Telephone Men Are Taking
To Hills In Oregon As Part
Of Development Program

Telephone men are taking to the hills in Oregon this winter as part of a \$2,300,000 program to provide more circuits for long distance telephoning.

In Douglas and Josephine counties, according to Pacific Telephone Manager D. E. Lafferty, Western Electric and Pacific Telephone employees have been working at microwave relay centers at Mt. Nebo and King Mountain.

The men have been installing and testing radio-telephone equipment that will be used when a long distance telephone channel goes in service next summer on the Portland-Sacramento relay route. Since its completion in 1956, the Portland-Sacramento system has been used only for transmission of television programs.

Line Of Sight Needed

Microwave radio relay systems, Lafferty pointed out, beam long distance calls or TV programs through the air on a line-of-sight. To make unobstructed line-of-sight transmission possible, relay stations in such systems are usually located on hills or mountains and spaced about 30 miles apart.

Despite a mild winter in some parts of Oregon, travel to and from many of Pacific Telephone's relay stations through the state has been difficult. Sno-cats and powerful four-wheel drive trucks are being used to transport men and equipment to the mountain-top relay stations.

Installation and testing of radio-

telephone equipment at relay stations in this area and other parts of the state will continue through the spring and into early summer, Lafferty said.

New Relays Planned

A new Medford-Klamath Falls relay system will provide a "telephone skyway" over the mountains starting in July. It will also serve as an alternate route to with Western Oregon, Washington and California.

Another new radio relay will be placed in service between Portland and Pendleton in May of this year. Pacific Telephone is also expanding its present microwave routes, Lafferty said, recently by the number of voice paths on the Portland-Spokane relay was increased. In July a second channel capable of handling 600 long distance conversations simultaneously will be added on the present Portland-Seattle route.

Mold Being Used
To Break Up Clots
Of Blood Quickly

BOSTON (AP)—Discovery of a mold extract which seeks and destroys fresh blood clots in minutes was announced Friday by the Massachusetts Heart Assn.

The mold extract discovered by Dr. Mario Stefani at St. Elizabeth's Hospital, is described as innocuous and a treatment which can be used safely on the sickest patient.

The substance is credited with furnishing quick relief for sufferers of heart attacks, phlebitis and other ailments which involve blood clotting.

The mold extract has been used with excellent results on 25 patients after a long series of experiments on animals and 10 years of striving by Stefani.

It is given by injection, enters the blood stream and travels to the clot, wherever it may be. If used early enough, the announcement said, it can prevent much long-term damage by clots.

Stefani said the technique can be used "in any good hospital" although not yet ready for home use by family physicians.

The remedy also is credited with breaking up clots and avoiding shock.

Stefani referred to a man who suffered a coronary attack. He was in deep shock and also suffering pulmonary edema (filling of the lung cavity with fluid). This patient was treated with the mold extract as well as receiving standard treatment.

Initial heart damage remained but the patient was freed of pain and shock within two hours, the doctor reported.

Huge Lumber Shed Burns
At Klamath Falls Friday

KLAMATH FALLS (AP)—A fire at the Car-Ad-Co lumber mill north of here Thursday night did \$350,000 damage, company officials said.

The estimated loss at \$300,000 for 14 million board feet of finished pine in storage sheds and 150,000 for the two sheds which were destroyed.

Richard Moehl, assistant manager, said the loss was partially covered by insurance.

All fire departments in the area fought the blaze which burned most of the night.

The fire was held to the one building.
