attended a boxing writers' luncheon where the heavyweight situation was explained by Julius Helfand, chairman of the State Athletic Commission and president of the World Championship Committee.

Miteff, who is not clamoring for a title shot, listened quietly. He declined to make any prediction on the fight which has aroused the large Latin-American set in the city as well as the ordinary fans.

"I will have my say after the fight," said Miteff, 22, 6-1 and 202 pounds. "All I will say now is that I am in good shape and hope to be at my best Friday night."

Seventy Per Cent Pay Increase Given Player

CHICAGO (AP)—They'll be calling pitcher Dick Donovan a super salesman.

He sold the Chicago White Sox on giving him a 70 per cent pay increase. It is the biggest salary boost in the club's history.

The 30-year-old right-hander, who mowed down the New York Yankees three times last season, ended his holdout Wednesday by settling for a 1958 stipend of about \$30,000.

Donovan's 727 won-lost percentage tied him for the American League lead with New York's Tom Sturdivant. His 16 complete games in 28 starts tied him for complete game percentage of .571 with teammate Billy Pierce. He ranked sixth in the league in earned run average with 2.77.

Liability Insurance For Hunters Demanded

GRANGEVILLE, Idaho (AP)—Pros. Atty. Wayne MacGregor of Idaho County has proposed that Idaho hunters be required to take out \$10,000 worth of liability insurance before they can be issued hunting licenses.

MacGregor said he would propose such legislation to the next session of the Legislature, patterning it in some respects after the state's traffic safety responsibility law. Under this law, after a motorist has had a collision, he must buy liability insurance of \$10,000 or show proof that he can pay that much money in the event of another accident. Otherwise, he is denied his license.

MacGregor noted that four persons have been prosecuted for hunting deaths since 1953 in Idaho County. In most cases, he said, those prosecuted were unable to pay any restitution to the families of the persons killed.

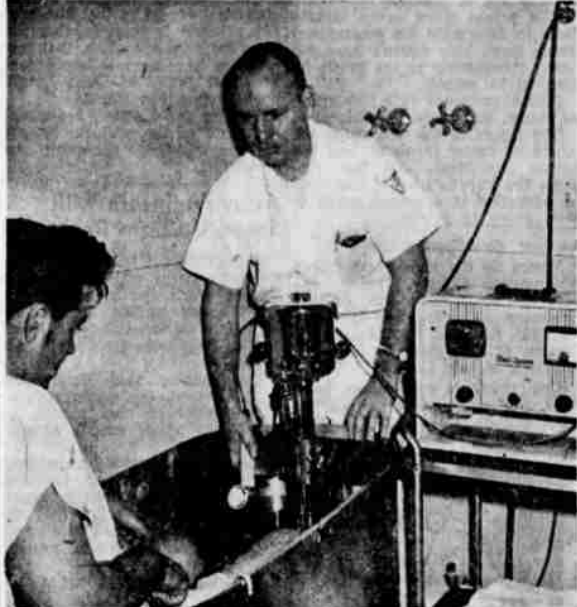

Mercy Hospital Adds Physical Therapy Dept.

Roseburg's Mercy Hospital recently provided facilities for more effective treatment of many injuries and disorders with addition of a new physical therapy department under the supervision of Jack Gamet, registered physical therapist.

Gamet is a graduate of the University of Oregon and took his physical therapy training at Duke University in North Carolina. He formerly was employed at Roseburg Veterans Hospital.

Therapy in the new department is administered only on prescription by a physician, said Gamet. In treating patients, he utilizes such properties as heat, light, sound, water and electricity derived from five machines in the department.

One of the most intriguing instruments in the department is the ultra-sound machine. Gamet said the machine creates a form of heat by emitting sound waves at a frequency of one million cycles per second. The sound, of course, cannot be heard, as human ears can perceive only sounds between the frequencies of about 5,000 cycles to about 15,000 cycles.

Used In Treatment

The instrument, which Gamet said has been used in the U.S. since about 1953, is used in the treatment of fluid-gorged tissues. It causes discharge of the fluid.

Gamet said both the ultra-sound machine and another therapy instrument, the whirlpool bath, are commonly used in professional and collegiate athletic training rooms. The bath provides a massaging effect through treatment with swirling water and air currents.

Another machine which has been developed since World War II, said Gamet, is the micro-wave diathermy. It emits fast rays which are used to administer heat treatments to comparatively dense tissues. Used in treatment of less dense tissues is the infrared diathermy machine, which emits longer and slower waves which do not penetrate as evenly nor as deeply as the micro-waves.

Stimulator In Use

The fifth machine is the electric stimulator. It stimulates muscles with direct electrical current and is used for treatment of nerve lesions. Gamet said the machine's chief advantage is that it stimulates directly instead of indirectly, as do some other instruments. It can be adjusted to produce either fast or slow currents to fill different needs.

The nominees who do not win scholarships will receive \$50 "book money" awards in recognition of being selected to represent their communities in the competition.
