Duplicate Bridge Winners Announced

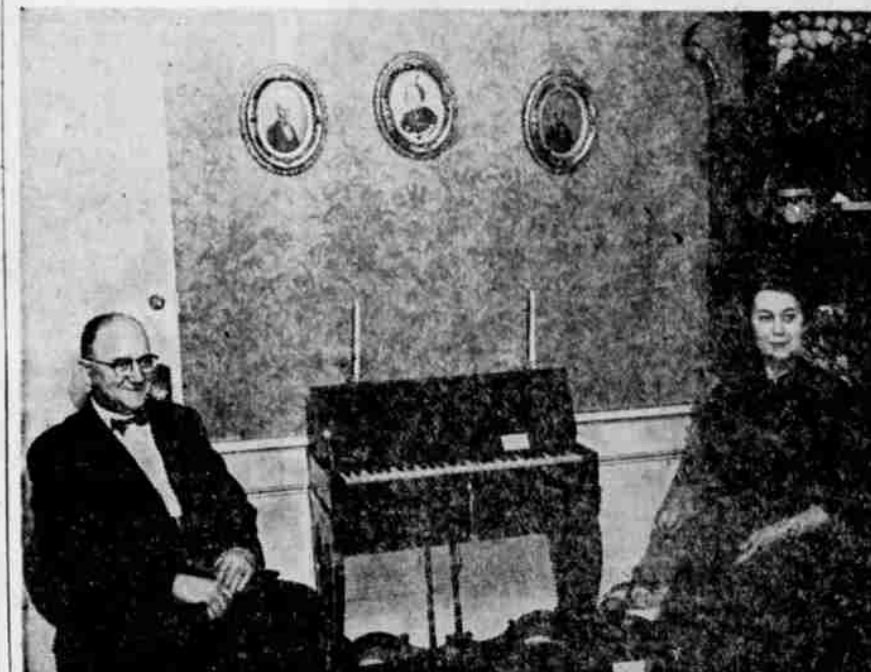
